Chief Karl Walker of the local department organized the younger squad about two months ago and under his careful instructions have taken a real interest in the work. He is to be commended on his wise move in looking ahead to the future when the training of the juniors will prove a real asset to the city's organization.

At Oromocto one of the most successful Firemen's Sports ever held in Central New Brunswick took place with teams representing Oromocto, Fredericton, Fairville, Devon, and Woodstock competing. An interesting feature was the hose coupling race run by Misses Florence Rice and Ruth Mullin of Chief Walker's contingent.

In speaking of his junior teams, Chief Walker expressed the hope that other departments would soon organize such squads. It is understood that Devon and Oromocto will start a Junior Department soon.

An enthusiastic audience watched the events with interest. The local entries captured the senior and junior hose coupling race and the junior ladder race. The team from Oromocto came first in the ladder race while the Fairville first fighters copped honors in the relay race.

The second Fredericton junior team, composed of Jerry Finnegan, son of Peter Finnigan, Fredericton fire department driver, and Jerry Staples, completed its feat in 11 1-2 seconds, less than a second behind the senior champions. The Oromocto junior coupling teams were made up of William Neals and William Shanks, as the first team, and James Campbell and Keith Kimball, the second. Then completed their events in 12 1-2 and 15 seconds, respectively.

The Fredericton junior ladder team was made up of Fred Desaulniers, jr., D. Saunders, J. Staples, J. O'Neill, G. Finnegan, B. Nason (climber) and A. Chase. 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## IS NORTHERN N. B. DIVERTING TOURIST TRAVEL TO QUE.?

### Charge Campbellton Tourist People Are Boosting Gaspé

#### Divert Tourists

### Gaspé Hotels Distributing Anti-N.B. Propaganda is Alleged

According to commercial travellers who have arrived from the North Shore, an organized effort is being made by Campbellton people to divert foreign tourist cars which have been visiting the Gaspé Peninsula, from this section of the province. An effort is also being made by the Gaspé people to route the tourists up to the Metapedia Valley and away from this province.

Thirteen hundred foreign cars visit the Gaspé Coast daily. Of these 225 approximately cross the ferry at Campbellton and come into New Brunswick. Of this 225 cars daily, 175 are directed to cross the Stewart highway in northern New Brunswick from Campbellton to St. Leonard's and leave the province at the St. Leonard's-Van Buren, Maine, bridge. Only fifty of these 225 cars daily come east, and see any other part of New Brunswick.

A very nice little booklet called "The Open Road" has been issued by the Campbellton people. This booklet stresses the fact of there being a fine new motor road from the Maine border at St. Leonard across northern New Brunswick to the scenic districts surrounding the historic Bay Chaleur and stresses the fact that it brings the seashore of New Brunswick one hundred miles nearer the New England States than does other highways in New Brunswick. Instead of boosting New Brunswick this booklet, including the map of the province, boosts the Gaspé Peninsula.

And the Gaspé Peninsula is included on the map the same as though it were part of the Province of New Brunswick. It is also said that special tourist trips by bus are being arranged in the New England States to bring tourists into New Brunswick. Their idea of New Brunswick is across the Stewart highway from St. Leonard to Campbellton and on up the Gaspé Peninsula into Quebec.

The road from St. Leonard on the Maine border to Campbellton, on the Quebec border, passes through a section of country which has yet been unsettled to any extent, and which has, within the past year been burnt over. This road does not give one an idea of the scenic beauties of New Brunswick and it is claimed by hotelmen that the way this tourist business is handled seems to be decidedly unfair to the rest of New Brunswick.

Those who have been on the Gaspé Peninsula say that the hotel-keepers in that area are directing tourists to keep away from the Province of New Brunswick, especially the eastern part and to either take the Metapedia Valley route, in Quebec, or else to cross

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## MACHINE GUNNERS AWAY TOMORROW FOR ALDERSHOT

### Will Meet "A" and "B" Companies at Saint John

#### 24 of All Ranks

### Major W. F. Blair O. C. Local Company—Annual Training

The Central Camp of the 7th. Battalion Machine Gunners, is scheduled to open tomorrow at Aldershot, a few miles from Kentville, N. S., with companies from Military District No. 7. A total of 96 of all ranks will be under canvas this year to participate in the regular annual summer training of Machine Gunners.

"C" Company from this city will be under the command of Major W. F. Blair, who left for Aldershot on Monday to aid in preparation for the opening. Tomorrow morning 24 of all ranks including four officers will leave at 5.05 on the C.P.R. for Saint John where they will march to the C.P.S. Princess Helene to join "A" and "B" Companies from Saint John and Moncton respectively. From there the entire battalion will sail to Digby and entrain for Aldershot arriving there late in the afternoon.

Of the 24 of all ranks from Fredericton, the officers are Major W. F. Blair, O.C., Lieut. Yorke McLean, Lieut. Robert Wilby, and Lieut. J. Edwin Hall. Lieutenant Hall will have command of the local company tomorrow morning and will continue in charge until the company is handed over to Major Blair who is now in Aldershot.

## Two Small Forest Fires in Province; Now Under Control

Chief Forester George L. Miller, today reported the outbreak of two small forest fires, both of which are now under control, however. One occurred south of the Bathurst road, burning a few square feet. This blaze is now out. The second fire occurred yesterday near Pabineau Falls, in Gloucester county, and is believed to have started from a cigarette thrown from an automobile. The fire was burning last night, but is reported under control this morning. The fire burned down hill and the fire fighters had a good chance to fight it successfully. The outbreak of these small fires and the comparative lack of outbreaks this summer brings to mind the pleasant fact that that forest fires in the province this summer have been practically negligible. Even in places where the fires occurred they were small and did very little damage.

### CONDITION UNCHANGED

MacMillan, of this city, who received serious injuries while engaged in construction work at Saint John a short time ago, was reported to be unchanged this week. 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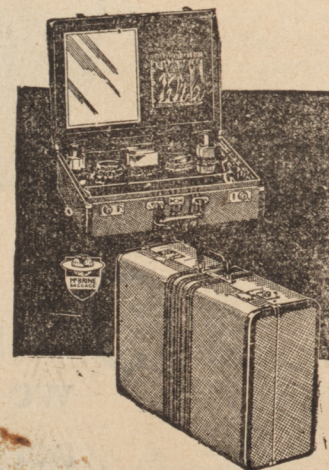
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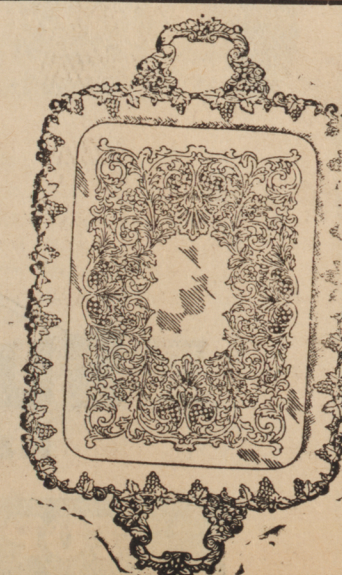
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
