DEVON AND MARYSVILLE ASK RESTRICTED BUS PARKING SPACE ON CARLETON STREET

Delegation Appeared Before City Council at Its December Meeting Last Night --- Devon and Marysville Believe That Buses Should Be Given Chance to Take On, Let Out Passengers.

At the regular monthly meeting of the City Council last night a delegation from the towns of Devon and Marysville asked that better parking facilities be provided on Carleton street for the bus operating between this city and the towns represented.

The meeting was called to order by Mayor Kitchen and Mayor J. Walter Walker and Alderman Horace Pettigrove of Marysville, and Mayor A. J. McEvoy of Devon were introduced.

Mayor Walker said that a large number of Marysville citizens travel by bus and that no parking space was provided on Carleton street which resulted in much inconvenience to the bus passengers. He wished to know if the matter could not be remedied as it was dangerous for the passengers to have to walk out into the traffic when boarding or descending from the bus.

Mayor McEvoy said that he concurred in what Mayor Walker said. He further stated that Devon is theoretically a suburb of Fredericton as near

ly all purchasing is done here by the people of Devon since the bus service was instituted and that this had nearly ruined the merchants of Devon. He said that in view of the business this bus line brought to Fredericton the city should do something to aid the traffic and that as Carleton street is about the centre of the buying district it is a better place for the terminal than a site farther up or down town.

Mayor Kitchen said that there is no by-law to provide for a parking place for buses but that the Council is considering the matter of revising the by-laws and that when that part is reached it would be given consideration and adjusted as quickly as possible.

Alderman Pettigrove said that there were parking facilities for the other bus terminal and this looked like discrimination against Marysville. He said that Marysville should have special consideration because that town gave employment to some of Fredericton's citizens. Any governing body should be able to relieve the situation, he said.

Mayor Kitchen said that no preference was given to any bus line by the Council and that there was less traffic down by the other terminal.

Alderman Pettigrove said that he did not wish to become involved in a controversy between the bus companies but as there were no "no parking" signs at the Carleton street terminal it looked to him like discrimination.

Alderman McCaughey suggested that the large space behind the post office might make a good bus terminal.

Alderman Ross said that there was formerly a "no parking" sign on Carleton street but that it had disappeared and he had mentioned it at a former Council meeting but that no one seemed to know much about it. He thought that if there was an opportunity for one bus to park there it should be sufficient but that he had seen two buses there at one time.

Mayor Walker said that it would be perfectly satisfactory if there was a chance for one bus to park.

The delegation was assured that the matter would be given consideration.

Alderman Crewdson reported that tax collections for November this year were \$7,409.97 as against \$8,131.57 for the same month last year.

Alderman Mundle reporting Municipal Home Committee said that probably just as many were looking for relief this year as last and that probably something would be forthcoming in the next few days to give some intimation what will be done for the winter.

Alderman Hagerman submitted the report of the fire chief which was referred to the fire committee.

Lower Hainesville

Empress of Japan Takes Eucharistic Conference Pilgrims

VANCOUVER, B. C., Dec. 1—Manila hotels report a heavy advance booking for the period of the 33rd International Eucharistic Congress to be held in the Philippine capital on Feb. 3 to 7 according to officers of the Empress of Asia which sailed from here, with an advance guard of pilgrims who planned to spend a few weeks in China and Japan before the Congress opens.

Every available bed around Manila is being prepared for the accommodation of the thousands of devout Roman Catholics who are even now converging upon Manila, they said, and arrangements have been made for the Empress of Russia to be used as an hotel for pilgrims who travel there by Canadian Pacific.

The last departure from Vancouver and Victoria to arrive at Manila in time for the Congress will be that of the Empress of Japan January 9 but it is expected that the Empress of Canada December 12 and Empress of Russia Dec. 18 will each carry a quota.

Two days after closing session of the Congress February 9, the Empress of Russia sails for Vancouver and Victoria by way of Shanghai, Nagasaki, Koke and Yokohama arriving at Victoria February 27 in the morning and docking here late the same day.

The international Eucharistic Congress is drawing a great deal of attention to the Philippines and agents report that many non-Catholics are taking advantage of the excursions planned to visit friends.

INCOME TAX SECRECY NOW CONDITIONAL

Public disclosure of Canadian Cottons Ltd., income tax figures by C. Fraser Elliott, Commissioner of Income Tax at Ottawa this week, raises a question of far-reaching importance to every Canadian taxpayer, whether corporation or individual. Heretofore income tax returns have been inviolate even to Parliament and, in respect to public demand, the utmost secrecy has shrouded every stage in the filing and maintenance of these records.

Now Justice W. F. A. Turgeon has ruled that his Textile Commission was instructed to obtain profit figures of Canadian textile companies and that since these profit statements have been shown to be misleading, on account of secret inventory reserves, it is necessary to obtain corrected income tax figures to get a proper picture.

No ruling has been issued by the Minister of National Revenue as to his position in this matter, but since Mr. Elliott has appeared officially before the Commission, it is presumed the department is accepting the viewpoint of Justice Turgeon, namely that publicity is necessary where fraudulent or improper returns have been disclosed.

Possibly the public will not object very much to the view that income tax secrecy should be conditional upon a company playing fair with its returns. But the danger in such a ruling lies in the precedent it sets for subsequent Royal Commissions who may proceed one step farther and declare that they are entitled to demand information from the income tax branch in the future without first proving that fraud or impropriety has been committed. Then members of Parliament would demand production of individual returns in the House. Soon there would be no privacy at all in anyone's affairs.

It is important that the Minister of National Revenue, either now or when Parliament convenes in January, makes the position of the department extremely clear and take legislative steps, if necessary, to protect the privacy of income tax returns of honest citizens and corporations even from Royal Commissions.

CHEAP RATES TO PACIFIC COAST FOR CHRISTMAS

MONTREAL, Dec. 2—Canada's evergreen playground on the Pacific Coast is again this year attracting widespread attention and the two Canadian Railways are affording the opportunity to Canadians from the East to get there at low round trip fares, according to announcement by C. P. Riddell, chairman, Canadian Passenger Association. The combination of great mountain ranges and the Japan current off the coast accounts for the mildness of climate on the Pacific Coast and its consequent popularity among Canadians who prefer it to the rigors of winter elsewhere.

To meet the demand thus aroused, both railways will place on sale low round-trip tickets from Port Arthur, Armstrong and all stations east thereof in Ontario and in Quebec and the Maritime Provinces to destinations in British Columbia, Oregon and Washington. These tickets will be on sale up to May 14, with return limit of six months from date of sale.

Stop-over privileges will be allowed at all stations on going or return trips. Various optional routes will be in effect for these excursions without additional charge, including passage through United States territory and also optional routes on Canadian lines, or by other various routes, with slight additional charge. Special winter rates will also be available at hotels.

Victoria offers excellent golf over scenically located and spectacular courses. One of the outstanding events of the season is the Empress Winter Golf Tournament which takes place from March 1 to 6. The Vancouver Island Spring Festival at Victoria, from April 24 to May 1 attracts visitors from far and near. There is also fishing, tennis and other summer sports while variety is furnished by the excellent opportunities for skiing and tobogganing, snow-shoeing and other winter sports in the nearby mountains.

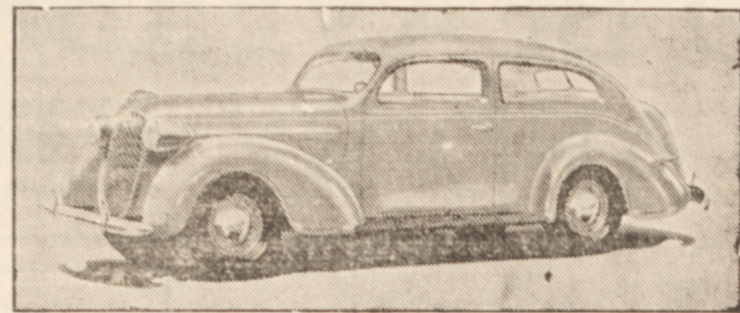
