Brewer said he went to a gypsy camp to have his fortune told and that Mrs. Miller stole the \$10 from him. Mrs. Miller, her husband and sister have been touring the country as gypsies.

FAIRLY COMFORTABLE

The condition of Hazel Sharp, 6 year-old daughter of Mrs. John Sharp of Bag River, N. S., was reported to be fairly comfortable at the Victoria Hospital today, although her condition was still regarded as serious. The child was struck by the automobile driven by Earl Urquhart at the intersection of Brunswick and Carleton streets yesterday at noon. The little Sharp girl was accompanied by her mother, and had left her mother and ran across the road in front of the advancing car. She suffered a fractured skull and a broken leg.

SIR EDWARD BEATTY URGES A BOYS' HOME

The possibility of the establishment of a boys' industrial home in New Brunswick, operated by a private concern of business men and welfare organizations is to be studied by the New Brunswick government according to intimation from Premier A. A. Dystart, following an informal conference yesterday afternoon between members of the government and Sir Edward Beatty, president of the C. P. R., who was here yesterday in connection with the convocation exercises at the University of New Brunswick.

Sir Edward is very much interested in boy welfare work and pointed out to the government members that in Quebec there is a boys' industrial home operating successfully under such a plan. Sir Edward was enthusiastic in his praise of the system and made the suggestion that this province study the matter with the view to adopting it. Under the system the home itself is controlled by business men and welfare societies, and the cost of upkeep is supplemented by a provincial government grant and the balance, which is usually a large amount, is gathered by popular subscription by clubs or societies interested.

The industrial home problem has been a growing one in this province and Sir Edward's suggestion will be looked into by the government at an early date.

Sir Edward here yesterday expressed a confidence in conditions and he looked forward to a "step-up" in conditions.

Sir Edward left at six o'clock last evening in his special train for St. Andrew's from where he will go, via Saint John, to Halifax.

DISCUSS THE YORK ABATTOIR AND ITS UPKEEP

Federal Representatives Meet with City-County Authorities

Information Supplied

Hope to Have Public Works Fund For Its Establishment

At a joint meeting here yesterday between three federal officials, including Dr. Barton, deputy minister of agriculture at Ottawa, with representatives from this city, and county, and the provincial government information pertaining to the establishment of the municipally-owned abattoir and cold storage plant in this city in the near future was given out.

The federal officials gave out information on such a municipally owned abattoir and there were addresses by Hon. J. B. McNair, K.C., attorney general, W. G. Clark, M.P., Hon. A. C. Taylor, minister of agriculture, Warden Howard Cameron of the York county council, Councillors Dobie and B. O. Waugh, and Ald. F. S. Mundie. All spoke in favor of the abattoir. Councillor B. O. Waugh was chairman of the meeting.

W. G. Clark, M.P., stated that he was working to have the abattoir established, and that he hoped that this can be accomplished through money that has been set aside for public works.

After the abattoir is established in the city, the county, city and government will give grants to defray part of the upkeep for the first ten years, and after that the industry will have to carry itself.

BELIEF THAT TORONTO MAN WAS DROWNED

All Efforts to Locate Robert Williamson Have Failed

Police Dragging River

Known in Saint John, Had Been Travelling Coppersmith

All efforts to locate Robert Williamson, of Toronto who has been missing since Tuesday afternoon, when he chartered a duckboat at the West end bathing beach and went for a paddle up the St. John river, have so far proven fruitless. The R. C. M. P., who have the case under investigation have had a boat on the river since Tuesday dragging the riverbed under the supposition that Williamson was drowned.

Several stories have emanated from here and Saint John during the past two days about the Toronto man and his whereabouts. The police yesterday investigated the report that a quantity of stamps, about \$40 worth, were found floating on the riverfront in front of where the overturned duckboat, a paddle and a shirt were found. But the police have not yet found the stamps and the story looks to be ill-founded.

From Saint John comes the report that the missing man is known in Saint John. He was involved in an auto accident in that city in 1934, according to the report, and was accompanied by his wife and brother at that time. An interesting fact of Williamson's visit to that city was that a baby was born to Mrs. Williamson in the hospital while they were in Saint John. The Saint John police state that the missing man is known as a "Scotch gypsy," that is a coppersmith by trade who travels all over the country.

Mrs. Williamson and the two year old son, Robert, who have been left alone at the tourist grounds since Mr. Williamson's disappearance, have been cared for during the last two days by Mr. and Mrs. F. L. Cooper.

The search for the missing man has been extended along the highways in this part of the province with the Fredericton police co-operating the search. So far there has been no sign of the man's whereabouts. Relatives were expected here today from Toronto to help join in the search.

Williamson was last seen on Tuesday afternoon at about three o'clock, when he paddled away from the shore after hiring a boat from Charles Williamson, caretaker of the beach. The overturned boat, paddles and the man's shirt were found floating in the water late that day.
