N. B. GIRL IS RUNNER UP IN I. O. D. E. PRIZE

Appreciation to U.S. for Tribute Paid to Late King and Edw. VIII

The following are excerpts from the meeting of the National Executive Committee of the I. O. D. E. recently held in Toronto:

Mrs. Walter G. Lumbers, National President, presided at the April meeting of the National Executive Committee.

A great deal of interest was evinced in the announcement of the National Educational Committee that the award in the Short Story Competition had been made, the winner being Miss Emily Leavens, of Vedder Crossing, British Columbia, for her story "Remembrance". The prize in this contest was presented by Echoes Committee, and was for the amount of \$50.00.

Nearly 200 stories were received in this contest, Miss Marjorie Thompson of Rexton, New Brunswick, received first honorable mention, and honorable mention was also accorded to Miss F. M. Jordan of Brantford, Ontario; Miss B. M. Ferguson, of Dauphin, Manitoba; Mrs. L. S. Metford of Salmon Arm, British Columbia; Miss L. M. King, Montreal; Miss M. M. Fisher, Halifax, N. S.; Galen H. Craik, Regina, Saskatchewan; Ruth Isabel Wood, Westmont, Mary Overton, Calgary, Alberta. The judges for the stories were Mrs. H. A. Kennedy and Miss Jean Foley of the Canadian Authors' Association, Montreal, and Miss Hay Browne, also of Montreal on behalf of the I. O. D. E.

Mrs. T. Wilbur Best read a letter received by the National Educational Committee of the Order from one of the I. O. D. E. Post Graduate Scholars (Overseas) which gave an account of the ceremonies in connection with the death of King George V.; and also told of the lectures given by these students on 'Canada' through the medium of the Victorian League in England.

Mrs. Mulock, National Organizing Secretary, reported the organization of a new Chapter of the Order in Sydney, Nova Scotia, which is named "Dea Barres" after the first Governor of Cape Breton.

On suggestion of the Provincial Chapter of the Order in British Columbia, it was decided that a resolution from British Columbia, endorsed by the National Executive, be sent to the Daughters of the British Empire in the United States to convey to them and through them to the American people the sincere and grateful appreciation of the I. O. D. E. for the wonderful tributes paid by the press and otherwise to our late beloved Sovereign King George V. and also to King Edward VIII on his accession to the throne.

Two minutes silence was observed in memory of the late Mrs. John Black of Fredericton, who organized the first Chapter of the Order in Canada.

A letter was read from the Z. B. M. M. Society giving information in regard to the Canadian Hospital at Nasik where many cots are endowed by Chapters of the Order.

Mrs. R. H. Brotherhood, Press and Publicity Convener, reported that the Provincial Chapter of Alberta had sent a copy of the article entitled "A Woman of Vision" recently appearing in the Press throughout Canada, to every Chapter under its jurisdiction for its archives.

A report was received from Mrs. Lawrence Smart of Regina, National Director of I. O. D. E. Girl Guides, that a Girl Guide Company had been formed in Fredericton, N. B., and two Brownie Packs, one in Halifax, N. S. and one in Meaford Ont.

The executive of the Fredericton Horticultural Society met at the home of the vice-president Geo. E. Howie on Waterloo Row. In the absence of the president George E. Fisher, the chair was taken by Mr. Howie. It was decided to have an annual meeting on the twentieth of April at the Experimental Farm. M. B. Davis of Ottawa, Dominion horticulturist, will speak on Garden Subjects, probably the upkeep and care of perennial borders. Demonstrations on plotting, planting and transplanting will be given, as well as shrubs; also spring and summer insects. The demonstrations on pruning will probably be done by L. A. Young, of the Experimental Farm. A talk on the control of insects will also be given by R. A. Balch or R. P. Gorham. An active summer by the society is forecasted.

LOCAL GIRL WINS SPECIAL PRIZE C. W. P. C. PROV. BRANCH

Writes About Mayor Clark's Picnic—Win- ner 10 Years Old

SAINT JOHN, N. B., April 8.—Ten-year-old Althea Fraser, Prince William, York County, has been awarded a special prize of \$2 by the New Brunswick Branch of the Canadian Women's Press Club for her entry in the branch's 1936 competition. The competition was open to all girls under 21 years of age resident in New Brunswick and the \$10 prize was offered for the best description of an incident that happened in 1935 in the community in which the competitor resided. Althea Fraser wrote concerning "Mayor Clark's Picnic".

The competition entries were judged at the annual meeting of the branch on Saturday evening at the residence of Miss Stella Payson, Waterloo Street. It was decided to award the \$10 prize next year for the best article of 500 words or less on "What Interests Me Most in a Newspaper, and Why". Further arrangements in connection with next year's competition will be made when the branch resumes its meetings in the fall.

Mrs. A. E. Mathewson, Fredericton provincial vice-president on the national executive, sent regards at inability to attend. Mrs. Mathewson had represented the New Brunswick members of the recent meeting of the national executive in Ottawa when Lady Tweedsmuir accepted honorary active membership in the club. Her Excellency expressed keen interest in the club, its aims and the idea of advancing the status of women writers. She asked that she be considered an active member and permitted to join in the discussion when possible, saying she "hoped there would be mutual benefit to the members and herself, in the association. buses operated by the company to transport railway passengers from Fredericton to Devon for the railways was not interfering. The buses went directly from Union Station to Devon. These buses were not "attending" trains as had been charged.

E. Allison MacKay, acting solicitor for the city appeared and explained the legality of the procedure of the city in granting permission to the Central Trust Company of Canada to construct a storage vault for coal under the sidewalk at the site of the proposed new Ryan building on Queen street. Mr. MacKay said that it was within the power of the city to grant this permission but it should be made in the form of a contract with safeguards and guarantees that the city is reimbursed in case of accident. Also there should be a nominal rental fee. Mayor Kitchen and the city clerk were authorized to enter into an agreement with the company.

The city authorized that Yvonne Hagerman, assistant relief officer be given a \$10 raise.

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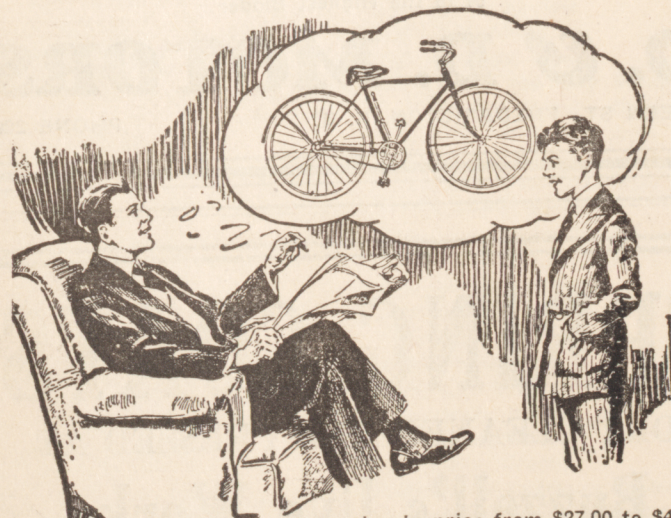
