of their constituency to the capital, were kept on the jump during the recent session, receiving and entertaining numerous delegations and looking after matters of concern to the people whom they represent. Mr. Smith made his headquarters at the Waverly Hotel, where he received delegations almost daily. The heavy ice freshet in March carried out no less than four bridges in his home parish of Blissville, but he lost no time in getting in touch with the Department of Public Works, and was able to have repairs made with the least possible delay. The deluge at Manguerville and Sheffield also brought prompt action from the representatives for Sunbury, and they are hopeful of averting a lot of trouble for the people in that section in the future by having a retaining wall constructed and the highway from Upper Manguerville to McGowan's given a hard surface. A proposal to raise the main highway over the Oromocto flats, to make the use of a ferry unnecessary during the spring freshets, has been discussed for a number of years, but those with a knowledge of conditions say that if it were done a great volume of water would be diverted to the Manguerville side of the river, so that the cure would be worse than the disease. It is a serious engineering problem and no action is likely to be taken during the present year.

M. R. Smith is a younger brother of the late Robert B. Smith of Oromocto who worthily represented Sunbury in the Legislature for a number of years, and in conversation with The Daily Mail recently he expressed the hope that he would be able to serve the people as faithfully and efficiently as did his highly esteemed brother.

HYDRO LINE COMPLETED
Hydro extension work to New Maryland, Oromocto and other rural districts, which has been carried on for the past several weeks is due to be completed this week it was stated in official circles here today. The work is being done by the N. B. Hydro Commission in conjunction with the Maritime Electric Co. 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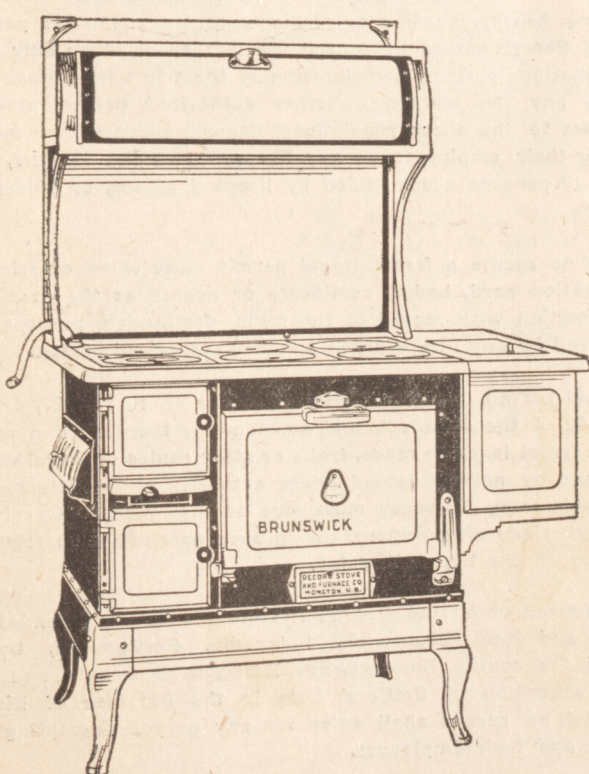
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
