ed and indicated his willingness to stand for the Liberal party in the forthcoming federal by-election in Victoria.

His possible candidature raised interesting possibilities inasmuch as Hon. S. P. Tolmie, former provincial premier, had been mentioned as probable Conservative candidate.

The two, though opposed politically, were old and intimate friends. In 1917 when a suitable candidate was sought to run on the Union government slate in Victoria, it was Mr. Nicholas who brought forward the name of Dr. Tolmie, and official of the department of agriculture.

Dr. Tolmie was thus launched upon a political career which saw him successively member of Parliament, member of his own province. It looked as though the editor who had aided in the start of his political career might be his opponent if he re-entered public life from which he retired with his provincial defeat in 1933.

Mr. Nicholas recently returned from a visit to eastern Canada.

He was a director of The Canadian Press and was prominently associated with all activities of the journalistic profession and publishing business in Canada. He was a member of the Canadian delegation to the Fourth Imperial Press Conference at London in 1930.

He was president of the Association of Canadian Clubs of Canada for 1922-23 and had been a director of the Victoria Chamber of Commerce since 1920.

Among his other interests were the Navy League of Canada of which he was a former honorary vice-president, the Boy Scouts Association of which he was a former honorary vice-president.

are excellent, our rural schools lag behind. But as never before rural parents are demanding that their children be given an opportunity to attend High School. It is a whole-some sign, and should be highly commended, not discouraged.

In regard to rural young people our government is restoring grants to vocational education and we commend them for doing so. But why not give some scholarships to enable rural children to attend these schools — or make loans to students wishing to attend these schools, that rural population and urban children may both share in this training.
