## Submarine

(Continued from Page One)

was declared unlikely that the submarines would proceed within the three-mile limit.

At Malta all shore leaves were cancelled and it was reported the battleship Barham was getting up steam to put out for Spain. A flotilla of destroyers will sail tomorrow to relieve vessels now in Spanish waters, and the cruiser Galatea will replace the cruiser Arethusa at Mallorca.

The naval activity followed Foreign Secretary Eden's announcement in the House of Commons that Britain would tolerate no interference with her shipping on the high seas. The Spanish insurgents have threatened to blockade the port of Barcelona, allegedly, the source of Spanish government supplies.

'French Stand'

In Paris, the government issued a statement saying "the French government will permit no halting, visiting or seizure of either of the two Spanish fleets, having recognized neither party as a belligerent."

In University City, northwest of Madrid, insurgent troops were reported firing at each other in a quarrel over whether to surrender to a government contingent of "Internationalists" which had surrounded them.

An insurgent attempt to enter the city proper was repulsed by government troops.

The British fleet movements were announced but a short time after informed sources said the Spanish insurgents in an official message guaranteed safe anchorage to neutral shipping in many Spanish ports, but omitted Barcelona which General Francisco Franco has threatened to destroy.

British Ambassador Sir Henry Chilton, in two inquiries to General Franco, asked specifically that neutral vessels be granted "safety zones" in Barcelona harbor.

## VISITING TEAM WINS DEBATE LAST EVENING

### U. N. B. Loses to Saint John Law School

The decision was given the affirmative in the debate which took place last evening in the auditorium of the Provincial Normal School between the University of New Brunswick and the Saint John Law School. The latter upheld the affirmative in the resolution, "Resolved that in the light of present conditions, Canada should increase her armaments."

The Saint John debaters were Donald Duffie and Jas. McBrien. The U.N.B. debaters who argued the negative were Horace Block and Byron Fisher.

William Gibson was in the chair, and in following introductory remarks welcomed the visiting debaters to this city, hoping that such debates would tend to unify the two branches of the University.

Opening the debate, Mr. Duffie recalled his High School days of eight years ago when in fear and trembling he had made his first speech. The speaker argued his point from the view that Canada should increase armaments for security, protection of life and law and control of ports and Canadian waters. Canada should do her share, not accept her portion as part of commonwealth without contributing. He quoted "Canada is at present actually increasing her armaments" this with the approval of great statesmen.

Horace Block, first speaker on the negative side stressed many constructive points. He claimed that the role of Canada now should be the development of her potential wealth and create industries. Canada was in no danger of invasion and the money which would be spent for arms if used for promoting industry would keep 100 per cent of the people working and would provide raw material and then would be prepared to do her part in helping the Empire in case of war.

Mr. MacBrien supported the affirmative, noting the present actual increase and plans on the part of the government for further outlay in arms. He did not deem it possible to train an army in a short time, Canada should increase her force in a manner which would lead any nation to think twice before attempting to attack her.

Byron Fisher U.N.B. supporter of the negative believed every nation owed it to itself to take advantage of its own position in deciding its policy. England had done this in refusing to sign the German protocol. Canada was the only nation in the commonwealth which did not require arming for self protection. In event of war he showed how Canada could help the Empire.

There was a strong feeling of America for the nations of America somewhat in the nature of a Monroe doctrine. Extra taxation resulting from increased armament might cause dissension in the Dominion. The decision rendered by the audience ballooned in favor of the affirmative.
