### MILK, CREAM REGULATIONS

## MORE INTEREST IN LIVE FOXES FOR SHOW HERE

L. C. Young Expects Show to Be Most Successful

### Live Foxes Increase

Banquet, Annual Meeting of Local Breeders on Programme

Fredericton's first live fox show will be held in the Agricultural school building at the Dominion Experimental Station, commencing tomorrow morning at 8.30 o'clock, with L. C. Young, assistant superintendent, as manager of the show.

Emphasis will be on the live fox exhibits, and between 75 and 80 live foxes will be brought here by automobile from various parts of the province for the show. It was originally expected that the number would be quite a few less. There will also be between 40 and 50 pelts in the show.

Ralph Siliphant, of Summerside, who will act as judge, has already arrived. Judging will last from early morning tomorrow until Thursday night and will be completed in the one day. Tomorrow at noon a banquet will be held in the school building and the annual meeting of the Fredericton District Fox Breeders will take place. W. M. Burns, of this city, is president.

Commenting today on the show, Mr. Young said that the fact that there has been a decided switch in favor of exhibiting live foxes as shown by the large number of entries, means that the fox men are more interested in the industry from the breeding standpoint. This is a good indication, Mr. Young says. The committee in charge of the show is composed of Mr. Young, Leonard Griesbach, assistant superintendent, and W. M. Burns.

It is expected that about 25 live foxes will be brought here from a distance of 75 miles today, and at least 55 live foxes will be brought here from a radius of within 10 and 15 miles from this city.

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## Authorization of Mutual Fire Insurance Companies

At the last session of the Legislature an act was passed authorizing the establishment of Mutual Fire Insurance Companies throughout the province. These companies were to be established at the different centers for the mutual convenience of farmers and others and to protect them against loss by fire. It was provided that companies could be established where a membership of 50 or more was secured and the total insurance in the aggregate was not less than \$100,000. A registrar was to be appointed to supervise the work and he was to act under one of the members of the cabinet to be designated by the crown.

This act was to come into effect as soon as the proclamation was issued and published in the Royal Gazette. This proclamation appears in the Royal Gazette today. The conditions laid down for the establishment of these mutual companies are as follows:

A registrar shall be appointed under the Act to administer the same and he shall work under a minister designated by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council. It shall be the duty of the registrar to enforce compliance with the Act. A company may be incorporated within a community under this act for the purpose of insuring or re-insuring on a plan of mutual insurance to insure any property in New Brunswick in which the members of the company have an insurable interest against fire, lightning or explosion.

Any such company formed shall be called Mutual Fire Insurance Company, with such words preceding or following the same as may be approved by the minister. A company incorporated under this act will have no shares but each person, partnership or corporation insured under a policy issued by such a Mutual Company shall be a member of the company. No company shall have less than 50 members and its members must be insured under policies issued by such company for sums amounting in the aggregate to not less than \$100,000. Any five or more persons who are of age may apply to the government for permission to organize such a company.

After insurance has been subscribed for 50 or more members to an amount of not less than \$100,000, the promoters through the chairman, may call an organization meeting and apply for incorporation of such a Mutual Fire Insurance Company. The Royal Gazette contains a long list of conditions governing such organization. According to these rules such organization will be under the control of the registrar mentioned above and the Lieutenant Governor in Council may from time to time establish general rules and regulations as appear necessary to give effect to the insurance, and for the protection of those insured.

## MOTOR VEHICLE LICENSES VALID TO APRIL 30TH

Old Plates Obtainable Now at Nominal Fee

### Four Months' Grace

Motor Vehicles May Be Operated From Dec. 1 to April 30

Validity of New Brunswick motor vehicle licenses issued to cover the calendar year of 1936 will be extended to April 30, 1937. Hon. A. A. Dy-sart, Premier, made this announcement today acting in the capacity of Minister of Public Works.

The extension is in line with a practice followed during the past few years. The granting of four months grace facilitates the change of plates both for the staffs of the various offices of the Motor Vehicle Branch and for the general public.

It has also been announced that "1936 plates will be issued for any motor vehicle after December 1, 1936, at a nominal fee of one dollar for the plates and two dollars for registration." This means that motor vehicles may be operated from December 1, 1936, to April 30, 1937, at a registration cost of only three dollars.

### LESS INMATES AT HOME

## CITY TO OFFER REWARD CURB DOGS AT LARGE

Drastic Change in the Dog By-Law Made

### Police Dog Fee Higher

Council Completes the Revision of City's By-Laws

At its final night for discussion on the revision of the by-laws of the city of Fredericton, the city council meeting as a committee of the whole last night at the city hall, proposed drastic changes in the Dog Law of the city. The revised by-laws will now be submitted to city solicitor, P. J. Hughes, K.C., who will draft new by-laws in place of the ones that have been revised.

The specific change in the dog law will mean a closer checkup on dogs running loose in the city. The council at its meeting last night felt that there are yet a great many dogs running at large in the city.

As a curative measure the council will offer rewards to anyone supplying knowledge of dogs running at large without licenses.

It was stated this morning by one of the aldermen that in all probability licenses on police dogs will be boosted.

The city council have met nightly for the past several weeks considering changes in the city's by-laws, many of which have been revised to suit more modern conditions, and others of which have been entirely deleted.

### TRUCK CAUGHT FIRE

A truck, from which cases of ginger ale were being unloaded, at the Star Line wharf warehouse at noon today, caught fire doing some damage to the inside of the truck. Firemen succeeded in putting out the fire before any serious damage occurred. The truck came here from Sussex with a load of ginger ale. The fire originated in the truck's heating apparatus. It was a still alarm.
