### POLICE END SEARCH

R.C.M.P. constables, in charge of Inspector C. K. Gray, of headquarters staff here have abandoned the search for the body of a man reported to have been seen lying in the undergrowth of the Geary woods area last week. Police have engaged in the search since Saturday, but so far without results. Allan R. McManus, aged 37, of Hampton, is supposed to have seen the body. According to the police, McManus, who told the story to the police, is himself among the missing at present. His story, although every angle of the case was investigated, seems to have been another of the variety called false. McManus, although he was in the woods engaged in the search with the police, wandered away and was seen yesterday walking along the road.

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## U.N.B. GEOLOGY PROFESSOR DIED THIS MORNING

Prof. S. C. Perry Died As Result of Injuries

### Tributes Paid

Inquest Into Death at Police Station Tonight

Although not unexpected, the death at 5:45 o'clock this morning of Prof. Stanley Calvin Perry of the University of New Brunswick, caused a shock to many friends in the city. During the afternoon and evening of yesterday many anxious telephone inquiries regarding the condition of Prof. Perry were received at The Daily Mail office. It was known that Prof. Perry was on the danger list at Victoria Hospital following the unfortunate accident of yesterday morning, but his friends had hoped for his recovery.

Prof. Perry was conveyed to the hospital following an accident on the corner of Brunswick and Westmorland streets shortly before nine o'clock yesterday morning, when the car which he was driving collided with the Fredericton Fire Department's fire pumper which was on its way to a fire. The details were as reported in The Daily Mail of yesterday.

Prof. Perry, who is a native of Brantford, Ontario, and a son of Rev. and Mrs. L. A. Perry, came here in 1929 to accept a professorship in geology and mineralogy at the University of New Brunswick. He had previously graduated from the University of Toronto. Since coming to Fredericton, he has been popular not only with the students and faculty of the U.N.B., but with citizens generally. He was counted as an able man in his line of work and in mineralogical research. During the vacation periods at the University he engaged in field work and during the past two summers was with the Dominion Geological survey.

Speaking this morning to The Daily Mail, President Dr. C. C. Jones of the University, paid a hearty tribute to Prof. Perry as a teacher and member of the University faculty. He said he was a very conscientious teacher, outstanding in his work and popular with the students, and added that the loss of Prof. Perry would be severely felt by both students and faculty of the University. Lectures at U.N.B. have been suspended in tribute to deceased.

Prof. Perry is survived by his widow, who was formerly Miss Margaret Lewin Rice, daughter of Rev. J. M. Rice and Mrs. Rice of Bathurst, whom he married in May, 1934. Also surviving are the parents, four brothers, Louis, Charles, Cecil and Orton, and two sisters, Olive and Zella. His brother, Orton, is expected to arrive here tomorrow and will accompany the body to Brantford, Ontario, where interment will be made.

Rev. Mr. Rice and Mrs. Rice arrived at noon today from Bathurst to be with Mrs. Perry in her sad trouble. Prof. Perry's brother is expected to arrive at noon tomorrow to accompany the remains back to his home. The funeral service will be held at the residence, Rookwood Avenue, with prayers at 3.40 o'clock. Rev. George Telford will conduct the service. The body will be taken to Brantford, Ont., on the 4.40 o'clock train.

## CAPITAL HIT BY ITS FIRST SNOWSTORM

Over an Inch of Snow Arrived Last Evening

### Temperature Colder

Motorists Affected: River Glazed With Ice Today

Fredericton had its first real taste of the approaching winter season last night and today when the mercury fell to a point only ten degrees above zero this morning. Last night over an inch of snow fell, which was followed later last night with cold winds. So far as can be learned no serious damage was done to electric light, telephone or telegraph service, but the highways were affected, and many motorists were caught unawares on the highways.

At several places minor accidents occurred such as cars leaving the road, being crippled by the cold weather. At Springhill last night, as a result of the slippery conditions of the highway, two trucks collided but with no damage resulting.

Navigation on the St. John river between here and Saint John is likely to cease by the coming weekend. Today the river was again glazed with ice and snow, especially along the shoreline where ice was quite thick. Officials of the pumping station believe that the river is liable to be sealed over any time now. If the present spell of cold weather continues the river may be frozen up within a week. Last night's snowstorm, which was the first big one of the season, finds a parallel with last year, when the first snowstorm of the year occurred on the same date.

Motorists on the St. John—Fredericton route last night had some difficulty because of the snow and local chains were much in evidence.

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## MATTERS OF TRANSPORTATION FOR DISCUSSION

T. C. MacNabb of C.P.R. Appears Before Trade Bd. Comm.

### Service Wanted

Showdown is Expected at Conference Here Today

T. C. MacNabb, general superintendent of the C.P.R., is in the city to meet the transportation committee of the Fredericton Board of Trade at the city club this afternoon. Mr. MacNabb is here to discuss with the Board of Trade the matter of a better winter service on the Devon-Edmundston branch of the C.P.R. This matter was gone into with Mr. MacNabb on his previous visit to this city and whilst he promised the transportation committee that he would do his best to provide a better train service on this line it is understood that the winter timetable has now been made up and that it does not include any portion of the improved service promised to the Fredericton Board of Trade by Mr. MacNabb. It is for the purpose of having a showdown as to just where the Fredericton merchants and business men stand that this meeting is taking place this afternoon. The members of the transportation committee who meet Mr. MacNabb this afternoon include R. L. Phillips, chairman, George Armstrong, George W. Hodge, J. T. Jennings, C. D. Dougherty, J. L. Neville, J. D. Palmer and President S. S. Miller and Mayor G. Willard Kitchen.

## Two Witnesses Heard Today in York Circuit Case

Hazen Grasse, employed by E. C. Atkinson on pulp operations, and E. C. Atkinson were the witnesses heard this morning in the case of the Royal Bank vs. the Fort Royal Pulp and Paper Co. Ltd., Saint John. The case was continued from yesterday at an adjourned sitting of the York circuit court, Chief Justice J. H. Barry presiding.

The Royal Bank is suing for about \$8,000, and is represented by Hanson, Dougherty and West. Sanford and Teed and C. F. Inches, K.C., are counsel for the defendant.

The third case on the docket, that of John Webster vs. Harry L. Richards, has been settled out of court. The case of Randolph Kilburn, Frank P. Kilburn and Ralph Kilburn vs. John Black Sr., and James Black, will be the next case to be tried, P. J. Hughes K.C., representing the plaintiffs, and Hanson, Dougherty and West the defendants.
