MANUFACTURER URGES FARMERS INCREASE STOCK

Opportunity Coupled With Effort Will Spell Success

AMHERST, N. S., Nov. 9—The farmers of the Maritime provinces were urged on Saturday by J. A. Forbes, manager of Swift Can. Co. to increase production and a better grade of same. "Grow more, grow better" was the message conveyed to livestock breeders of the Maritime provinces at their annual banquet here on Saturday night, in connection with the Maritime Winter Fair, which will continue until Thursday.

Mr. Ford urged more intensive farming throughout the Maritime provinces, particularly in livestock breeding. He said his plant had difficulties at times in securing sufficient livestock, and he stated that a demand could be established for well-finished Maritime beef.

He also remarked that while Maritime lambs had been shipped into Moncton in quantity as well as quality, there was a dearth of well-finished bacon hogs. He explained that the Moncton plant also utilized poultry, eggs and butterfat. He informed the 80 stock men present that his plant

Has Firing Ceased?

ON WEDNESDAY next, Remembrance Day, the nation will keep a solemn memorial for its soldier dead. In the midst of this memorial we see the world shaken with rumors of war and the piling up of armaments. The war, the close of which we celebrate on Wednesday, was a war to end wars, and it has been followed by the menace of a far greater war with much more death dealing appliances being manufactured with an ingenuity worthy of the devil. The next war, when it comes, will be a war which may end civilization and wipe out humanity.

Dr. Nicholas Murray estimates that

The World War, all told cost—apart from 30,000,000 lives—\$400,000,000. With that money we could have built a \$2,500 house, furnished it with \$1,000 worth of furniture, placed it on five acres of land worth \$100 an acre and given this home to each and every family in England, United States, Canada, Australia, Wales, Ireland, Scotland, France, Belgium, Germany and Russia. We could have given to each city of 20,000 inhabitants and over, in each country named, a \$5,000,000 library and a \$10,000,000 university. Out of what was left we could have set aside a sum at 5 per cent. that would provide a \$1,000 yearly salary for an army of 125,000 teachers and a like salary for another army of 125,000 nurses.

Such is the terrible havoc wrought by war; all losses and no gains.

On November 11, 1918, many a prayer of thanks went up from the hearts of mothers, sisters and sweethearts, and also from many a manly heart, that the war was over. The men themselves, who had in some cases borne four years of hell, how must they have felt. "Stormed at with shot and shell, bravely they fought and well." But it was all over and they were coming home to mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts. But not all—alas, not all! Some of the bravest and best of the youth which Fredericton and York County ever produced were not coming home. They were sleeping their last sleep on the fields of France and Flanders. They fought the good fight. They kept the faith.

Many a mother in this city and throughout the counties of York and Sunbury have looked out of the window at night as the moon was shining and wondered if the same moon was shining over Flanders Fields, where her boy lies buried. She has thought of his babyhood, when he knelt by her side, of the first morning when he started for school with his small slate and little book, and of the proud smile that she gave him when he walked away. Then she thought of the day that he marched out of the Old Barracks Square on Queen street. The band was playing and the crowds at the C.N.R. station were cheering. But her heart was heavy. Then came the day when the word flashed across the sea and a yellow slip of paper "Killed in action," like letters of fire, was brought to her home. Her boy was not coming home with the others. In more than one home in Fredericton a mother had two sons, who each gave their lives for the Empire and that future peace might prevail in the world.

Unless this war was a "war to end war," as so well expressed by a beloved padre of our Canadian troops, Canon Scott, the whole thing now seems to have been in vain. But if from this war where so many of our men lost their lives or their health we will take a lesson and will be able eventually to have peace, the men who sleep in Flanders Fields will not have died in vain.

The time is here now when the mothers, wives, sisters and sweethearts of our boys should join as a unit and work for future peace. The grafters and the munitions builders who seem to be able to control even governments, are doing their utmost to bring about another war. They care not how many nations spring at each other's throats. They care not how many men and boys are blown to pieces at the cannon's mouth, so long as they are able to sell their damnable munitions of war. There should be a free press and one which is unafraid of governments, grafters or munitions workers—which press, instead of playing up wars and rumors of wars, should expose the grafters and all the evils that lead up to war. Then let the clergy work for peace and the educationists of our country join in the work, instead of promoting university drill corps.

MARRIAGES DECLINE DESPITE IL DUCE'S PLEAS

Tax on Bachelors Fails to Have Desired Effect

ROME, Nov. 9—Marriages are sharply on the decline in Italy, despite Il Duce's campaign for larger families, despite the many facilities for married couples, government wedding gifts, money subsidies for large families, an incessant propaganda and a comparatively large tax on bachelors.

Marriages in 1935, according to figures just published, are appreciably below those of 1934, and a wall for more and earlier marriages is echoing throughout the land from officials and editorial writers.

Since Fascism came into power in 1922, marriages have decreased 30 per cent in proportion to population, in spite of Il Duce's sincere and earnest campaign.

No Trace Has Yet Been Found of Cordon Bull

WOODSTOCK, Nov. 9—Despite efforts of a large search party, no trace of Cordon P. Bull, Lower Woodstock farmer, missing since last Tuesday, was found over the week-end. The hunt will be continued tomorrow. Sheriff A. R. Foster, who is directing the search, announced, but with a smaller number of workers.

A large squad was on the job Saturday and Sunday, but their efforts were useless. The search reached its climax today, when more than 100 men combed the vicinity. The search was a systematic one, the party covering not only the area near the missing man's home but extending their efforts to ground not searched previously. Another search of the buildings and farm property was made, the workers even taking the hay from the barns and probing the banking round the house. Further reports that the missing man had been seen in various sections of the county were investigated but without any new information being gained. Little hope is now entertained of finding the man alive.

Spanish Gov't Not Constitutional One Fighting For its Life

It is a Question of a People Fighting to Eject Communism

Directed and Financed by Russia

Leading Authorities in England Explain the Situation

SPAIN'S CAPITAL IS SHELLED BY INSURGENTS

Street Fighting -- Many Killed and Much Destruction

MADRID, Nov. 9—Insurgent headquarters officially announced last night their troops had entered Madrid proper and were fighting in the streets. Insurgent headquarters said their troops had penetrated Madrid from the west bank of the Manzanares River and had crossed over on the Princessa and the Segovia bridges. Government forces were reported to be pouring hot oil from the roof tops. Women, the fascists said, were sniping at the invading troops side by side with their menfolk on the balconies of Madrid houses.

Insurgent airplanes bombed Madrid early yesterday morning following aerial and artillery bombardments of the capital yesterday in which it was semi-officially estimated 30 were killed and 170 wounded.

Unofficially it was estimated nearly 200 were killed in the Sunday aerial bombardment.

LONDON, Nov. 9—The Spanish situation which is causing much confusion amongst many well meaning people and which has been discussed in various parts of the press overseas, is not a question of a constitutional government fighting for its life but of a people striving to eject Communism directed and financed by Russia. There is no such a thing today as a constitutional government in Spain.

In "Information: a Guide to Current Politics," issued weekly by the Anti-Socialist Union, 59 Victoria St., London SW, England, and edited by D. M. Sutherland, late editor of the Pall Mall Gazette, the following paragraph appears:

"Sir Francis Lindley, a former English Ambassador to Portugal, wrote to the London 'Times' on August 22nd, and said: 'Moscow agents have for years been preparing heavy civil war in Spain.'"

Ever since the fall of the monarchy in 1931, one of the chief aims of the Communist International of Moscow has been to make of Spain a Bolshevik country. (The programme of this organization is to promote revolution in all countries). "Spain is next in order" wrote Trotsky at that time and his prophecy had proven true. A series of weak and unstable governments allowed themselves to be dominated by revolutionary elements inspired and financed by Moscow. The success of the Communists last year in forming a United Front of all the revolutionary groups provided them with the large forces required for the present struggle. The immediate effect of this union of forces was to put the country at the mercy of three million (Continued on Page Four)

CAPE COD CRANBERRY CROP IS WORTH \$5,000,000 THIS YEAR

WOODS HOLE, Nov. 9—Although below average crops have been reported in many parts of the Cape, the cranberry industry on Cape Cod this year will realize a revenue of more than \$5,000,000,000, according to a statement here by Gordon Mann of Bryantville, well known cranberry expert.

"Consumption of cranberries is no longer confined to the Thanksgiving and Christmas seasons," Mann declared. "Modern canning and packing methods make the popular fruit available in several forms the year around and extend the market to all parts of the world."

He said that canning of cranberries has given the industry a new lease on the markets. He estimated that 10 per cent of Cape Cod's cranberry yield will go into cans as cranberry sauce this year, and that five or six carloads of the canned berries will leave the Cape daily during the height of the canning season.

Insurgents Continuing Attack on Madrid

LONDON, Nov. 9—The Insurgent attack on Madrid is being continued. Heavy bombing and the use of planes, shells, and hand-to-hand fighting are in progress, in their mad attempt on the part of the rebels to capture the city. All advances are being met and driven back. Government reports claim, by machine guns and rifles. The rebel army claims to have broken the government lines in several places although this report is not authentic. The damage so far is not as great as had been expected. The Spanish Ambassador in London was in touch with Madrid at 4 o'clock this afternoon and he reported that the city was calm. He said that the government forces are still holding to their posts. He stated that 15,000 Moors were the most effective warriors that the insurgents have and reports from government headquarters at Valencia state that quite a lot of co-operation is being received by the government by different points of Spain.
