"It news of Calgary as though she lived in the midst of it. She had helped form the Women's Section of the Southern Alberta Pioneers' and Old-timers' Association, and two years ago had come back for the January round-up. She was also the first president of the Ladies' Auxiliary to the Fifth Battalion. The war years had found her very busy here, her two sons being overseas. One son, Capt. Frank Costigan, was killed at Vimy. "Now don't say much about me. It's just that I wanted to come back to revive old memories and friendships," she admonished as the interview closed. She admitted her doctor had been none too willing for her to come to this altitude in winter, and had warned her to 'keep quiet and be her age.' "I just told him I'd do neither," she said stoutly, as she recalled all the people she wanted to see within the space of one short week.

The whole, or as much of the surface of the right of way as the Engineer may direct, shall be entirely cleared of all trees, cut to a height satisfactory to the Engineer and not to exceed 3 feet in any case. The products of clearing shall not be deposited on adjacent property. All merchantable timber shall become the property of the Department, and shall be cleared of limbs and tops, and piled along the roadside.
