WATER TOOK SHARP RISE

The Saint John river level has taken a sharp rise since Tuesday it was reported from the pumping station this morning. The rise was three feet and two inches. The cause of the sudden rise in the water is the heavy rain of the past few days along the river valley. There has been a great flow of pulpwood past the city during yesterday and today, the rise in the water disposing of a large quantity of logs which had become stranded on the river banks.

INSTALL SPRINKLER SYSTEM

The water was shut off at the upper end of Queen street this morning for several hours, the cause being the renovations and enlargements being made to the underground pipes on York street, necessitated by the establishment of a sprinkler system in the sporting goods department of Jas. S. Neill & Sons. The pumping station assured up town business concerns that the water would be restored this afternoon. The work involves digging on York street and it is understood that the sprinkler system means the placement of ten miles of pipe.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT MEETS TODAY

Cabinet Members Here For Afternoon Session

No Delegations

Premier Dysart, Other Cabinet Heads Arrive

The provincial cabinet ministers gathered here today for an afternoon meeting of the government. Premier A. A. Dysart intimated this afternoon that there would be no night sitting and so far as he knew no delegations were scheduled to appear.

Out of town cabinet ministers who are here today for the meeting, besides the premier include Hon. A. P. Paterson, Minister of Education and Municipal Affairs, and president of the executive council; Hon. C. T. Richard, provincial secretary treasurer; and Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture. Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, Minister of Health and Labor, was expected to arrive some time this afternoon. Hon. W. S. Anderson, chairman of the N. B. Hydro Commission, is not expected to be present at today's meeting of the government.

Purebred Mares Sold at Large Auction Yesterday

The sixteen purebred mares which were imported to this province from the State of Ohio by the department of agriculture, were sold at public auction yesterday at the Dominion Experimental Station, with C. F. Bailey, superintendent of the station, acting as auctioneer. The mares sold were heavy draught animals, fourteen Percherons and two Belgians. The average price of the sale was \$408. The top price was \$590, being for a two-year-old Percheron. Close to five hundred were present at the sale, representing farmers from all over the province. Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, was present and made a few brief remarks prior to the sale, pointing out that this was

No Daylight Saving Time For Capital

It appears unlikely that Fredericton will be on Daylight Saving Time for the current summer. The city council, although they broached the subject earlier in the summer, have done nothing about it, and at their recent meetings entirely ignored discussion of it. The opinion in council circles is that the matter will not be discussed and that Daylight Saving Time will not be adopted this summer. Members of the city council held various opinions on the matter, and there was some mention of holding a plebiscite to find public opinion on the subject. This idea has been abandoned, it is believed, because of the expense which would be incurred. While there are many who would favor Daylight time for another year, there are others against it. The Fredericton Board of Trade has expressed itself as entirely in favor of Daylight Saving Time.

Whilst the citizens are divided on the matter and no plebiscite is being taken those opposed to Daylight Saving win out, and those in favour of it have no say in the matter.

FOLLOW LEADS IN DISAPPEARANCE OF LOCAL MAN

Police Investigate the Whereabouts of G. Eldon Merrithew

Coat Found on Water

Grappling in River is Planned by Search Party

Royal Canadian Mounted Police are today continuing their investigation in the mysterious disappearance of G. Eldon Merrithew of this city, who was last seen on Sunday afternoon when he procured a canoe at Atherton's Boat house and started out for a paddle on the river. When Mr. Merrithew left here on Sunday afternoon he took a light lunch with him and informed those at his home that he expected to return during the evening. He proceeded up to the mouth of the Nashwaakisis and that was the last that can be learned in regard to his whereabouts. Yesterday the canoe was found about thirty feet from the water lying on the river bank. It was afterwards learned that Garnet McGibbon fishery warden of the Douglas section of the river had found the canoe floating right side up in the Nashwaakisis river. According to the Mounted Police the canoe contained collar and tie and a blanket.

The canoe was identified by Bert Atherton of Atherton's boat house as one which he had loaned to Mr. Merrithew on Sunday afternoon. The
