FROM SHEPHERD TO PEER

(Contributed)

Following a generous gift by Lord Mount Stephen his romantic career was reviewed in the press. Born at Banffshire in 1830, educated at the parish school (since it was a Scotch school, probably an admirable one), first a herd boy, then a draper's apprentice in Aberdeen, then an assistant at Pawson and Leaf's, in St. Paul's Churchyard, and then in 1850 an emigrant to Canada.

The Scotch are famous colonists, and Canada in particular owes much of its prosperity and much of its history to the men from the north of the Tweed, and therefore it is not surprising to find George Stephen in a very few years a prosperous Montreal woolen merchant. In Canada George Stephen found his cousin, Donald Smith, Lord Strathcona with whom years before he had battled in the Spey and played among the heather. Donald Smith had been in the service of the Hudson Bay Company, and at the time when he began to be associated in business with his cousin was a member of the Dominion House of Commons.

It was early in the seventies that the two Highland boys, even then middle-aged men, pooled their energies. Both were directors of the Bank of Montreal, Lord Mount Stephen being at one time its president.

But the turning point of the millionaire-philanthropist's career occurred when in 1875 he joined a syndicate for the Dutch holders of the bonds of the St. Paul and Pacific Railway, a road which, when finished, controlled the Canadian North-West. The taste for railway enterprise, begun in this way, soon had the opportunity of development. The entrance of British Columbia into the Dominion carried with it

the obligations to build a trans-continental railway, and the work had been begun by the Government. As is not uncommon with Government enterprises, the construction had been exceedingly dilatory, and in 1880, one year before the railway should have been completed only 700 miles had been constructed. But what the Government could not do, Lord Mount and his cousin did do. Their offer to build the line was received with scepticism, but the thing had to be done, and they were the only men bold enough to attempt it. In return for a subsidy of five million pounds, twenty-five million acres—about the total size that is, of Ireland and Wales—and the part of the line already completed, an undertaking was given that the Pacific should be linked to the Atlantic in eleven years. He is a great man whose achievement doubles his promise; and nothing perhaps more clearly reveals the characters of Lord Mount Stephen and Lord Strathcona, than the fact that the last spike, promised for 1891, was driven in 1885.

Lord Mount Stephen was the Canadian Pacific Railway's first president. For his services to his country and the Empire he was made a baronet. He left Canada again to settle in the old country in 1888, and soon after was raised to the peerage. The Scotchman is keen and successful in the accumulation of great fortunes, but, as is shown by the career of the two Canadian Peers as well as by the career of Andrew Carnegie, the money they have made is used with no niggard hand in work of philanthropy and kindness. Lord Mount Stephen's gifts have always been princely. As long ago as 1887 he gave Montreal £100,000 for a hospital. When he was a boy he broke his arm, and it was set in the Aberdeen Infirmary. In 1901, he repaid the obligation by a gift to the institution of £25,000. His master, when he was a "herd laddie" of the Mortlach, was the parish minister, a good, kindly man, who made the boy's hard work as pleasant as could be.

When Lord Mount Stephen came home from Canada he invested £40,000, to insure all the parish ministers of Speyside at least £100 a year.

This article is not to enumerate all the gifts by this wealthy Scotchman, but it is said that as a practical protest against wills, and possibly death duties, he divided much of his fortune among his relatives.

Lord Mount Stephen was twice married, his second wife was a daughter of Captain Tufnell, R. N. At their home Hertfordshire house, Eppocket Hall many members of the Royal Family were entertained among them the King and Queen.

The Canadian peer had no children, but he and his wife adopted a little girl, who soon after they came to England, married McHenry Stafford Northcote, once Governor-General of Australia. One writer describing the Canadian peer, said he had a kindly pleasant face, with shrewd Scotch eyes. Certainly his has been a great career, from Shepherd boy to the friend of Kings and Princes—and it is a career that has in its fruition brought help to those who want it most, politically, Lord Mount Stephen was a supporter of Mr. Chamberlain.

BUTTER, CHEESE AND EGGS IN COLD STORAGE

According to a preliminary statement issued by the Dominion Bureau of Statistics there were 3,044,592 lb. of creamery butter in cold storage warehouses in Montreal as compared with 1,904,415 a year ago. The figures for Toronto and Winnipeg follow, with last year's figures in brackets: Toronto 1,227,964 (1,401,217) Winnipeg, 571,000 (496,212).

Cheese stocks at Montreal were 7,432,326 (4,496,861) lb., Toronto 2,469,437 (2,162,256), Winnipeg 157,221 (160,597).

"Stampede" a Saga of Conflict, Love and Life
