Daniel Bannister's Appeal Today

HIGH SCHOOL CADET CORPS IS INSPECTED

Larger Turnout During Past Year Than For Several Years

Corps Complimented

General Salute, Company Drill, Rifle Work, P. T. Included

The 1936 Fredericton High School Cadet Corps, whose instructor is J. E. Page of the teaching staff of the school, was inspected this afternoon at three o'clock by Col. Garon, general staff officer of Military District Number 7, of Saint John. A large number gathered at the High School grounds this afternoon to watch the inspection.

The cadet corps included the general salute, the march past, commanded by Walter M. Smith, company drill by George Little, rifle drill by Irvine Cameron, P. T. work, J. E. Palmer of the Junior company, signalling by Donald Horwood and first aid demonstration under the command of Irvine Cameron. The work was highly complimented by the inspecting officer.

A large number turned on this year to take the cadet drill and the showing this year was the best in several years. Fraser MacKay was in charge of the High School Cadet Band. The High School cadets were all in uniform, and presented a striking appearance in their drill.

Special Session of Appeal Court

The four original grounds of appeal in the Daniel Bannister appeal were presented by H. Murray Lambert, counsel for Daniel Bannister, this morning in the appellate division of the Supreme Court before Chief Justice J. B. M. Baxter, Mr. Justice W. C. H. Grimmer and Mr. Justice W. H. Harrison.

Mr. Lambert in summing up said that there was sufficient evidence in the first two grounds to warrant a new trial, that the third ground was enough to quash the conviction, and that the fourth ground produced enough evidence to reverse the decision of the jury in the case and to quash conviction.

During the noon recess of the court Mr. Lambert was to draft out two new grounds of appeal, one, that there was no evidence from which the jury could decide that Daniel knew or ought to have known murder to be a probable or possible consequence; and two, that there was no evidence of a conspiracy to kidnap the Lake baby.

MAIN HIGHWAYS OF THE PROVINCE OPEN TO TRAFFIC

Roughness and a Few Soft Places But Roads Generally in Good Shape—Places Where Caution Should Be Observed.

The main trunk highways of New Brunswick are now all open for traffic, and are in good condition except for some roughness, and a few soft places due to the flood and frost conditions. Places where caution should be observed are mentioned below, as furnished in a highway bulletin today:

Route No. 1, St. Stephen-Saint John—Mile 0.0-19.26, pavement good. Mile 68.3-69.3, Chance Harbour diversion now being completed, part of diversion in use. Mile 75.0-85.06, pavement good.

Route No. 2, Quebec Boundary-Nova Scotia Boundary—Mile 0.0-37.0 rough and soft but passable. Mile 67.4-73.6, mile 92.7-101.6, mile 110.8-123.9, mile 177.2-187.2, mile 264.2-301.0 mile 324.6-334.7, mile 368.7-392.1, mile 401.0-411.3 paved sections good.

Mile 176-177 under construction but passable. Mile 197.5-198.0 Oromocto Plains, surface soft but passable.

Route No. 2A, Oromocto-Westfield—Several soft places, but passable.

Route No. 3, St. Stephen-Fredericton, via Long's Creek. Condition good. Route No. 4—Vanceboro-Thomaston—Condition good.

Route No. 5—Houlton-Woodstock—Condition good.

Route No. 6—Bridgewater-Florenceville—Condition good.

Route No. 7, Fort Fairfield-Andover—Condition good.

Route No. 8, Fredericton-Newcastle—Rough near Boiestown Mile 43.

Route No. 9, Fredericton-Sussex via Jemseg—Road under repair Mile 0.0-20.0 through Maugerville and Sheffield. Water over Jemseg Flats near bridge, detour via Route No. 10 at McGowans Corner.

Route No. 10, Sheffield-Starkey's via Chipman—Several soft places, all passable.

Route No. 11, Matapedia-Moncton—Mile 14.0-26.2, pavement good. Road very rough with frost action. Mile 1.0-3.0 and mile 30.0-60.0, all passable.

Route No. 11A, Bathurst-Newcastle via short route—Very rough and soft in places especially at Bathurst end of road. Passable.

Route No. 12, Chatham-Newcastle—Pavement good.

STEADY PROGRESS IS BEING MADE IN SALVAGE WORK

One Span Being Conveyed to River Bank in Fragments

High Water a Help

Present Equipment of Wrecking Company is Adequate

Steady progress is being made today on the work of salvaging the C. N.R. bridge wreckage from the waters of the St. John river. Two thirds of the span between piers two and three is now ready to be salvaged from the water. The span is now protruding from the water and is in process of being cut up, "burned" and separated by acetylene burners, and then derricked to the banks of the river in fragments. The present equipment of the Garson Wrecking Company is adequate for the work and within the past day or two work has progressed quite rapidly.

The present high water level is rather an advantage than a disadvantage it was learned today from officials and so long as the water remains at its high level the work can be greatly facilitated. The dynamiting which has been carried on in recent days has greatly speeded up the work and enabled the crane to lift the fragments of steel and girder much more easily.

The St. John river in which the Garson Wrecking Company with its own special diver, floating crane, etc. have been carrying on work in recent weeks in adverse weather con-
