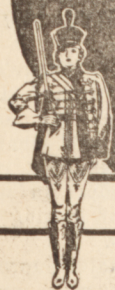

His Excellency Most Rev. P. A.
Bray, C.J.H., Bishop of Saint John,
members of the clergy, government
officials, graduates, students and
friends united yesterday to honor Rev.
Dr. Louis Guertin, C.S.C., who cele-
brated the golden jubilee of religious
profession and professorship at St.
Joseph's University. It was a magnif-
icent tribute to a man who has led a
long life of sacrifice to instill Chris-
tian principles into the minds of youth.
Speaker after speaker praised his
noble life and wished him many more
years of happiness. More than 200
guests assembled to honor the jubilee
and telegrams and letters of
congratulation poured in. The jubilee
