THREE DOUBLE PRIZE WINNERS AS FREDERICTON HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATES TOTAL OF 104 TONIGHT

John Duffie, Miss Edith Claydon, of This City, and Miss Ruby Grieve of Harvey, High Students — Rev. Dr. Ross to Deliver Address to Graduating Class—Walter M. Smith, Valedictorian.

Fredericton school will end its academic year this evening, when 104 students will be graduated at the special closing exercises to be held in the auditorium of the school. The total number of graduates is only three less than last year.

In the long list of prize winners there are three double winners. These are John Duffie of this city who wins the Governor-General's silver medal for English and a prize of \$5 for the highest standing in French class of 1935; Miss Ruby Grieve of Harvey, who wins the Dr. Coulthard Memorial Medal for Science, and the McMurray prize for highest standing in Grade Eleven; and Miss Edith Claydon, of this city who is the winner of the Class of 1935 Vocational prize for highest standing in Mathematics and Literature, and the Vocational Committee's prize for class leader of Grade Eleven.

Of the total graduates, there are 58 in classical course; 15 in partial classical; 9 in the English course; 13 in Commercial; and 9 in Industrial and Home Economics Department.

A fine programme has been arranged for the closing exercises this evening, commencing at 7.30 o'clock. The programme will include an address by the chairman of the board of school trustees, Dr. G. C. Van Wart, the address to the graduating class by Rev. Dr. G. E. Ross, and the valedictory delivered by Walter M. Smith.

FREDERICTON CITIZEN RECALLS C.P.R. INCIDENT

S. H. McFarlane Was at Ottawa on Arrival of Transcontinental

Enthusiastic Reception

Political Meetings at the Time, Many Leaders Present

In the published account of the first through train to the Pacific Coast by the Canadian Pacific Railway, mention is made of the reception given by the citizens of Ottawa on the arrival of this first transcontinental train that left Montreal fifty years ago today.

Farther down in the article it is said that, "In the wake of this triumphant train came the Prime Minister, Sir John A. Macdonald and Lady Macdonald, to travel by special train over the steel highway, leaving Ottawa on July 8, 1816."

Their reception throughout the west was marked by enthusiasm that even surpassed the reception given to the initial train that had preceded him.

Lionized as the Prime Minister was in the west his reception in August when he and Lady Macdonald arrived in Ottawa on the completion of their trip, surpassed all previous records for it was a veritable blaze of glory. The Prime Minister was cheered to the echo and cheered again by the citizens of the Capital City.

A Fredericton citizen, S. H. McFarlane, recalls being in Ottawa at that time and a witness to the demonstration accorded this party on
