Amendments to Motor Vehicle Act of N. B.

(Continued from Page Eight)
The magistrate or peace officer making such third endorsement shall take from the driver his license and forward same, together with his report, to the registrar, who shall, upon receipt of same, make an order for suspension.

A change has been made in the definition of what a peace officer is. It will be enlarged to include a policeman of any incorporated village, the assistant motor vehicle inspector, and an engineer in the employ of the department, and also members of the R.C.M.P., a policeman of any city or town and the motor vehicle inspector, as at present. A provincial constable will be excluded from the category of a peace officer.

British West Indies Crying For Settlers

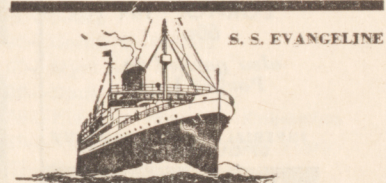

Europe, through the South African campaign and through the Great War, "and that is this—that our Dominions are sparsely populated, that they have great areas unsettled or only sparsely settled which it is the duty of all British people to see settled as soon as possible with Anglo-Saxon stock. It is to investigate the possibilities along that direction that our tours seem to have particular value to the Empire." Major General Duncan added that there were in the world many leading nations feeling the pinch of over-population that could be forgiven if they cast covetous eyes on the great areas in the British dominions, "simply crying" for development.

DELEGATIONS HEARD

Several delegations appeared before the provincial government here yesterday. One delegation consisted of members of the legislature and others from the counties in which fishing is a major industry. These sought a co-operative scheme between the provincial and federal governments to aid fishermen. Other delegations representing the banks, insurance companies, and chain stores who asked for amendments to the Corporation Tax Act, which would increase the taxation on extra-provincial corporations. F. T. B. Young, M. P. P., for Gloucester, was the chief spokesman for the fishing delegation. The delegation pointed out that thousands of dollars' loss in fishing gear was suffered by the commercial fishermen of the Miramichi Bay area and other sections of the North Shore in the past season.

BRANCH OF TREE FELL

A huge branch broke off a tree on Queen Street today in the vicinity of the C.N.R. Station and came down across an electric wire. The branch was suspended partly across the street and it was necessary for the local bus and other vehicles to take another route. No one was injured.

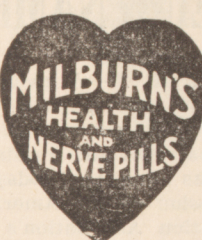

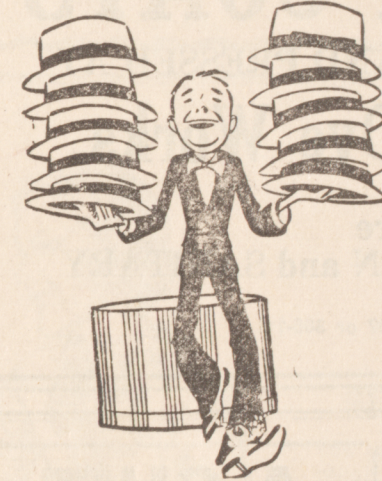
