RADIO VERSION OF BANNED MOVIE TO BE PRESENTED

The Canadian Radio Commission To Broadcast "Green Pastures"

A broadcast presentation of the famous play "Green Pastures," the motion picture version of which was brought prominently to the attention of the public through its being banned and subsequently released by the Ontario board of motion picture censors, is to be offered by the Canadian Radio Commission to its coast-to-coast audience Tuesday, July 28. The broadcast will be in the form of a musical dramatization of the motion picture version of the play. The dramatic part will be a condensation of the motion picture drama.

The broadcast will be produced in

the Toronto studios of the Commission. Edgar Stone, well known Canadian dramatist and producer, will be responsible for the dramatic part and will have charge of a specially selected cast. The Commission's Georgian Singers will provide the choral parts, and Jack Arthur will direct the orchestra.

This programme, in which there is likely to be much interest owing to the recent controversy about the temporary suppression of the motion picture film, will be heard on the Commission's national network from 10.00 to 10.40 p. m., AST next Tuesday.

BANK MONTREAL CROP REPORT SAYS CONDITIONS GOOD

Harvesting of An Excellent Hay Crop Is Under Way in New Brunswick

Below will be found a brief synopsis of telegraphic reports received last week at the head office of the Bank of Montreal from its branches. The Branch Managers have complete and intimate knowledge of each local situation and are in close touch with crop conditions in all sections of the districts mentioned.

General

Continued adverse weather conditions have caused further irreparable damage to crops in most sections of the Prairie Provinces, and rain is urgently needed. Scattered showers have been beneficial in some districts and prospects continue fair to good in northern Manitoba, in some eastern and central parts of Saskatchewan, and in northern areas of Alberta. Throughout Quebec crops continue to show satisfactory progress under favourable weather conditions. In Ontario excessively dry weather, with premature ripening of crops, has continued throughout the province, except in eastern counties which have had a few scattered showers, but cooler weather has prevailed. In the Maritime Provinces the weather, while somewhat cooler, has been favourable. All crops are progressing satisfactorily, and there is ample moisture for the present. In British Columbia favourable weather continues, with promise of fair to good yields except in berries, now gathered, and apricots, which are a failure.

Maritime Provinces

Prince Edward Island crops continue to make good progress. Small fruits are plentiful. In Nova Scotia and New Brunswick cereal crops are doing well and harvesting of a hay

DARING STUNT FLIER AFRAID OF AUTOMOBILES

OTTAWA, July 28—The man whose flying amazed King Edward at the recent Northolt air show came home today, more than a week late for his summer holidays, and told reporters he was afraid of automobiles.

Flying Officer James R. MacLachlan of the Royal Air Force said he and his companion, Flight-Lieut. H. Broadhurst and Pilot Officer B. G. Morris, surrendered eight days of their annual leave so they might stage a show for the King. He could have obtained the eight days later, he explained, but he wants to be back in England in time to take part in the August 29 international air tournament at Hendon.

MacLachlan, one of the world's most daring stunt pilots, thinks an airplane one of the world's safest spots—far safer than an automobile. "I am all right if I am driving the car myself," he said, "but there are only about two people I can drive with in any state of composure."

He said he was particularly alarmed at the manner in which British motorists drive. He has been in two automobile accidents and was slightly injured in one.
