## Penniac Hunters Shot Record Moose

### APPOINTMENTS RESIGNATIONS IN PROV. SERVICE

Francois X. LeBlanc of Buctouche Resigns as Kent Co. Magistrate

#### One Dismissal

Rideout, late of the parish of Peel in the county of Carleton, deceased, in the place of George Y. Jones, Judge of Probate for Carleton, who is interested as proctor in the said estate. ### COUSINS GET RECORD MOOSE PENNIAC AREA

Walter and Irvine Wade Bring Down First Moose of Season

#### 48-Inch Spread

Moose Reported Quite Plentiful in Woods Near Penniac

Walter and Irvine Wade cousins, of Penniac, were the lucky big game hunters on the opening day of the 1936 moose hunting season in New Brunswick. Yesterday morning at 8.30 o'clock they performed what might turn out to be the double feat of the season, that is, bagging the first moose of the season, and knocking over a record-sized one. The moose had 20 points and a 48-inch spread.

The Penniac cousins were "still" hunting in the woods about four miles from Penniac, when they heard the scraping of antlers on the trees. They shot together bringing the giant moose down with a crash. It is one of the largest moose shot in that section of the province for years.

Walter and Irvine Wade were guided yesterday by Wesley Whitlock. The cousins have a hunting camp of their own also; but yesterday were out together for a day's sport.

They report moose fairly plentiful in that section, and also at Little River, where Charlie Wade has a camp.

The moose shot at Penniac yesterday is believed to be the first one shot this season in New Brunswick.

Another successful early hunter is Joseph Meerchio, of New York City, who bagged a moose near Caribou Lake in the Miramichi district. He is the guest of McAleer Brothers, and was guided yesterday by Charles Easton.

### SPUD SHIPMENT VIA PORTLAND UNAVOIDABLE

Provincial Gov't Shipment to Argentine Goes Forward Tonight

Argument Over Ports  
Question Why Cargo Goes Via Maine Port is Unanswered

Commenting this morning on the provincial government's latest shipment of potatoes to the Argentine Republic, and why the shipment was made via Portland, Maine, instead of Saint John, N. B., G. C. Cunningham, chief potato investigator for the provincial department of agriculture, declared the reason to be an unavoidable one, and one over which there is no control.

The Argentine Republic has arranged to have the shipment through the Portland, Maine, port, and because of consumers' demands, and the element of time, the potatoes were shipped via Portland. In Mr. Cunningham's (Continued on Page Four)
