POLICE FOLLOW MANY LEADS IN MYSTERY CASE

Reported Mr. Merrithew Seen at Devon Sunday Night

Had His Coat On

Do Not Believe There is a Woman in the Case

The Royal Canadian Mounted Police are still up against a stone-wall so far as the disappearance of G. Eldon Merrithew is concerned. They are working hard following up all leads, some of which are of a contradictory nature. A new development yesterday afternoon was the finding of Mr. Merrithew's coat floating in the Nashwaak river about two hundred yards from the mouth.

This is difficult to explain in view of the fact that the Mounted Police have received reports that Merrithew was seen passing through Devon on Sunday evening and again late on Sunday night, and that he had his coat on at that time. The police have not been able to confirm the report that he was seen in the canoe on Sunday afternoon in company with a unidentified woman, and they do not seem to place any credence in the report that there is a woman concerned in Mr. Merrithew's disappearance. In fact some girl friends of the missing man have been interviewed and they know absolutely nothing of his whereabouts, stating that they have not seen him for a long time. In the canoe which was found on Monday and which Mr. Merrithew hired at Fredericton on Sunday noon there were found his collar and tie, part of a lunch which he had taken from his home a blanket cigarette paper, tobacco and matches.

It was thought that he might have been marooned on one of the islands and that the canoe floated away with these things in it. But a thorough search of the islands on the part of the Mounted police have assured them that he was not in that locality. For the past couple of days the police, assisted by local parties, have been dragging in both the Nashwaak.

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ACTIVITY IN BUILDING HERE HAS INCREASED

Building Permits to Amount of \$60,000 Have Been Issued

Smaller Repairs Too

Greater Number of Private Builders in the City

Building activity in the city of Fredericton is bustling since 1936 began, with a great many smaller repairs and renovations being made to buildings and business concerns, as well as the upspringing of new buildings. One or two buildings, notably the Edgecombe building on York street which was razed by fire early in the winter, are being rapidly renovated and will be ready for re-entry by the Ken Staples drug company within a short time. This new building will be modern and up-to-date and one which will mark something new in construction here.

Total cost of new building in the city since the year began is approximately \$60,000. The cost of minor repairs in the city since the year began has been more than \$2,000.

The two major construction projects now in progress are the four-story structure at the corner of Queen and Carleton streets, known as the Ryan building, being done by the New Brunswick Contractors, Ltd., at a cost of \$34,000, and the two-story Edgecombe building at the intersection of York and King streets, which also is being constructed by the N. B. Contractors Ltd., at an estimated cost of \$15,000. An extension now being made to the garage of Creighton & Smith on King street, is a one-story brick structure, the estimated cost being \$3,600.

W. A. Hay is building a one-story structure on Brunswick street, the cost estimated at \$1,500. This is a service station.

E. Clowes Patterson is erecting a dwelling house at 375 University avenue, at an approximate cost of \$1,200. John McMinnam is building a dwelling house on Victoria street, cost to be \$650. Frank Ames is erecting a dwelling house on Graham Lane at an estimated cost of \$1,000.

David Coyle is erecting a two-story building on Beaverbrook street, the cost to be about \$200. Mrs. George Tennant is building a two-story dwelling on George Street at an estimated cost of \$2,800.

The city council at a special meeting called for this afternoon at five o'clock will consider such a resolution. The resolution submits that the city council see that the Motor Carrier Board raise bus service to a higher standard of equipment, wages, hours of service—in short governed by a standard of regulations which will not conflict with the railways and will provide fair competition. Several other matters will be considered by the council at its meeting today.
