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# Dog Law, Peddling, Victoria Hospital Discussed

## Councillors of York County Want Government to Act Re Changing Dog Law—Peddling in York County Discountenanced—Committee to Meet With Hospital Board Respecting New Hos- pital.

The York Municipal council in ses-  
sion yesterday afternoon discussed  
such disparate matters as the pro-  
posed change in the dog law of the  
county, the prevalence of much ped-  
dling throughout York county which  
is annoying the country merchants,  
and the proposition of the Victoria  
Public Hospital trustees to have the  
York county council co-operate in in-  
vestigating the possibility of a new  
hospital here.

Solicitor Arthur McF. Limerick of-  
fered to bring up the change in the  
dog law as suggested in a resolution  
brought up before the York Municipal  
council yesterday morning, before  
the Union of New Brunswick Munici-  
palities. The resolution brought up  
by Col. H. H. Ritchie, chief game  
warden, would make it illegal to own  
police dogs or cross breeds of police  
dogs. Councillor Malone moved that  
the resolution be adopted by the  
council and recommended to the Un-  
ion of New Brunswick Municipalities  
for action. The motion was carried  
by the council.

Coun. William Stannix of the par-  
ish of McAdam pointed out that the  
N. B. Legislature meets each year and  
he wished to know why the matter of  
dogs should be brought up before  
the York county council. He said it  
looks as if Col. Ritchie wanted the  
council to start something. He want-  
ed to know why the provincial gov-  
ernment couldn't make laws regard-  
ing dogs. "I think they are just  
passing the buck to us," was his de-  
claration. Solicitor Limerick ex-  
plained that the government might  
not take action unless they thought  
the farmers wanted it. If it were re-  
commended by the New Brunswick  
Union of Municipalities then the  
government would act upon it.

Coun. Wetmore explained that the  
government would like to have the  
opinion of the York county council on  
the matter and that if the council  
adopted the resolution it would show  
they were in favor of it.

The report of the committee on the  
Secretary treasurer's reports was de-  
livered by Coun. Frank Coburn. The  
committee examined the report and  
found it correct. It was moved that  
the report be accepted by Coun. Nor-  
rad. The report was accepted.

Councillor Malone reported that  
the committee to examine the bonds

of the secretary treasurer and col-  
lectors found that all were bonded  
for 1936. He moved the acceptance  
of the report, which was seconded by  
Coun. Stannix, approved and adopted.

### Cold Storage

Coun. B. O. Waugh announced that  
the committee on cold storage which  
has a councillor for every parish,  
would have a meeting at eight o'clock.

Coun. Malone brought up the mat-  
ter of peddlers. He said that mer-  
chants in Fredericton were peddling  
all over the county causing a great  
deal of comment. Solicitor Limerick  
read the provincial act regarding  
peddlers in the province. He ex-  
plained that to peddle, a man must  
have twelve months' residence in the  
county and pay taxes. A man in  
Fredericton living here for at least  
twelve months, paying rates and  
taxes in York county or an adjoining  
county, and who has been a resident  
of the province for ten years, and  
who has paid all his taxes, may ped-  
dle in York county on paying a li-  
cense fee of \$1. A man from Sunbury  
county or a county adjoining York  
would have to pay \$10 license fee to  
peddle on foot in York county, by  
vehicle \$25. A man living in any  
county not adjoining York county  
would have to pay \$40. A non-resi-  
dent of the province would have to  
pay \$50. This council could change  
the rate of license fees but could not  
discriminate between residents of  
different sections, he explained.  
There is a penalty for peddling with-  
out license, he said.

### Object to Peddling

Warden Howard Cameron read a  
petition from rural ratepayers of  
York county objecting to peddling in  
the county.

Coun. Stannix moved that the mat-  
ter of selecting a committee to meet  
with the Victoria Hospital Board of  
trustees, be laid on the table until the  
January session.

Coun. Doherty suggested going to  
the hospital in a body and selecting  
the committee when the councillors  
come back. Coun. Fred A. Young  
said it was only fair to the hospital  
board to form a committee to in-  
vestigate hospital conditions and talk  
over the matter with the board.  
Coun. Norrad suggested that it

might be an inconvenience to the hos-  
pital if the council should go up to  
the hospital on a hot day like yester-  
day. He moved that a committee be  
formed to investigate conditions and  
to work with the trustee board of the  
hospital. The motion was carried.

Coun. Graham said he didn't think  
the council ever had a report from  
the Finance and Building committee.  
He believed the council should have  
a report so as to know what was go-  
ing on.

### Matter of New Hospital

Warden Cameron said he thought  
the council should select the commit-  
tee to meet with the hospital board.  
Coun. Wetmore moved that the com-  
mittee be appointed from the chair.  
Coun. Waugh seconded the motion,  
which was carried. The warden an-  
nounced that a committee of three  
will be appointed today.

Coun. Graham moved that the Fi-  
nance and Building committee submit  
a report. Coun. Briggs seconded the  
motion which was carried. Before ad-  
journing a collection was taken up  
to pay for a treat for the Municipal  
Home. It was announced that the  
public accounts committee will meet  
this morning.

The Council adjourned to visit the  
Municipal Home yesterday afternoon.

### 5,000 CANADIANS ABROAD IN JUNE

OTTAWA, July 10—This is a great  
year for Canadians going abroad. In  
the month of June over 5,000 pas-  
ports were issued—the largest num-  
ber in five years. In May there were  
almost 4,000. This is apart from peo-  
ple travelling on passports previous-  
ly issued and which are good for  
five years and also is exclusive of  
6,125 special passports issued, free,  
to the Vimy pilgrims. Increased  
ocean fares have proved no obstacle  
to travel.

## NIGHT LIFE HARD ON THE DUCKLINGS

mals. The bears are on edge all the  
time.

Park attendants can think of no  
remedy because the fountain is an in-  
stitution in Lafontaine Park. People  
come from all over to see it. So the  
only thing left is to hope the duck-  
lings will get tired of carousing around  
and call a halt to this wild-oat sow-  
ing.

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
