which they have at their command.

"Here is a new menace more threatening than ever before for the whole world and particularly for Europe and its Christian civilization," he said.

The Holy Father's voice trembled throughout the whole 29 minutes of the Christmas Eve message.

At times he seemed to be forcing himself on. At several intervals, he paused for a second.

Of his own suffering, the Pontiff, ill for more than two weeks of slight paralysis and circulatory congestion told his millions of listeners:

"The Divine goodness is granting us an opportunity to contribute to the prayers, the work and the sacrifices of all by the personal experience of suffering, and until now has marvelously spared us.

"And for which the same Divine God is most readily and generously recompensing us with a wondrous and touching union of prayers, which lately, from every part of the church, are incessantly being offered up for the wellbeing of the common father."

Of the prayers for his recovery, the Pope said:

"From the fullness of our heart we take the opportunity to thank all for this manifestation of filial affection, so loving and so devoted.

"Although what we have to suffer is very little, indeed, compared to that which, so generously and painfully, people suffer in the world; and compared with that, above all, which He Himself, the Head, the Founder, the King of this Divine church had to suffer for us, both in soul and body, may He nonetheless deign to accept our offering, which we wish will always be in conformity with His Most Holy Will."

Of Spain he declared:
"The sorrowful note which, this year, is mingled with the joys of Christmas, is even more profound and distressing because of the fact that there still rages, with all its horror, hatred, carnage and destruction, a civil war in Spain."

The Holy Father said he saw with sorrow, among those who pretend to be defenders against the spread of communism and atheism, "not a few allowing themselves to be dominated and guided by false and fatal ideas, both in their choice of remedies and in the appraisal of their adversaries."

"False and fatal, we say, for who-soever seeks to lessen or stamp out in the hearts of men, and especially in Christ and His Divine revelations; who-soever seeks to forsake the church of Christ, custodian of Divine promises and by Divine mandate the teacher of peoples, as an avowed enemy of national prosperity and progress, such a one is not only no builder of a prosperous future for humanity and his own country; on the contrary, he is destroying his most effective and priceless means of defence against the dreaded evil—and he is—even though he knows it not, working with those against whom he believes and boasts that he is fighting."

He concluded his address with an appeal for "the tranquility of order" in which, he said, "alone peace can exist."

CITY ELECTION

THE ELECTION FOR ALDERMEN AND MAYOR FOR THE CITY OF FREDERICTON

For the ensuing year will be held on

MONDAY

the 11th day of January 1937 at the Polling Places as follows: DIVISION NO. 1—For all voters residing or owning property above the northwest centre line of Carleton Street, prolonged, at or near the City Hall, in the said City.

DIVISION NO. 2—For all voters residing or owning property in the remainder of the said City, at or near the County Court House, in the said City.

NOMINATIONS

Every candidate for the office of Mayor or Alderman shall be qualified to vote at the election for which he is nominated and shall be nominated by at least TWO ratepayers residing in the City of Fredericton, and qualified to vote at the ensuing election for which such candidate is nominated.

Every nomination paper, with the certificate of the City Treasurer, shall be filed with the City Clerk or at his office, and not later than FOUR O'CLOCK on the afternoon of MONDAY, the FOURTH DAY OF JANUARY, 1937, and the City Clerk, before receiving such nomination paper, shall ascertain from the same that the requirements of the Election Act have been complied with.

No candidate is qualified to be nominated for Alderman unless at the time of nomination he is a resident of the Ward for which he is nominated.

The acceptance of each candidate and the signature of at least TWO resident qualified voters, who must sign the nomination paper, shall be proved by affidavit attached to the nomination.

In case of a contest, each elector shall be entitled to vote for one candidate for Mayor, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Wellington Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for St. Anne's Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Carleton Ward, for ONE candidate for Alderman for Queen's Ward, and for ONE candidate for Alderman for King's Ward.

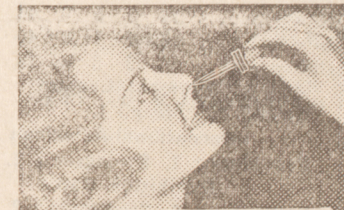
