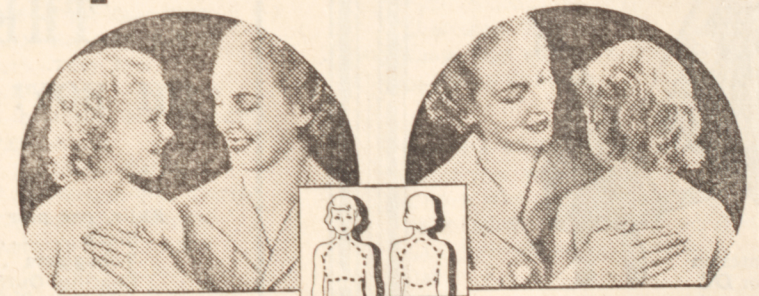

Once again, Toyshop time has come around. For some years past, the Toyshop has loomed large in local Boy Scout activities; and 1936 will be no exception to what has now become a regle.

This year, our premises are located in a store on the corner of King and Regent streets, generously placed at our disposal by William Grieves. The Telephone Company is offering the installation of a telephone; the Maritime Electric Company, the electric light. We have already the necessary stoves for heating, loaned by friends. All branches, and members of the three branches: Cubs, Scouts and Rover Scouts, will co-operate in collecting, repairing and distributing toys, books, clothing and such other contributions as should please the many recipients, here and in places far away; for this Toyshop has extended its sphere of usefulness well outside of Fredericton in the past. Rovers of the 3rd Fredericton Crew; Cub Commissioner Harold Doherty; Scout Commissioner Alvah Good; all will be active, directing the collecting, repairing and eventual distribution.

An annual feature of the local Toyshop, has been the Toyshop Matinee, held on a Friday in December, when all of the children come provided with toys, to take in a showing of special films; admission to this is by toys, or some other contribution which will be useful to the cause. This matinee has been made possible by the kind co-operation of W. W. O. Fenety, and the staff of the Capital Theatre. This coming December 4 will see the Capitol crowded with our younger citizens, all armed with acceptable contributions; the show will start at 5:00 p.m., and films have already been ordered from the Department of the Interior, which provides them free of charge.

We are fortunate in having, this time, the assistance of Devon, Nashwaak and Durham to swell the contributions and number of willing workers; for there will be no toys from the Buckingham Contests for 1936. Meanwhile, Stanley and Douglas will have toyshops of their own; Scoutmaster Earl Hawkins of Douglas expecting to look after about 130 families to date.

Call in at or call up the Toyshop; our phone number will be published in a day or so. No contributions, however small or damaged, will be turned down. A smart repairing staff will be on the job; and this may assist some willing hands to qualify for such Proficiency Badges as the Artists, Bookbinder, Carpenter, Metalworker, thus proving the adage that "One good turn deserves another."

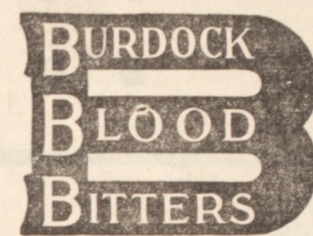
