## PROTECTION FOR RURAL GROCER TO BE SOUGHT

Infringement on Rights of Country Grocer is Charged

York. Co. Council Matter

Finances of York County in Fairly Good Shape Says Warden

The rights of the small country grocer is quite likely to be the subject of debate by the councillors when the York Municipal Council begins its July sittings at the York County court house tomorrow. It is reported here that recently buses have been carrying groceries from certain stores and catering to the county trade, thus threatening the livelihood of the rural grocer.

Howard Cameron, Warden of the York county council intimated today in conversation with The Daily Mail that there was a possibility that a tax would be imposed against this traffic to protect the country grocer. It is understood also that some of the grocers in this city who have considerable rural trade, are objecting to the practice also.

Warden Cameron said today that he expected a small surplus when the York County council financial statement is read before the council this week. He described county finances as in "fairly good shape."

The county council will discuss the pressing problem of delinquent taxes at its July session as well as a number of other matters, and it is expected that the abattoir committee of the council will present a report on its attitude toward the granting of money toward the upkeep of the proposed York county abattoir and cold storages plant.

## NATURALIZATION BRINGS REALITY

EDMONTON, July 6—Naturalization certificates, open sesame to British citizenship, were granted last year to 33,000 people drawn from the ends of the earth, Mr. Justice A. K. Dymally told members of the Women's Canadian Club here.

Canadians of British extraction comprised a bare majority of 52 per cent. of the population and there were 64 people of British descent between the ages of 50 and 60. Children of British descent out of every 100 up to the age of 10 years numbered only 42.

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## PROMOTION OF NEW BRUSWICK'S LUMBER TRADE

Eastern Canada Lumber Trade Promotion Committee Meets

N. B. Represented

G. H. Prince Represents This Province. A. A. Colter at Meeting

G. H. Prince, deputy minister of lands and mines, has left to attend the two-day meeting of the Eastern Canada Lumber Trade Promotion Committee, which meets this week in Montreal.

The province of New Brunswick is interested in the promotion of lumber trade along with Quebec and Nova Scotia. K. G. Fensom is Canada's foreign representative in the interests of Canada's lumber interests overseas.

Other representatives from New Brunswick attending the Montreal meeting are Ashley A. Colter, of this city, representing the hardwood lumber industry, and John Sayre, of the Sayre Lumber Company of Saint John, who represents the softwood industry of the province. A joint meeting of the committee with the Canadian Lumbermen's Association is scheduled for tomorrow.

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## 55th Anniversary Consecration of St. Mary's Church

On July 12, St. Mary's Parish church at Devon, will celebrate the fifty-fifth anniversary of its consecration. It was consecrated on July 12, 1881 by His Lordship Bishop Medley. Those present at the consecration were Rt. Rev. Bishop Kingston, who, only two days previously, had been consecrated Coadjutor Bishop of Fredericton. The following clergymen were also present: Very Rev. Finlow, Alexander, dean of the Cathedral; Rev. G. G. Roberts, rector of St. Anne's; Rev. William Jaffrey, the first rector of St. Mary's; and Revs. Canon deVeber, Canon Brigstock, W. LeB. McKiel, E. Forsythe, G. L. Sterling, Dr. W. O. Raymond, and A. H. Weeks.

The following have been in charge of the parish:

Rev. Wm. Jaffrey, to May 1890; Rev. John Parkinson, to July, 1898; Rev. W. B. Belliss, Aug. 1898 to April, 1903; Rev. J. R. deW. Cowie, Sept. 1903 to Dec. 1904; Rev. F. P. Duffy, from March 1905 to Sept. 1906; Rev. Craig W. Nichols, from June 1907 to Dec. 1909; Rev. Alex. B. Murray, from Jan. 1910 to Aug. 1911; Rev. E. E. Lake, from May, 1912 to Dec. 1917; Rev. G. W. Fisher, from Aug. 1918 to May 1921; Rev. W. G. Branch, from July 1921; Rev. E. Hailstone, from Feb. 1923 to June 1925; Rev. N. P. Fairweather, to July 1928; Rev. C. LeR. Mooers, from Sept. 1928 to present.

It is not the intention of the parish to hold any special celebration to commemorate the event, except that possibly reference will be made to it on Sunday next, the day on which it falls.

## REGISTRATION AT THE SUMMER SCHOOL LARGER

Total of 84 Registered at Opening U. N. B. School Today

11 Sisters of Charity

Two Changes in Teaching Staff for This Summer

An unusually large number were registered at the opening of the University of New Brunswick summer school which commenced this morning. A total of 84 students are registered for summer study, several of them towards M.A. degree, but the majority taking the study in order to secure B.A. degrees. Dr. C. C. Jones, president of the University, is in charge.

There are two changes in the teaching staff this year, one in the English department and one in the Physics department. Malcolm McK. Ross replaces Prof. Milton Simpson of Kalamazoo, Michigan, in the chair of English, while Prof. Bryan Priestman will instruct in Physics in place of Prof. A. F. Baird.

In this year's class are eleven Sisters of Charity from Saint John and Moncton. This is two less than last year. Four Sisters of Charity were graduated from the summer school last year. The course of study in order to attain to a B.A. degree, takes eight summer sessions. Most of the students have had previous university training.

## The King's Party

LONDON, July 6—The King will give a party in the gardens of Buckingham Palace on July 29 to the 6,000 Canadian pilgrims who will attend the unveiling of the Vimy Ridge Memorial to the Dominion's Great War dead. In the King's absence from the party, the Duke and Duchess of Gloucester will act as host and hostess. His Majesty will unveil the memorial at Vimy Ridge July 26. He is planning to proceed from there to the French Riviera for a short holiday.
