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## BISHOP TO MAKE OFFICIAL VISIT TO FREDERICTON

Rt. Rev. P. A. Bray to Officiate in First Catholic Cathedral in N. B.

### Confirmation Class

Will Also Visit Devon and Stanley While Here

Rt. Rev. P. A. Bray, Roman Catholic Bishop of the Diocese of Saint John, is expected to arrive here this evening and will hold confirmation services at St. Dunstan's Church tomorrow morning at eight o'clock when fifty children will be confirmed. On Sunday morning the Bishop will confirm sixty candidates at St. Anthony's Church, Devon. The service at St. Anthony's will consist of a solemn entry and procession into the church at ten o'clock. This will be followed by Solemn High Mass at which several priests will assist. In the afternoon the Bishop and the attendant clergy will drive to Stanley where forty or fifty children will be confirmed at three o'clock. Returning to Devon, Bishop Bray will have dinner as the guest of Rev. Walter Donahoe, parish priest.

In coming to Fredericton, Bishop Bray will be coming to the church which was the first Roman Catholic Cathedral in New Brunswick. The first Bishop of New Brunswick, Rt. Rev. William Dollard is buried under the altar of St. Dunstan's church and a tablet to his memory is on the wall of the church. Bishop Dollard was appointed in the late forties and later removed to Saint John. The Diocese was afterwards divided with Saint John as head of Saint John Diocese and Bathurst head of the north shore diocese. Some years later the See of the North Shore Diocese was moved to Chatham. Under a new arrangement, a redistribution has been made and a new archdiocese created with Moncton as the See. This archdiocese will embrace the counties of Westmorland, Albert and Kent. These counties being taken off the Saint John diocese. The (Continued on Page Five)

## PROGRESS MADE RE ABATTOIR FOR YORK CO.

Members General Committee Met With Minister of Agriculture

### Satisfied With Plans

Ottawa Will Contribute 30 Per Cent For Cold Storage

Members of the general committee for the establishment of an abattoir and cold storage plant in this county this morning met Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, and discussed plans which will facilitate the early erection of the abattoir.

As a result of the conference, Hon. Mr. Taylor promised the committee he would discuss the matter with the provincial government. He expressed himself as being satisfied with the scheme. It is hoped that members of the committee and sponsors of the establishment of such abattoir will be able to go to Ottawa within a short time.

Those present at the conference this morning besides the minister of agriculture, were Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., attorney-general, and chairman of the committee, Warden Howard Cameron, representing York county; Ald. W. Raymond Crouseville, representing the city of Fredericton, Peter Nugard, one of the sponsors, Kenneth Campbell, architect, and J. K. King, deputy minister of agriculture.

The Federal department of agriculture, it is understood, will contribute thirty per cent for cold storage, but must have a complete set of plans for the building submitted before taking any action. It is with this in mind that the general committee will set to work at one preparing plans to be submitted to the Federal authorities at an early date.

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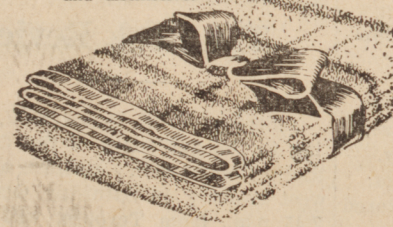
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
