BRODA GETS CALL OVER HAINSWORTH FOR GOAL JOB

Gordon Drillon, Former Moncton Youth, Recalled
From Syracuse to Replace Conacher

NEW YORK, Nov. 25—Conny Smythe, manager of Toronto Maple Leafs of the National Hockey League, announced tonight that George Hainsworth, veteran goalie, had been released outright.

Since the start of the season the Leafs have had two goalies, "Turk" Broda and Hainsworth.

"Broda has the job and it's his as long as he can keep it," said Smythe. The Leafs' manager said Broda was just as good as Hainsworth and about 20 years younger.

Smythe also said Charlie Conacher, handicapped by a wrist injury since the start of the season, would be given a 10-day rest. Gordon Drillon will be brought up from Syracuse Stars to play right-wing in Conacher's absence.

Dropping of Hainsworth marked the disappearance of the second veteran player from the Leafs' active lineup in two days. Yesterday "King" Clancy, the great defence-man, announced he was hanging up his skates, although he is remaining

BROWNS TO BE AIDED BY NEW OWNERSHIP

Cardinals Syndicate
Take Over Control ---
Night Baseball Prob-
able.

NEW YORK, Nov. 26—With the transfer of the St. Louis Browns franchise to a syndicate headed by Donald Barnes and his associate, William DeWitt of the Cardinals, awaiting the approval of American League club owners, baseball men are discussing what the new ownership will mean to the club and the league.

For one thing, it is generally agreed that equipment for the playing of night baseball will be installed in Sportsman's Park, despite the fact that the park will still be controlled by the Phil Ball estate. The Browns probably will play seven night games during the 1937 season, one against each of the seven other teams, providing the latter are all willing to participate in the games after dark.

While the American league has twice voted down a proposal to introduce night baseball, it is believed that the club owners have yielded to the extent of giving each club its own way in the matter. Clark Griffith, owner of the Senators, said last winter that he saw no reason for dictating the policies of any of the other league clubs.

OLD GLORY NOTES

BOSTON, Nov. 25—One of the greatest trotters of all time will go on the auction block during the Old Glory Sale, which is scheduled to begin at the Squadron A Armory, New York, today.

His mark for the mile is 1:59 1-4, which he did at Phoenix, Arizona, as a five-year-old.

As a four-year-old he equalled the world's record for that age, and also dropped his own mark to 1:59 1-2.

Thousands were spellbound when as a three-year-old he set up a new mile mark for the age when he trotted in 1:59 3-4. But horsemen who had been close up when he did a mile in 2:04 as a three-year-old sensed what was in the offing.

In one of his two-year-old races he demonstrated his power and speed in the stretch by travelling at a 2-minute gait.

Mr. McElwyn had unusual care and good handling in his juvenile days, for the late W. H. L. McCourtie, a leading business man of Dallas, Tex., who bred and raised him, was determined to put him in good hands, so he turned him over to Ben White, one of the most remarkable men that ever took charge of a yearling.

Under the superb handling of White he turned out to be easily the best horse on the Grand Circuit.

It will be Ross' first defence of the crown he regained from Jimmy McLarnin in May, 1935. The Chicagoan is a 3 to 1 favorite. Little or no Jannazzo money has shown up in the Broadway spots.

At Ferndale, Ross, apparently as good as ever, stepped through a snappy drill then hung up the gloves until he climbs into the ring with the East Sider.

Jannazzo took his last workout in a New York gym.

Both boys have agreed to give Ceferino Garcia, Los Angeles Filipino, a title shot within 60 days, if returned the victor Friday.

John Henry Lewis, just back from England where he beat Len Harvey, will engage in a couple of over-the-weight matches before returning to England to defend his light heavyweight title against Jock McAvoy, the British champion.

Preparations for the proposed Atlantic City duel between Jimmy Braddock and Joe Louis are at a standstill pending Braddock's appearance before the New York State Athletic Commission Friday to undergo a physical examination and sign to defend his heavyweight championship against Max Schmeling next June. Meantime, Braddock has resumed training in a local gymnasium.

PITTSBURGH, Nov. 26—Official attendance figures for the National League show that the St. Louis Cardinals were the best drawing card in the circuit on the road, and there can be no question that Dizzy Dean was the magnet that drew thousands of fans in other cities to turn out when the Cardinals put in an appearance.
