ond visit to Fredericton on Monday next and will speak at a public luncheon to be given under the auspices of the local branch of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs, at 12.30 o'clock in the Brunswick Baptist church here. The subject of his address will be "The International Outlook," a subject upon which he is eminently qualified to speak. Sir Alfred is Professor of International Relations at Oxford University and Director of the Geneva School of International Studies. He was Knighted by His Majesty the King in the New Year's Honours list for his consciencious services in the promotion of the cause of true peace and the League of Nations. The subject of his address is of outstanding interest and the opportunity to hear Sir Alfred will be eagerly looked forward to by the pubhic of Fredericton. On the occasion of his previous visit to the city, he spoke under the auspices of the National Council of Education and since then much history has been made. Sir Alfred's summing up will be most instructive at this time.
