### FIRE SUNDAY MORNING

### SAYS IT'S AN EXAGGERATION

One of York county's veteran guides corrected an impression which has been going on for a long time among game hunters while in conversation with a reporter of The Daily Mail this morning. That deer have been shot in the province weighing 300 pounds is an exaggeration. Not one in a thousand hunters ever get a deer that weighs that much. A deer weighing 100 pounds is a good-sized deer and one that dresses at 150 pounds is very unusual, the guide states. Some years ago a deer weighing 196 pounds was shot on the Tobique and this is believed to be the record sized deer.

### NO ACTION MCADAM DEATH

Deputy Attorney-General J. Bacon Dickson, had nothing to say today regarding the circumstances surrounding the shooting of Trueman Boone, 23-year-old McAdam hunter. It is understood no action will be taken by Mr. Dickson's department, and Dr. R. M. McLean, coroner, has already decided that an inquest is unnecessary. Boone was fatally shot on Friday last while hunting at Mink Lake, nine miles from McAdam. According to the R.C.M.P. who investigated, the shot was fired by Arthur Heron, who was a member of the party of McAdam hunters. The victim, Trueman Boone, was buried yesterday from the home of his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter H. Boone, at McAdam.

### Reports Presented

The Fredericton Presbytery of the United Church of Canada which convened at the Fraser Memorial Hall this morning unanimously adopted the report of the committee regarding the government sale of liquor, recommending that the Presbytery ask the government to give the public a full report of the business conducted by the Liquor Control Board.

## UNIFORMITY OF CANADIAN LAWS THROUGH CANADA

Home From Ottawa

### Want Uniform Act

Committees Will Make  
Recommendations to  
Various Gov'ts.

J. Bacon Dickson, deputy attorney general for the province of New Brunswick, returned yesterday from Ottawa where he represented this province at a conference of representatives from the provinces and the Dominion regarding uniformity of laws in Canada.

At a meeting held in December, 1935, a resolution was passed to the effect that the secretary of state call a meeting of delegates from the Dominions and the provinces for the purpose of endeavoring to bring into effect a uniform act throughout Canada on companies. This committee started deliberations on November 3 and continued to Saturday November 7. All the provinces were represented except British Columbia. Mr. Dickson told The Daily Mail today.

A committee was organized with Hon. Ferdinand Rinfret, Secretary of State, as honorary president; and W. P. J. O'Meara, assistant Under-Secretary of State, secretary.

The provisions of the Dominion Companies Act were considered by the committee of the whole and special committees were appointed to deal with various phases of the Act, such committees to report to the committee of the whole to again convene at the call of the chair, probably in June.

The provisions respecting prospectus were considered in detail and recommendations will be made to the various governments. It was also decided that the secretary should call a meeting of the various officials administering the Sales of Securities Act throughout Canada at an early date, probably in January for the purpose of exchanging ideas as to the administration of various acts and endeavoring to have uniformity in administration.

Deputy Attorney Dickson is on the committee respecting Returns and Forms to be submitted by the companies.

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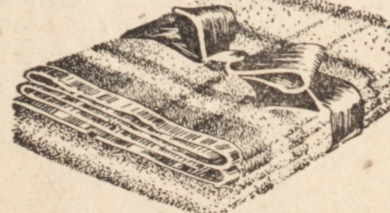
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## APPEAL COURT OPENING SET OVER UNTIL THURSDAY

Delays Opening

### Eminent Business Man

Court Had Planned to  
Adjourn Tuesday For  
Remembrance Day

The New Brunswick Supreme court Appellate Division, which was scheduled to commence its November sitting here tomorrow, has postponed commencement of the new docket of cases until Thursday morning at 10.30 o'clock.

The reason for the postponement is the death of John Davidson Grimmer, a brother of Mr. Justice W. C. H. Grimmer of Saint John, one of the judges of the Supreme Court, who would have sat with Chief Justice Baxter and Mr. Justice Harrison here tomorrow morning. The funeral of the late Mr. Grimmer is taking place tomorrow afternoon at Chamcook, Charlotte count y at 2.30 o'clock. Deceased who was one of the province's prominent residents was 84 years of age.

The November docket, comprising eleven cases, was planned to be taken up tomorrow, and because of Remembrance Day falling on Wednesday, to be adjourned until Thursday. The death of the Brother of Mr. Justice Grimmer as well as Remembrance Day, has caused the opening of the court to be set over for two days.
