### SUGGESTS STUDY CLUBS

W. K. Tibert, director of vocational training for the province, speaking on the "Farmer and the Community," yesterday at the Rotary Club, Margerville, stressed the fact that our farming communities had lost the great majority of the young people. In looking for the reason he intimated that the lack of modern improvements in many rural communities might have been a contributing factor. He stressed the need of improved conditions and the providing of means for the young people to improve their minds. He suggested that the organization of Study Clubs where young and old could get together to study worthwhile subjects would go far towards meeting the intellectual and social ambitions of young people. He sighted the improved financial and social conditions in Denmark and Nova Scotia which had been brought about through the Study Club movement.

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## LARGER BLDG. IS DESIRED FOR HIST. SOCIETY

Owing to Increase in Exhibits This Will Be Necessary

### Committee Named

Interesting Paper Read on Villebon at Fall Meeting

The first fall meeting of the York and Sunbury Historical Society, Limited, was held at the society's rooms in the post office building last evening. Mrs. J. Brown Maxwell, M.A., read an interesting paper on "De Villebon, A Soldier." The paper dealt with different phases of the career of Villebon, who was governor of Acadia and whose headquarters was at the Mouth of the Nashwaak, across the river from here. The paper was discussed by several members present.

The secretary of the society was requested to forward to the family of the late Dr. G. W. Bailey, the sympathy of the members. Rev. Dr. Wightman, the president, referred in feeling terms to the loss sustained to the society by Dr. Bailey's passing. He stated that Dr. Bailey was one of the founders of the society and had on more than one occasion read interesting papers before the society and during the time that he was on the executive, had been an active and valued member. The curator read a list of several donations that had been made to the society during the past summer. This list has already been published in the Daily Mail. One interesting donation, however, which has not yet been referred to, was the donation made by G. W. Bartlett, Waterloo Row. It was photostatic copies of letters written by members of the O'Dell family, who are amongst the first settlers of Fredericton. The store books of Benjamin Atherton who had a store here in 1765, before the Loyalists came and continued on down through that century were presented to the society recently by Miss Minnie Smith, of Coronado, Calif. Miss Smith is a descendant of the Atherton family, and presented other articles, including a small bible that was used by Benjamin Atherton. The museum of this society now contains more than 2,000 exhibits, and is steadily growing.

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## FIRST PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION WAS HELD IN 1827

Held in Fredericton Under Patronage of Sir Howard Douglas

### Officers in Charge

Provincial Agricultural Societies Were Organized on Large Scale

According to archives recently discovered at Ottawa by R. P. Gorham, B.Sc.A., the first provincial exhibition to be held in Fredericton was held on October 8, 1827 and not in 1852 as has been understood for some years. The first exhibition was under the patronage of Sir Howard Douglas, who was at the time Lieutenant-Governor of New Brunswick. Sir Howard Douglas came from Saint John where he was spending some time and opened the exhibition. In addition to the information contained in the archives at Ottawa, the Miramichi Mercury, a newspaper published on the sixteen of October, 1827, gave a good account of the exhibition. Prizes were given running from two pounds sterling to ten pounds sterling in different lines, including such things as the best woolen quilt, bed spread, men's woolen wear, etc. A ten-pound prize was given to the farmer raising the best dairy butter on his farm between the first of May and the first of November in that year. A ten-pound prize was also given to encourage the planting of apple trees in the province.

For some years previous to this exhibition, agricultural societies existed throughout the province. In 1827, however, a movement was made to organize a general provincial agricultural society and this was done in the early part of that year. The officers of this society included Governor Carleton as patron. The chief justice was president, Judge Botsford of Westmorland county and Hon. Thomas Baillie, Fredericton, were vice-presidents. S. D. Street was treasurer and George L. Street was secretary. The members of the ex-

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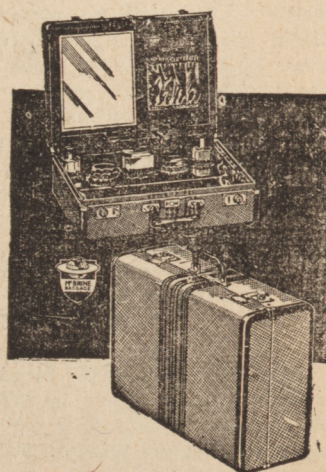
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
