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Yorks, Beavers, St. Croix Win Holiday Games

YORKS BEAT ST. ANDREWS TEAM HERE TUESDAY

McIntyre Figures in Four of Six Goals For Yorks

The York All Stars won their first game in three starts in the Southern N. B. Hockey League in a game against the St. Andrews Senators in the Arctic Rink here New Year's Eve by the score of 6-2. The game, which did not get under way until nearly ten o'clock because of late train connections made by the visiting team, was fast in spots and had the some four hundred fans on their feet cheering many times. A fist fight in the second period which involved little Jackie Keenan of the Yorks and Stinson of the Senators lived things up some, but the offenders were banished to the penalty box by referee Charles Wade before any serious trouble resulted. The honors in the game were divided between Bill O'Neill, stone-wall goalie of the Senators, and Bill McIntyre, hard working rookie forward of the Yorks. The former was called upon to stop thirty-nine shots in the game, many of which were from the stick of the Barker's Point flash, McIntyre figured in four of the Yorks goals and accounted directly for three of them.

The Senators opened the scoring seven minutes after the game started when Tait took a pass from Williamson at centre ice and shot an easy one past Young from outside the blue line. Following the score the Yorks seemed to be working a little harder than at first, but they could not even the count until ten minutes later when McIntyre banged in the York's first goal on Lifford's rebound. The goal was the climax to a hectic ten minutes for O'Neill in the Senators' net. He had the York sharpshooters buffaloesd while they plastered puck after puck at him. Fast skating and hard checking by the Yorks' defence was a feature during the period with the second line of Lifford, Haining and McIntyre looming up in the skating.

In the first part of the second period play was slow, but as the battle continued things began to warm up and near the end of the period Keenan and Stinson came together inside the Senators' blue line and started swapping blows. Several players swarmed around the fracas, but the two instigators were sent to the cooler for three minutes each by referee Charles Wade. Shortly after the two were banished Pickard, York defence-man, broke fast with Lifford and McIntyre at his blue line and coasted in to bat in the latters' rebounds after the three had outwitted the Senator defence. A half a minute later, after Keenan and Stinson had returned to the ice, McIntyre rifled a shot past the alert O'Neill after receiving a pass from Keenan.

During the whole third period both teams showed a steady speed and scoring ability, the Yorks scoring three more and the Senators one. McIntyre jumped into the limelight when he carried the puck down the ice, breezed in past the defence and batted in his own rebound making the score 4-1. T. Nichol, stocky little right winger with the Senators, was banished to the box for tripping and was given an extra minute when he complained to the referee. Fast skating and hard checking followed and continued with the Yorks trying hard to beat O'Neill again. They were rewarded when Mills carried the puck past the blue line, missed a shot and McLennan snaked it in by bringing

New Move In U. S. Olympic Preparations

Lukewarm Committee Members Are
Asked To Withdraw

NEW YORK, N. Y., Jan. 2.—The United States Olympic committee, foreseeing success in its efforts to have a good representation at the 1936 games in Germany but only after arduous search for financial backing is seeking unity within its ranks.

At its first meeting since the stormy Amateur Athletic Union convention, when an attempt to put that body on record as opposing the Olympics in Nazi Germany was almost successful, the committee yesterday accepted the resignations of several members of the opposing faction and moved to eliminate other "lukewarm" members.

The committeemen favored the proposal of president Avery Brundage of Chicago, that those whose lack of activity indicated they were not wholly in accord with United States participation be courteously asked to withdraw.

They decided to send questionnaires to all members of the committee asking their positive stand.

Despite the opposition that remains financial reports indicated the prospects for full representation were good.

Winter Sports Teams

Plans for the sailing of 51 members of the winter sports teams on Friday were approved with the indication that there would be no trouble taking care of their expenses. The hockey team's budget still was unbalanced, but it is believed exhibitions will settle that problem.

Large returns are expected from the boxing and basketball tryouts, but the committee stressed that there still is a great need for contributions. Plans were laid for an intensive campaign.

The action of the Collegiate A. A. in voting to favor American participation and in urging members to contribute financially was applauded.

The final rowing tryouts were set for July 2, 3, and 4 on Carnegie Lake, Princeton, New Jersey. Washington, California, Navy, Princeton, Pennsylvania and Yale already have signified their intention of entering and it is hoped Cornell, Columbia, Harvard and others will compete.

Robert J. H. Kiphuth of Yale again was named coach of the swimming team. Bill Taylor withdrew as coach of the speed skaters because of his father's illness.

STANFORD WIN ROSE BOWL GAME FROM S. M. U.

Nearly 90,000 See Indians Tame Mustangs 7-0

both teams throughout the recent season. The Stanford touchdown was made in the first-quarter by Bill Paulman, tricky back for the Californians, when he went over the line from a scrimmage about 1 yd from the Mustangs' line. The Southern Methodists had stopped the same player at that spot when he had intercepted a forward pass and run the ball back to the Mustangs' one yard line. Bobby Reynolds, kicker for the white-sweated Stanford team, made the extra point on a convert.

Throughout the game the Indians had the better of the play and their mastery of making short decisive gains and their knack of breaking up nearly all of the Mustangs' attempts to use their celebrated aerial attack accounted largely for their win. Only the Mustangs forward passes was completed successfully. All the others attempts were either stopped by interception of the part of ever alert Stanford backs or were incomplete. Bobby Grayson, All American with the Indians, and Bobby Wilson, All American with the Mustangs played their last game, and were outstanding in the attacks and defences of both teams.

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REICH CAN'T LEAVE ALONE

BERLIN, Jan. 2.—Hopes of international athletic circles that the Hitler Government would relax its anti-Semitism during the Olympic games were dealt a severe blow with the announcement that German entrants must be as good Nazis as they are athletes.

Wilhelm Frick, Minister of the Interior, declared in a message to Hans von Tschammer und Osten, chief of the Reich's organized sports activities that all German participants in the international games must be educated in the "spirit of the Nazi State."

"Millions of Germans who are devoting themselves to sports must be moulded in the Nazi spirit," Dr. Fricks telegram said. "That is why the Reich League for Physical Exercises which will begin functioning on January 1, 1936, was formed."

"You have before you, the task of educating all members of your organization in the spirit of the Nazi State through the use of systematic exercises, and of making each member a conscious German."

"I rejoice that you have undertaken this task exactly coincident with the beginning of the Olympics year."

ALEX CONNELL MAY RETURN

OTTAWA, Jan. 2.—Alex. Connell, star net-minder of the Montreal Maroons last season when that team won the Stanley Cup, may be back in the uniform of the champion soon, so it was stated here on apparently well-founded grounds.

Connell was unable to join Maroons earlier because he could not get leave of absence from the Fire Department, of which he is secretary. The department was in the midst of re-organization, with pensions affected, and it was impossible to do this work without the presence of Connell.

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BEAVERS WIN FROM OAKS BY SCORE OF 11-3

St. Croix' Beat Senators 7-1 in Latters' Third Successive Game

SAINT JOHN, Jan. 1.—Action aplenty featured Saint John Beavers' 11-3 win over Rothesay Oaks in the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League game at the Forum last night. Some fancy net minding by young Gerry Lynch of Beavers, a lively fight that led to sentence of four players to the penalty bench at the same time, the all-round play of Bill Walker of the home team, the coach having six points, the passing attack of the winners and "Monkey" Chapman's outstanding play for the visitors all night featured the contest.

It was Beavers' sixth straight win in the loop and boosted the leaders' margin to ten points over the nearest club, Rothesay and St. Stephen. Attendance was only fair for a holiday night. The game was wide open throughout.

Most of the scrapping and the spilling came in the third period, a hectic session which saw the winners tally eight times and the losers twice. At one time Beavers were playing three men to five and demonstrated their superiority by racing down for two goals within 24 seconds of one another.

ANDREWS, Jan. 1.—Led by Russell, talented left winger, St. Stephen St. Croix hockey club chalked up its second victory of the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League here tonight, defeating the St. Andrews Senators 7-1. The Border Town team now rests in a second place tie in the loop with Rothesay Oaks with four points.

The visiting squad outplayed the homesters in all three verses, but it was a weakened team that went down in defeat. Only ten men were in uniform as Haughn, Ray Johnston and G. Johnston were unable to participate owing to injuries received in a previous league match.

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Former Girl Athlete Is Now a Man

PARIS, Jan. 2.—Zdenek Koubek who as a girl athlete in 1934 made many world records, is just a mediocre competitor now that she had changed her sex to male.

The change in sex—said to have been brought about by an operation done just before Christmas—made it necessary to alter Koubek's birth certificate and all other documents pertaining to him. He changed his name from the feminine form of "Sdenka Koubkova" to Zdenek Koubek, put on men's clothing and appeared for work as usual.

The Paris office of the International Women's Athletic Federation has scratched out all the records that Koubek made as a female. Koubek did not compete in athletics this year having resigned from the Czechoslovakian Women's Amateur Athletic Federation. But competing as a woman in the international games in London in 1934, Koubek set several world records.

Most of these records are only mediocre by male standards of competition. For instance, Zdenek ran the 100 metres in 12.2 seconds; the male mark is 10.2 seconds. His time for the 800 metres was 2 minutes, 12.4 seconds, compared to the world record of one minute, 49.8 seconds.

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
