**Devon Pastor Comments**

on the Spanish War  
At St. Anthony's church last evening Rev. Walter Donahoe, the pastor, delivered an interesting lecture on the Spanish situation, pointing out that the question was not one of a constitutional government fighting for its life, but of a people fighting against the present rulers in an endeavour to eject a Communism which was directed and financed by Russia. He stated that there was no such thing as a constitutional government in Spain today.

Father Donahoe told of the visits at the present time to upper Canadian cities of emissaries of the Madrid government, at the head of which was Largo Caballero, leader of the Spanish Communists and known as "The Lenin of Spain." Included in the party is a suspended Spanish priest who is incapable of exercising any of the functions of the Church. He stated that the cause for which the rebel army was fighting was a war against the war which is being waged against Christianity. General Franco's army was not strictly Fascist, but strongly representative of popular vote cast the last February election. The cause of the Spanish government was motivated by Bolshevik Russia and other Communistic influences.

Referring to the packing business, he said the Maritimes were not producing enough foodstuffs, and commented on the tremendous quantity of meats brought into these provinces for Upper Canada. In the same connection he pointed out that last year only 7,000 head of cattle had been slaughtered at the Moncton plant—far below the capacity of the abattoir.

He added that Maritime beef, on the whole, was far from being a finished product.

A vote of thanks to Mr. Ford was moved by Rev. Hugh MacPherson, of St. Francis Xavier University, Antigonish, and seconded by Lorne Logan of Sussex.

In 1922 there were 9.6 for each thousand inhabitants and have declined steadily since. The number fell to 8.7 in 1923, to 7.9 in 1924, to 7.6 in 1925. In 1923 they were down to 6.9, in 1924 upped to 7.4 and in 1925 fell to the low point of 6.7.

Figures show other European countries have better percentages, France with 6.8, Germany with 9.7, Poland with 8.3, Great Britain with 8.6.

Particularly tragic is the fact, editorial writers point out, that the marriage percentages are lowest in southern districts of Italy, where families have always been larger.

A number of reasons are advanced to account for the disturbing decline in marriages.

One is the more advanced age at which the Italian man decides to get married. This in turn produces fewer children because the brides are older, too.

Another is the increase in college graduates. They won't marry unless they have an income twice that sufficient for a workman or a farmer to get married on.

## PUPILS GRADE 8 CHARLOTTE ST. SCHOOL DEBATE

## Judges Compliment the Speakers and Their Principal

The affirmative won the decision in an interesting debate which took place this morning at Charlotte St. School, by Grade Grade VIII, under the sponsorship of the principal, R. K. Nevers. The subject of the debate was "To Be Resolved that Boys and Girls Should be Compelled to go to School until They are 16 Years of Age." The affirmative was taken by Louise Hanson, Kathleen McKnight and Evelyn Duncan while the negative was argued by Jeanne Nevers, captain, Jack Veness and Arthur F. Sewell, and all did well.

The judges were Dr. A. S. MacFarlane, Superintendent of Education, Vrey Rev. Dr. W. H. Moorhead and W. G. Quinn.

Dr. MacFarlane in announcing the decision of the judges congratulated the youthful speakers and their principal on the manner with which they had dealt with this topic and the beneficial effect of school debating. He expressed the opinion that at least one of the members of the debating team, Arthur F. Sewell, showed special talent for public speaking and would no doubt be heard from public platforms in the near future.

Mr. Sewell argued in the negative from the viewpoint of the individual talent, its development and the opportunities available to all today in view of Adult Education.

Prior to the debate a period of visual education was held, a picture stressing "The Care of the Teeth" being shown, the operator of the machine being John McNair. Several visitors were present.
