## Dr. Robertson Tells How He Was Caught in Mine

(Continued from Page One)

answers did not fully explain the conversation but afterwards Ivey said:

"He is getting shaky. They heard the rescuers, but he thinks they are so far away they will take 10 or 12 hours. He thinks we are lying to him when we say a couple of hours. You can see the implication."

### Get No Food

From the surface doctors were worried because the men have not been able to get food from the diamond drill hole. They have not eaten since last night and before yesterday they had done without food for six days.

The reason the two men cannot come nearer the tube is that they are having difficulty to walk in their weakened condition. This is evident by Dr. Robertson's statement "too hard to walk."

When asked by surface operators to give up the telephone receiver because they were anxious to feed them, they apparently tried to close the conversation by asking, "Is that all you want?"

Answer from surface: "No." From below, "We can't get to the pipe. The ladders are too dangerous." Evidently they have to climb up to some gallery where they are taking refuge from feared blasts.

Repeatedly the men below asked assurance that there be no more blasts.

"Are you sure you are not going to blast?" came the plea.

From the surface (emphatically): "Yes, yes."

Answer from below: "That's capital."

Dr. Robertson from below: "Is Mrs. Robertson there?"

Surface: "Yes."

Dr. Robertson: "Tell her we're both fine, just trying to take it easy until we get out. Is Charlie (Ivey) listening on the phone?"

Then there was a long conversation between them. The surface only heard emphatic "Yes, yes," or "No, no." Sometimes the questions visibly disturbed Mr. Ivey. Forgetting his direction to answer "Yes" or "No," Mr. Ivey waved his hands and said "Shut off, shut off" or "Absolutely, yes."

No definite information was obtained on the significance of the conversation but Dr. MacDonald said the conversation with the men below had been very unsatisfactory.

### Good Drinking Water

When Foreman Henderson asked about the water they replied: "There is good drinking water down here but there is too much of it."

Attempts to induce the men to leave their shelter and go to the end of a diamond drill hole in the flooding level so they could procure food were unsuccessful. The men were apparently exhausted.

Repeated questions from below about the activities of the rescuers indicated the men were obsessed with the fear of a blast causing their level to crumble.

They had been told of a shaft being dug through solid rock to meet them, but did not know daring miners were coming towards them through a difficult abandoned shaft.

Conversation was difficult because surface workers had to yell down the diamond drill hole to the men.

A Royal Canadian Army Medical Corps ambulance arrived here this afternoon ready to take the men to hospital when they are rescued. Other equipment was arriving steadily by road and airplane from Halifax.

A supply of blankets and hot water bottles was dropped by a Royal Canadian Air Force seaplane from Halifax.

Carrying long strips of wool that two men trapped in the mine may use for warmth if they are not soon removed landed on a lake about five miles from here early tonight.

Operators of the diamond drill will attempt to send it down to their underground prison, if necessary.

## BOARD OF TRADE WANTS DAYLIGHT SAVING TIME

The city council at its special meeting last night heard a request from the Board of Trade, recommending that Daylight Saving Time be adopted for the coming summer, to be effective May 23 and continue to Labor Day. The request was in the nature of a resolution passed by the Board of Trade at a recent meeting. The city fathers after deliberating on the matter, referred it to their next meeting for consideration.

Ald. Raymond Crowdon was for a plebiscite and he was supported by Deputy Mayor Warren Maxwell who maintained that the city should not adopt Daylight Saving unless a plebiscite was held. Ald. David McCaughey thought Daylight Saving a good thing but it should not be brought on before the last of June. Ald. Murray Hagerman was strongly opposed. "I have to get up at six myself," he said "and Daylight Saving Time would mean I'd have to get up at five." Ald. Ralph Gunter, M.P.P. also believed that a plebiscite should be held. He mentioned the inconvenience of it and foresaw a conflict between this city, Devon and Marysville on the matter of schedules. He believed Daylight Saving would be defeated by a large majority.

His Worship Mayor Kitchen is in favor of Daylight Saving Time.
