Hold-up Men Robbed Mrs. Guy Lamson

TAKE \$400.00 AT POINT OF GUN NEAR PETERSVILLE

R.C.M.P. Detachments Scouring Valley for Black Sedan

License Plates Covered

Description of Two Men Same as Given Yesterday

Mrs. Guy Lamson, of this city, was held up at the point of a gun this morning somewhere near Petersville on the road to Saint John and \$400.00 taken from her. She was ordered out of her car and then relieved of her money by the two highwaymen. Not daring to offer resistance to the two men one of whom menaced her with a drawn revolver, Mrs. Lamson got back in her car and continued to Saint John. The two men followed in a black sedan and trailed her to Fairville. She then went to the nearest detachment of the R.C.M.P. and reported the holdup to them. Police everywhere were notified and a detachment was sent out from the Headquarters at Fredericton to patrol the highways.

Mrs. Lamson described the two men as follows: The man who pointed the revolver at her is about 5 feet 10 inches tall, good looking and has regular features with a fine set of teeth. He was dressed very sportingly in a maroon colored shirt, grey trousers and black and white sport shoes. The other man is somewhat shorter, with long black hair combed back and very greasy. He was wearing grey pants and a grey shirt.

The unfortunate Fredericton victim reports that the automobile that stopped her and then followed her to Fairville was a black sedan of late model. The license plates were covered.

Although at the time of going to press no definite word had been received as to whether the desperados were the same as those that held up the Goodyear Tire Company in Saint John yesterday, the description of the automobile and the stature of the men seem to be the same. Furthermore the men that entered the Tire Company yesterday have not been located. Detachments of the R.C.M.P. are covering the roads in and about Saint John as well as the International Boundary Towns.

Eddie Collins Cancels N. B. Trip

Edward T. Collins and wife, who were supposed to come to New Brunswick for a week's fishing, have had to cancel their trip, it was learned this morning from D. W. Griffith, director of the N. B. Bureau of Information and Tourist Travel. Eddie Collins is vice-president and general manager of the Boston Red Sox and was planning to get in a week on the Cain's river when the team was on its western trip. The death of Joe Cronin's mother has made it impossible for Eddie to leave. Joe is the playing manager of the team, and was to have charge while the veteran manager was away.

CHANGES TO COME IN EDUCATIONAL AFFAIRS IN N. B.

Elementary and Advanced School Will Be Effectuated

Adult and Study Clubs

Matter at Present Being Studied by Educational Authorities

Those who are interested in progress in our educational affairs will be pleased to learn that extensive changes leading to the advancement of educational affairs in this province are on the way. It is understood from those in a position to know that the coming fall will see a start on a shake-up which has long since been due.

Those who are in charge of Educational matters are not yet in a position to go into the details of the shake-up but are emphatic in their statements that the changes to be made are much along the lines which have been advocated for months by The Daily Mail.

Amongst other changes hinted at are those relating to adult education and study clubs such as is being carried on in Nova Scotia. It is understood that W. K. Tibert, director of Vocational Education and one of the leaders in modern educational ideas for New Brunswick, will go to Antigonish, N. S., within a week or two to study the up-to-date system which has been introduced into Nova Scotia by Saint Francis Xavier University. This has done much for education in Nova Scotia. Mr. Tibert declined today to discuss this trip or to talk on educational matters in general. Members of the Board of Education however, state that extensive changes will be made.

It seems harder to jar the University as that institution is not quite in touch with advanced public opinion, but it is doing a good work on its own way.

The elementary and advanced classes of the public schools are in for a shake-up, however.

NEW BRIDGE WILL CUT OFF TWENTY MILES TO MONCTON

Can Take Short Cut Via Cole's Island and Salisbury

Several New Bridges

New Bathurst Bridge Approved by Federal Dept. at Ottawa

A bridge which will cut off twenty miles in the distance between this city and Moncton is now being erected over the Canaan River. After this bridge is finished it will be possible to go to Moncton via Coles Island, Hoar's Brook and out at Salisbury and on to Moncton.

Another bridge now being erected is the High Street bridge at Sussex. This will be a big improvement to highway traffic when it is completed.

Delay has been experienced with the construction of the large three-quarter mile bridge at Bathurst. According to the Federal law the plans of all bridges over navigable waters have to be approved by the Federal authorities. The plans for the new Bathurst bridge have only now been approved. The tenders for the Bathurst bridge will be called for in about ten days. The bridge which connects Bathurst with West Bathurst on the main Campbellton-Bathurst highway is one of the most important trunk line bridges in the province. The length of the bridge is nearly one mile.

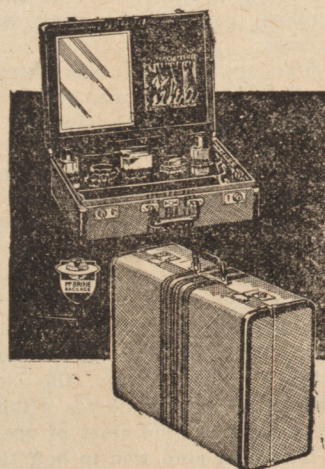
