He had previously graduated from the Univeronly with the students and faculty of the U.N.B., but with citizens generin his line of work and in minerolo periods at the University he engaged in field work and during the past two summers was with the Dominion Geological survey.

Speaking this morning to The Daily Mail, President Dr. C. C. Jones of the University, paid a hearty tribute to Prof. Perry as a teacher and member of the University faculty. He said he was a very conscientious teacher. outstanding in his work and popular with the students, and added that the oss of Prof Perry would be severely felt by both students and faculty of the University.
