Authorities, marshalling the Commonwealth's relief agencies, expressed fear the full extent of what they termed "the greatest disaster the Philippines has experienced," would never be known.

Populations of entire suburban clusters of native huts were wiped out. The river, swelled by Luzon island's heaviest rainfall, swept down the populous valley at 4 a.m., last Friday, trapping most of the victims as they slept.


