U.N.B. LEVY SAME

MENTION MADE OF AMALGAMATION OF OUR LIBRARIES

Provincial Library and Historic Museum May Be Combined

Constructive Criticism

Purchasing Committee of Library Sees Need of Saving Newspapers

The purchasing committee of the Legislative Library met this morning in the library. Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., Attorney General, was in the chair, and others present included the librarian, Miss Doreen Harper, Mrs. J. L. Neville and P. C. Robinson. The librarian reported the purchase through the year of a set of the fourteenth edition of the Encyclopedia Britannica. Considerable discussion took place as to further selection of books, the allotment being this year, \$200. One special number item now under consideration is the Smithsonian Encyclopedia. Discussion ensued re the placing of the daily local papers in the library for the use of its readers. It was also decided to give the preference to local merchants in the purchase of books when the purchasing price is similar to that of outside dealers.

In view of the fact that many priceless volumes are threatened with loss due to deteriorated binding, it was decided to put an outlay in the vicinity of \$50 as a start for rebinding.

The Board discussed at length the proper care of newspapers of the province from their beginning. A large number of these are now stored in the attic of the departmental buildings where they are threatened with destruction. The question was also discussed at length by the board as to what amount of money should be devoted to works of fiction, it being the consensus of opinion that where the legislative library is first of all a reference library that only such fiction as epic novels and such like should have a place on the shelves of the library. However, in view of the fact that in the near future there is a possibility of their being a museum in conjunction with a public library and with which it might be possible to amalgamate the present legislative library, that any good fiction now purchased would at length find a place in such library.

The members of the Board were taken through the library and shown the various improvements and changes that have taken place. The vault has recently been remodelled and has been provided with new steel shelving. Other improvements in the way of shelves have been added to the library.

Sessions F'ton's Diocesan Synod Here Oct. 27-28-29

The October sessions of the standing committee of the Fredericton diocesan synod of the Church of England will be held in Fredericton this year, the dates being October 27 and 28. The following day has been set for a clerical conference arranged by the committee on spiritual uplift. His Grace Most Rev. J. A. Richardson, Archbishop of Fredericton will preside at the conference and will be the celebrant at Holy Communion at 8 o'clock in Christchurch Cathedral. The special speaker for the occasion will be Rev. Canon W. H. Davison, rector of the Church of St. John the Evangelist, of Montreal. The themes of his two addresses will be "The Christian Doctrine of God—Its Expression in Worship and Devotion," and "The Priest as Pastor." The noon devotional paper at the conference will be given by Rev. E. Hailstone, rector of Christ Church, St. Stephen.

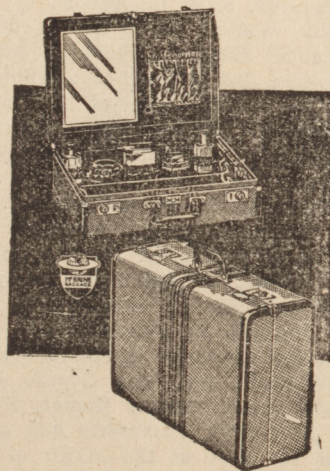
