SANCTIONS SAID SLOWING ITALY

GENEVA, Switzerland, May 19 — Downcast by failure to clear a road to East African peace, the League of Nations last night looked on Italy's steadily diminishing supply of gold as a possible deterrent to much further extension of her campaign against Ethiopia.

The expense of the war, coupled with sanctions, said a communique issued by the League, has reduced the country's gold supply with remarkable rapidity.

Experts of the Committee on Sanctions, examining reports from many countries, estimated that between last October 20 and the end of March, this year, the Bank of Italy had lost 105,300,000 gold dollars in foreign assets. This is nearly half the 227,200,000 gold dollars it had in October.

"What amount of gold in foreign assets the (Italian) Government has been able to collect domestically since October is unknown," the report said.

Gold holdings of the Bank of Italy dropped 27,800,000 gold dollars between October 20, 1935, and the end of the year—a figure which the communique said had been confirmed by reports in the Italian press.

PREPARING FOR VANCOUVER'S GOLDEN JUBILEE CELEBRATIONS

VANCOUVER, B. C., May 20—Canada from coast to coast will be on display here this summer to greet the thousands of visitors expected during the period of Vancouver's Golden Jubilee celebrations. In the ground floor windows of its hotel building in downtown Vancouver, the Canadian National Railways have placed a series of displays portraying, for the benefit of tourists, the country's attractions from the Pacific to the Atlantic. It is the Company's contribution to the city's birthday programme. As befits a jubilee celebration, one of the exhibits strikes an historic note. It is a full size model complete with cordwood and water barrel of the Dorchester, first locomotive used in Canada on the Champlain and St. Lawrence Railway. This first railroad in Canada is now part of the Canadian National System and its centenary is being observed this year.

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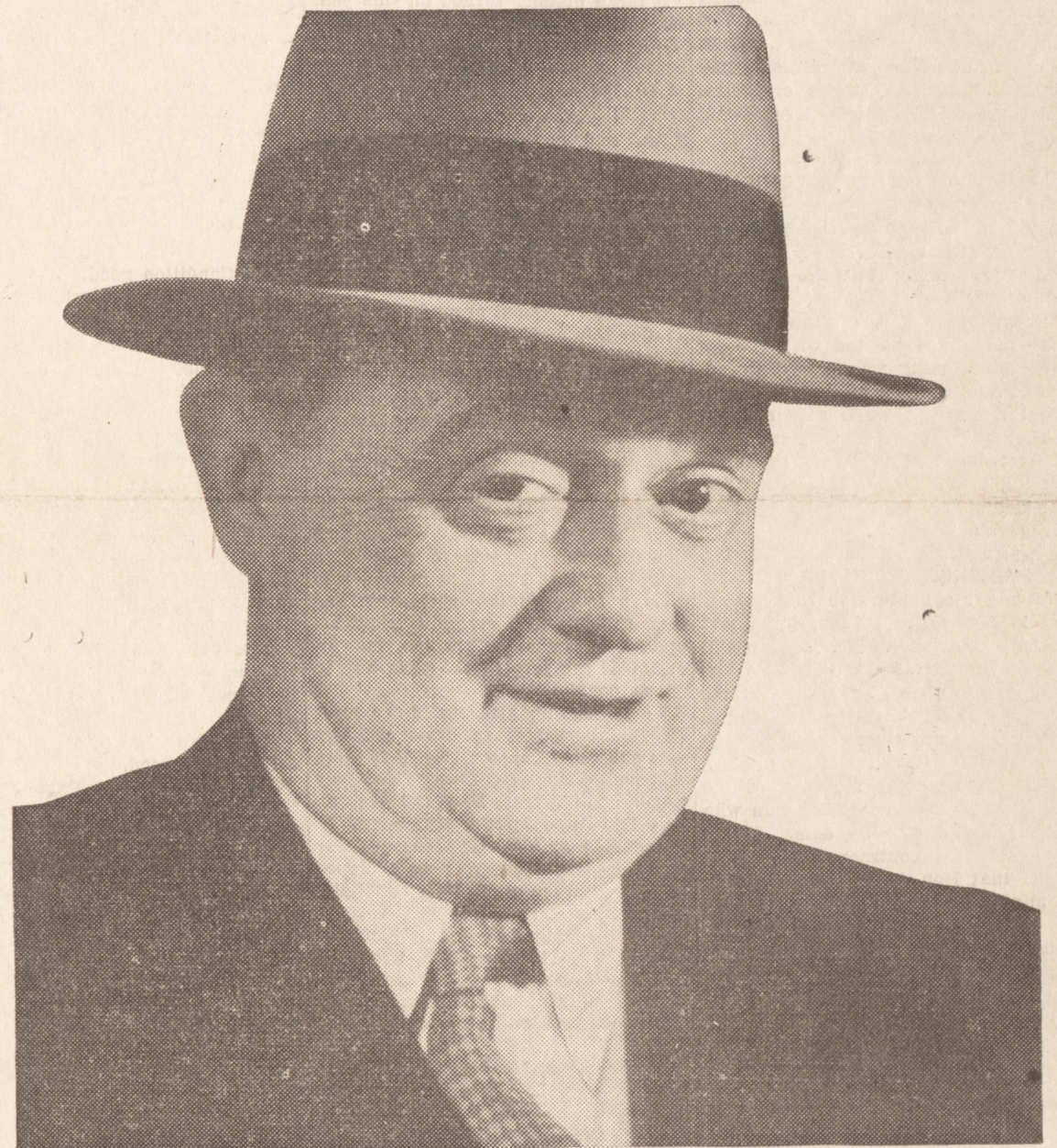
