Annual Golf Week Finals at Banff Today

BANFF, Aug. 22—The stage was all set for the finals of the annual golf week at the Banff Springs Hotel today, when F. G. Hoblitzel, Toronto and Billy Hudson, Calgary, last survivors of 120 starters, will meet in a 36 hole final for the cup donated by King Edward VIII, when he was visiting here as the Prince of Wales.

Mrs. J. T. Gray of Calgary, and Miss Paddy Arnold, Calgary, met today in the finals for the Brewster Cup while half a dozen flights were played off.

In the semi-finals of the Edward Prince of Wales cup yesterday afternoon, F. G. Hoblitzel, Toronto, played some masterly strokes in defeating Johnny Chaston of Calgary, 2-1. Billy Hudson, winner of the cup last year, stymied, S. P. Howell, Vancouver, on the 17th hole to win 2-1. The best golf of the week was seen in these two matches.

The all Calgary finish in the Brewster Cup saw Mrs. Gray advance to the finals as expected, four up and three to go, at the expense of Miss H. Ritz of Calgary. The match between Miss Arnold, Calgary and Miss D. Allen, of Calgary, was close all the way through with Miss Allen, making a fighting finish in an effort to come from behind, but losing out on the 17th hole.

Spectacular driving from the championship tee, 140 above the river and 150 yards from the opposite bank, attracted many spectators. With three drives averaging almost 300 yards in length, Billy Hudson, Calgary, took first prize.

Johnny Aiken of Calgary was second, a total of forty yards behind him. J. M. English and Robert Hood, both of Calgary, placed first and second respectively in the men's driving for left handed players. Miss D. Allen, Calgary, won the ladies' driving with Miss P. Arnold of Calgary, second.

Mrs. J. I. Brewster, Banff, finished up on the 18th green to win the ladies' tombstone competition and Miss Y. C. Glanville, Calgary, was second.

ST. STEPHEN, Aug. 21—Displaying the same brand of battle possessed by Devon in playoff games of former years, the Minto Miners spotted the N. B. champion St. Croix Club four runs and then rushed forward to take the lead 5-4 and finally earn a 5-5 draw in the second game of the New Brunswick semi-finals here this afternoon.

The tie ensured a four game series at least and the third game will be played at Devon on Tuesday, with a fourth at St. Stephen next Friday afternoon. In the event of rain on those days the games will be played on the day following.

The Miners were not to be denied today. With St. Croix four runs up on them they scored twice in the seventh, three times in the eighth to forge ahead and finally St. Croix were able to send a runner home to tie the score.

Despite the tie today the locals were confident of winning the next two games to gain the New Brunswick finals.

YANKEES APPROACH HOMER RECORD ON SEASON'S PLAY

Need Only 41 More to Equal Record Set in 1932
by Athletics

NEW YORK, Aug. 22—The Yankees are approaching a new major league record for home runs hit by one team in a single season. They have a total of 132, and need only forty-one more to equal the record of 173 established in 1932 by the Athletics.

The Yankees should come close to knocking out 180 round trip wallops, for they have forty-nine more games to play. The record number of home runs for a Yankee team in one season is 160, and was made the same year the Athletics created the mark the present collection of Yanks are expected to shatter.

All four of the Yankees' latest batch of home runs were packed into the first game of a recent double header with the Athletics. Lou Gehrig hit his thirty-fourth of the campaign; Bill Dickey his twentieth; Joe DiMaggio his eighteenth and George Selkirk his fifteenth. The victim of all four drives was Harry Kelley.

Dickey not only connected for a home run but also contributed two doubles and a single to the Yankees' attack. He drew a pass when he made his fifth appearance at bat, and that base on balls was converted into the first placers' winning

run. In the second game Dickey was forced to retire when, in the seventh inning, he was struck on his right hand by a foul tip off Dusty Rhodes's bat. The injury was more painful than serious and the hard-hitting catcher is expected to be available for duty today.

On their last three Sundays the Yankees performed before 166,027 cash customers. In their previous Sunday game the league leaders drew 65,342 fans into the Municipal Stadium in Cleveland, and on July 26 in Chicago a crowd of 50,000 turned out to see them play two with the White Sox.

NEW YORK, Aug. 21—The French rugby team composed of a group of Frenchmen residing in New York who, by the way, have been playing as a unit for years, will meet the New York All-Stars in a game at Manhattan Beach next Sunday afternoon. The French team played all over the United States, Canada and the British Isles.
