Confederation Has Effected Education and Social
Advancement in the Maritimes, Says
Minister of Education

In an excellent address to the graduates of the Provincial Normal School Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education, said:

About two thousand years ago a wise man said that education of youth is the foundation of a nation and we may add that adult education is a nation's superstructure. New Brunswick may be termed a nation, which, with certain other British North American nations or provinces arranged a Confederation for mutual advantage and named it Canada.

This confederation or compact named Canada has indirectly retarded education and general social advancement in the Maritime British countries connected with it, primarily due to the fact that its legislature and

pire (New Brunswick) which belongs to us and which is "our own, our native land" from any misuse of Canada's authority.

The Department of Education with the approval of the Government, as its first official action, will furnish free text books for Grades I to IV inclusive, also furnish free, such text-books for Grade V as are not to be discarded. The furnishing of free text books for those grades have been approved by the department.

Instructions regarding free text books will be provided for the teachers. It is the intention to provide as quickly as possible a school history of our own country, New Brunswick, also a correct history of the governmental institution named Canada from the period of its incorporation.

In the meantime the use of Weaver's "History of Canada" so-called, will be continued, but teachers will be furnished with information and instructions regarding its use. The use of Bourinot's "How Canada is Governed" will be discontinued.

It is our duty as British subjects to protect this part of the British Empire.
