### Miss Whitehead Died at Saint John

Many old Fredericton friends will regret to hear of the death of Miss Blanche Whitehead, which took place at the General Public Hospital at Saint John yesterday. Miss Whitehead had resided at Saint John for several years past, previous to which time she had made her home in Fredericton for a number of years.

Miss Blanche Whitehead was born at Dumfries, York County, a daughter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Wm. Whitehead. After completing her education in this province she went to Boston and for a number of years occupied the position of confidential secretary to the well-known Lee-Higginson bond brokerage firm of that city. Later she removed to Vancouver, B.C., where for several years she owned and conducted an extensive school in shorthand and stenography.

Returning to her native province in 1917, she was appointed by the provincial government and sworn in as official stenographer to the chancery and appellate divisions of the supreme court of New Brunswick, a position she occupied with splendid ability and efficiency until her death.

The deceased found time from her busy life to interest herself in a quiet but active manner in good works in the community in which she made her home. She was a valued member of the I.O.D.E. and a devoted worshipper at Trinity church, Saint John. She was also a member of the Riverside Golf and Country Club.

Surviving in the immediate family circle are three brothers, Wm. Whitehead, Boston; Alfred Whitehead, Vancouver; and Harry Arnold Whitehead, Salem, Mass.; and two sisters, Miss Maud Whitehead and Miss Eleanor M. Whitehead, both of Vancouver.

more impressed with the comradeship than with the food. He spoke feelingly of the British cemeteries, and said that the Vimy Memorial to Canada's dead defied description. As it was beheld in its reverent, awe-inspiring massive beauty there was that which brought tears to the eyes. He also spoke of his visit to Scotland and was evidently much interested in the many cathedrals and historic sites.

Abner Belyea spoke more especially of the Pilgrimage from the point of view of one returning to old scenes and associations. Mr. Belyea, being on the official staff of the pilgrimage, had extended opportunity to re-visit former billeting areas and scenes familiar to our Canadian soldiers. He spoke of the actual ceremony of the unveiling, and said that the presence of King Edward VIII made history there in many ways. Both speakers referred to the solemnity of the occasion so influencing the King as he addressed the great throng before the monument. Mr. Belyea also spoke of the great courtesy shown the Canadian pilgrims both in France and in England. He pointed out that the visit to France under the auspices of the pilgrimage gave a vastly different contact and impression to that received during the war.

Gerald W. Guio, pastor of the church, spoke briefly on the Young Adult Movement. There is, he said, in most places and churches a large group of older young people who, having passed through the boy and girl and young peoples' programme and Sunday school life of the churches are now frankly indifferent. This group represents those upon whom early maturity brings the sterner side of life, when youth's vision and romance subsides. Too long our educational systems have been bound by medieval theories of education in which childhood and early youth has been stressed almost exclusively as the period of learning. The programme of the church has been long hampered by this fallacy. A new word is giving new life and promise. "It is never too late to learn." Adult education is coming rapidly to the front. The Young Adult is in the educational spotlight, and the Young Adult Movement is the church's response to the awakening challenge of the day.

The pastor deplored the all too prevalent attitude of resignation to life's disillusionments on the part of so many young adults. Many of us "are dropping buckets into empty wells, and growing old in drawing nothing up." He urged the principles and prospects of the Movement as grounds for definite action. The church must not seek to "sell" its present programme to those evidently not interested in it, but make a definite gesture of understanding towards this group and offer all it has in order to serve the young adults in ways they themselves may deem of real interest and help.

He presented three questions for the group to consider.

1. Does the church, that is organized religion, have anything that can be of positive benefit and help to us to live more effectively?

2. Is there not some prospect of a congenial group of young adults helping one another to find the way to more meaningful living and to find the Christian solution to the many pressing issues of our day?

3. In critical days such as these are we content to just stay "around" while life's best years pass and youth's alluring dream fades?

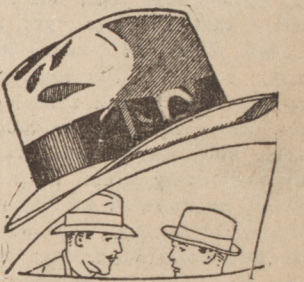
