FOURTEEN N. B. STUDENTS TO GO TO CORONATION

Seven Boys, Seven Girls to Be Included in Overseas Party

\$200 is the Expense

Chief Supt. of Education Announces Privilege Old Country Trip

Dr. A. S. McFarlane, chief superintendent of education for the province of New Brunswick, announced today that arrangements are being made by the National Council of Education of Canada in co-operation with the Overseas Education League whereby two hundred Canadian High School students may be given an opportunity of enjoying a visit to England at the time of the Coronation under favorable conditions.

The number of New Brunswick students to be included in the party is fourteen (seven girls and seven boys). Steamship accommodation (third class) has been secured on the Duchess of Athol for the girls and on the Montcalm for the boys. Both steamers will sail from Montreal April 30. The students will return to Canada towards the end of June or early in July. In London the girls will be accommodated in the new residential Hotel in Kensington Gardens Square, Bayswater. The boys will be accommodated in a new Hostel, "Ingram House," South London.

Two Weeks in London

The programme for the entertainment of the students includes: Two weeks in London, seats from which to view the Coronation Procession, attendance at the Youth Empire Service in Westminster Abbey (the day following the Coronation), participation in a great rally of youth at the Albert Hall, guests in some of the finest residential (private) schools of England for a week or longer and, possibly, a motor trip through England and Scotland.

The students selected must be over fourteen years of age and must not be over nineteen years of age, and should be chosen for all round qualities and not merely for scholarship, but their class-standing should be such that their absence from school during the months of May and June will not interfere with their grading.

Each student will have to pay his or her own expenses. At present the estimated cost to each student is two hundred dollars (\$200) from Montreal and return, subject to a small increase should it be decided to give the students a motor or train tour of England and Scotland. Perhaps it might be possible to interest local organizations in helping to defray the expenses of the student or students chosen to represent your school.

Fourteen students and fourteen only can be selected from the entire province. Thus it may be necessary to divide the province into units so that there may be proper geographical representation and a proper proportion of English and French students.

Divorce Evil and Need for Spiritual Awakening Discussed

At St. Dunstan's church yesterday morning Rev. Dr. J. H. Milligan in the course of an eloquent sermon touched upon the divorce evil. Rev. Dr. Milligan stated that the Catholic Church had always down through the ages consistently opposed divorce. He said that no power on earth could put asunder the bonds of wedlock where the couple were proper and legally joined together in holy matrimony. There was too much tendency to look lightly upon the marriage vows, and these and other evils were predominating in the world today. We should all pray that people will get back to Christianity and to the simple religious life. It was up to those people in high places to be an example to those in the community.

At the Wilmet Church yesterday in the course of his sermon, Rev. J. W. Bartlett stated that the trouble which we were going through during the past couple of weeks emphasized the fact that the nation and the people of the nation needed a spiritual and moral awakening. The monarch, who recently abdicated, had been extremely popular but he had been subject to considerable criticism by his subjects. This criticism was also made by church authorities. It would be well for those people who had criticized the monarch to take stock of their own shortcomings and see that their skirts were clean. The church as the custodian of moral and spiritual affairs had a perfect right to criticize and to point out the way, the truth and the light. Rev. Mr. Bartlett believed there was too much drifting away from God in the world today.

NEW RECTOR IS APPOINTED TO PARISH CHURCH

Rev. Spencer Cyril Gray, Rector at Woodstock, Comes Here

Succeeds Archdeacon

Formerly Preached at Stanley, Burton and Mauderville

Rev. Spencer Cyril Gray, who is at present the rector of Woodstock has been appointed the new rector of Christchurch Parish church, to succeed Ven. Archdeacon A. F. Bate, now rector of St. Paul's (Valley) church at Saint John.

Announcement of Rev. Mr. Gray's appointment was made by Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton, at the evening service of the Parish church on Sunday. Rev. Mr. Gray was born in England and was ordained in the diocese of Qu'Appelle in 1913. He was missionary in charge at Yellow Grass, Sask., from 1914 to 1916 and served as curate of St. Peter's church in the diocese of Qu'Appelle from 1913 to 1914.

Rev. Mr. Gray became rector of McLeod, Alta., in 1916 and served that parish until the spring of 1919, when he came to the diocese of Fredericton and was appointed to the mission of Burton and Mauderville. He served until the fall of 1924, when he became rector of Stanley. He was chosen rector of Woodstock in January, 1926.

Rev. Mr. Gray comes here with a fine record of service. The date when he will take over his duties as rector of the Parish church here is not yet known.
