FOUR LAWYERS GET \$361,003

OTTAWA, May 13—From 1922 until the present four Canadian lawyers have received a total of \$361,003 from various departments of government for legal fees and travelling expenses, it was disclosed in a return tabled in the House of Commons today. The four are Hon. N. W. Rowell and W. N. Tilley of Toronto, Aimee Geoffrion and R. L. Calder of Montreal.
 From four departments of Government Mr. Rowell has been paid \$232,542, according to the return. Mr. Tilley was next, with a total of \$51,846 from nine departments. Mr. Geoffrion, for legal service to eight departments, received \$48,549, while from four departments Mr. Calder was paid \$28,066.

Radio May Hypnotize Without Being Heard

ST. LOUIS, May 12—Radio hypnosis, an accidental, unpremeditated effect of radio waves in the air upon mentally "sick" persons, was described today as a possible explanation of some of the neuroses and hallucinations of unbalanced minds.
 "A patient can be conditioned to hypnosis by radio or telephone," Dr. J. L. McCartney of Albany, N.Y., explained. "It is within the realm of possibility that some of the compulsive neuroses (the feeling that someone is compelling you) and the hallucinations of the psychoses may be explained by this same mental miscarriage."
 "It has been shown that thought processes passing through the brain can be detected and even measured by electric oscillations. It is not far-fetched to assume that sensitized persons suffering from certain atomic changes in their tissues may thus tune their special senses of brain cells into a specific radio frequency, and so become sensitive to suggestions that are known to be always passing through the ether, and which are normally detected when proper instruments are devised."
 "These 'sick' persons are in various degrees of dissociation and hyper-suggestibility, and so may interpret these stimuli. On the other hand, these 'radio' suggestions planted in the brain of the patient may set up auto-suggestion and so lead to compulsions, just as suggestions given to a patient under hypnosis may direct his actions after he awakens."

ANOTHER NAZI BLUNDER

Hitler has ordered that every newly married couple in Germany is to be presented with a copy of his book "Mein Kampf" (My Battle).
 No doubt the newlyweds would prefer a radio or a silver tea service, but their preferences are not considered any more than is the effect which this order is likely to produce on other nations.

HOW TO IMPROVE HOME GROUNDS

Practically every householder in the country or an urban centre has a desire to have attractive surroundings and nothing will do so much in this way at a small cost as the planting of trees, shrubs, plants and vines. Within the next few weeks is the best time for planting, but such work should be done on some definite plan in order to get the most pleasing results.
 Then there is the question of just what to plant. This and a wide range of other questions is answered in the handbook "Beautifying the Home Grounds of Canada" issued by the Horticultural Council of Canada, 114 Victoria Street, Ottawa. The opening chapter is on Landscape Architecture—Arranging and Planting the Home Grounds written so that the most junior tyro in gardening can readily understand. There are plans to illustrate the arrangement of lawns, gardens and plantings for the average small house with pictures of what engaging results can be attained. There is also a special chapter dealing with Planting the Farm Home Ground.
 How to Establish and Maintain a Rock Garden is also fully described and plans are given to indicate how to get the most effective lay out. Every conceivable detail about arranging lawns, gardens and plantings is given in the book, which concludes with a complete list of trees, shrubs, herbaceous perennials and annuals that are suitable for planting in each province prepared by Provincial Horticulturists.

NORTHERN IRELAND ABOUT TO EMBARK ON EXTENSIVE ELECTRICAL DEVELOPMENT

Northern Ireland is about to branch out into an extensive electrical development scheme at a cost of approximately \$5,000,000 according to the Industrial Department of the Canadian National Railways. Over four hundred miles of extra high-tension lines have already been erected and a low-tension system is now being entered upon. It is the intention to operate the Northern Ireland grid system from two main stations, one at Belfast and the other at Londonderry, both generating electricity by the use of steam plants consuming coal, with the possibility of hooking up with the Shannon River hydro-electric scheme.

TO CELEBRATE GOLDEN JUBILEE IN BERMUDEA

Celebrating their golden jubilee by a cruise to Bermuda, members of the Canadian Ticket Agents' Association will sail from Montreal on May 14 aboard the R.M.S. Lady Rodney, Canadian National Steamships, for a round-trip of 11 days' duration, during which time they will spend two days on the coral island which has become known as the "Gulf Stream Playground."
 Arriving at Bermuda early on Monday morning, May 18, the party will engage in a comprehensive sightseeing programme during their stay in the colony, which will include a scenic trip from Hamilton, the capital, on the Bermuda Railway, to the ancient former capital of St. George, founded in 1612. Following this will be a visit to the marvellous Crystal Caves which have been a never-fading wonder to all who have visited them, their beautiful formations taking all kinds of fantastic shapes. Another feature of unusual attraction will be the Bermuda Government Aquarium, which offers a collection of marine life at close view which cannot be duplicated elsewhere. The following day an exploration tour by bus will be taken, which will be followed by another sightseeing trip on the Bermuda Railway to Somerset on the opposite end of the island, this route being known for its scenic beauty and the many places of interest along the way. On the evening of the second day, transfer will be made to the R.M.S. Lady Somers which sails early next morning homeward, with arrival at Montreal on Sunday, May 24.
 After fifty years of service, the Canadian Ticket Agents' Association continues to function for the benefit of the ticket agents of Canada and is recognized as a useful organization by the railway and steamship companies. Thirty-Six Million in One Hand

Eight cheques totalling in value no less a sum than \$36,755,430 changed hands on May 1 when the Canadian Pacific Railway paid off the balance in principal and interest due of the sixty million dollar loan contracted in 1933, and guaranteed by the Dominion Government at that time.
 It will be remembered that in June of that year the Canadian Pacific had to raise the sixty millions to meet maturing obligations. The money markets of the world were then feeling the full effect of the financial crisis and were closed with the result that it was not possible for a Canadian institution to borrow so large a sum on advantageous terms. The Canadian banks therefore agreed to combine in making this loan, but as an added measure of security to the banks, the Dominion Government agreed to guarantee re-payment of the loan both as to principal and interest. The loan was to mature in five years, or might be paid off by the Canadian Pacific prior thereto on notice to be given to the banks. It has been paid off in full in less than three years, and the obligation of the Government to guarantee payment came to an end automatically the moment the cheques issued today were presented. Furthermore, since all interest and other charges have been paid by the Company, the entire transaction has not cost the Dominion Government one cent. The loan originally carried an interest rate of five per cent., but later this was reduced to four and a half per cent. New loans raised by the Company to pay this off were made at a still lower rate of interest.
