SYNOD MEETING
The Provincial Synod of Canada, comprising the dioceses of Nova Scotia, Quebec, Fredericton and Montreal, will meet in this city on January 14, with Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, Metropolitan and Archbishop of Fredericton, presiding. The meeting will be opening on Tuesday morning with Litany and Holy Communion at the Cathedral. There will be a business session in the afternoon in the Memorial hall and in the evening a general meeting will take place at the Cathedral at which bishops, and clerical and lay delegates will be present. Most Rev. Derwyn Trevor Owen, D.D., D.C.L., Primate of all Canada, will be the special speaker. The Synod meetings will continue on Thursday, if necessary. Among those expected to be present will be Rev. Canon Gould, general secretary of the Missionary Society of the Canadian church; also Rev. Canon Abbott-Smith, deputy prolocutor, will preside until the new prolocutor is elected.

AN INTERESTING LECTURE
Sir Alfred Zimmern will pay his second visit to Fredericton on Monday next and will speak at a public luncheon to be given under the auspices of the local branch of the Canadian Institute of International Affairs, at 12.30 o'clock in the Brunswick Baptist church here. The subject of his address will be "The International Outlook," a subject upon which he is eminently qualified to speak. Sir Alfred is Professor of International Relations at Oxford University and Director of the Geneva School of International Studies. He was knighted by His Majesty the King in the New Year's Honours list for his conscientious services in the promotion of the cause of true peace and the League of Nations. The subject of his address is of outstanding interest and the opportunity to hear Sir Alfred will be eagerly looked forward to by the public of Fredericton. On the occasion of his previous visit to the city, he spoke under the auspices of the National Council of Education and since then much history has been made. Sir Alfred's summing up will be most instructive at this time.

MORE CLAMOR FOR RELIEF NOTES MAYOR

Increase in Those Needing Relief in This Part of Country

Dec. Costs Higher

Ald. Forbes Comments T.B. Costs Increased More Than Relief

His Worship Mayor W. G. Clark, who will sit tonight for the last time as chief magistrate of civic affairs, sounded a note of warning on the matter of unemployment relief at last night's January committee meeting of the city council.

"There is more of a clamor for relief here now than there has been for some time," announced Mayor Clark. "Our relief situation is pretty bad," he added.

Ald. C. Hedley Forbes reporting on relief costs for the month of December, 1935 totalled \$2,819.46. In the same period last year the total costs for relief was \$2,173.71. This is an increase for this year of \$645.75. There had been an increase of forty seven dependents and an increase of seventeen heads of families. Also there had been a slight increase in the cost of food and the cost of clothing.

Ald. Forbes reported also that there was an overdraft in the bank of \$7,000 and that the repair costs to the Municipal Home were about \$4,000 more than the \$3,000 assessed for. There had been an increase of about \$1,100 in poor relief recently. Ald. Forbes declared that the costs for care of city tuberculosis patients showed more of an increase than direct relief. The council learned that prospects for wood cutting this year were not so bright as last year. The city engineer informed the council that the wood was not good this year. In other years an arrangement had been made with the University of New Brunswick to cut wood on their land. This matter will be inquired into by the new council.

HARDWARE PLANT FOR THE CAPITAL

A committee of the city council will shortly be appointed to inquire into the proposed erection of a hardware flooring plant in this city—to be erected some time in the early summer.

A communication from the Pinder Lumber Milling Company at McAdam, N.B., asking for concessions from the city in the matter of building and introducing the company, was read to the council last night by His Worship Mayor Clark.

The company asked consideration of certain sites for the company's proposed mill here; the exemption of taxes for a period of ten years, and free water privileges. One of the sites suggested was in the vicinity of the Fredericton exhibition grounds. The communication pointed out that the company is prepared to erect a plant here in the summer of 1936, to employ at least twenty men in the mill, and to employ about fifty men in the woods. The company informed the council that such a plant would provide a steady outlet for small mills for their surplus hardwood boards and generally stimulate industry in this city.

On motion of Ald. Forbes, seconded by Ald. Maxwell the council will appoint a committee to look into the matter early in the new year and report back to the council. In making the motion Ald. Forbes suggested that part of the committee's work would be to keep "the scheme alive."

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COUN. CAMERON, KINGSCLEAR, IS NEW WARDEN

York County Statement Shows Surplus of \$274,121.63

Presented Today

Council Opens Session With Most Members Present

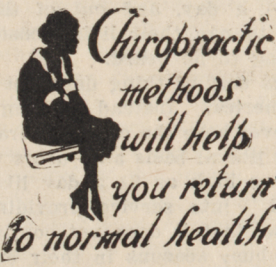
Councillor Howard Cameron of Kingsclear, was elected the new York County warden, succeeding Councillor W. J. Gaynor of McAdam at the opening session of the council this afternoon. He was elected by acclamation on motion by Councillor B. O. Waugh of Douglas, seconded by Councillor Warren B. Ebbett of Dumfries.

A surplus of \$274,121.63 is recorded for the Municipality of York in the financial statement for the fiscal year ending November 30, 1935, presented today at the opening session of the Council which opened at two o'clock. H. G. Hoban, county auditor, prepared the statement, which was presented by Major John S. Scott, county secretary treasurer. The total assets as given by the statement amounted to \$373,933.47 and the liabilities \$109,599.82. Then the bank loans paid, amounting to \$10,000 added to the assets makes the assets \$383,933.47 thus leaving the sum of \$274,121.63.

The council opened this afternoon with most of the members present and will, in all probability, continue until Saturday. The complete statement is as follows:

ASSINIBOIA CANDIDATE KNOWN HERE

William Irvine, C. C. F. Candidate Campaign-ed in York in 1921

Called "Firebrand"

Engaged in Heated Debate With Hon. Dr. Edwards at the Time

William Irvine, candidate of the Co-Operative Commonwealth Federation, who was defeated in the Assiniboia federal by-election last night by Hon. J. G. Gardiner, federal minister of agriculture, is well known in York county.

Known as the "firebrand" of the west, and engaged in politics in the west for the past ten years, William Irvine was active in a by-election in York county in 1921, when Ernest Stairs, M.P.P. and Hon. R. B. Hanson were also participating. It was the occasion of Hon. Mr. Hanson's first election to the House of Commons. In those days Irvine was known for his fiery oratory and intensity and these characteristics have not abated any since that time, but actually have increased.

The feature of the 1921 campaign in York county in which the defeated C. C. F. candidate took part, was a huge rally at Nashwaaksis in which Irvine engaged in heated debate with Hon. Dr. Edwards. Many political followers will recall the occasion.

William Irvine is a native of the Shetland Islands and in 1925 he was a Labor candidate in the west, and he also represented Westaskawin. Irvine was defeated in yesterday's election by the following vote: Hon. J. G. Gardiner, 6,371; William Irvine, 2,903.
