point On a recent day this battery of twelve hens, each in separate compartments laid a total of 14 eggs, and on another day together laid 13 eggs. They regularly lay more than any other twelve hens at the Experimental Station, Mr. Bailey states. The present experiment has been carried on from November 1 to October 31, a period of one year.

Similar experiments are carried on at other experimental stations with the same satisfactory results from the standpoint of more output. In their steel frame cages the hens are without exercise though they have access to water and food. The ordinary practice has been to allow hens all the freedom of space they want.

IMPERIAL RUSSIAN SINGERS DELIGHT F'TON AUDIENCE

Varied Programme
Rendered in Masterly
Style by Noted Singers.

As a fitting close of the season of the Community Concerts in the city the Imperial Russian Singers delighted a large audience last evening at the Normal School. The various numbers on the programme brought overwhelming applause and the artists kindly responded with several fascinating encores.

Five astounding voices—a first tenor, a second tenor, a baritone, a basso and a basso-profundo—compose the concert group known as the Russian Imperial Singers. The baritone, Stephen Slepoushkin, is the leader of this famous organization, which presented a picturesque appearance on the stage in costumes as worn by Russian noblemen of 100 years ago. The repertoire of the artists included sacred music, classical numbers, popular pieces and Russian folksongs. To hear these voices of rich deep tone the heritage of the Slav, in their various temperaments was to get a glimpse of Russian life and culture, which has disappeared forever. Although each number was rendered with art and beauty perhaps three numbers might be singled out as remaining uppermost in the minds of the listeners. The popular number "The Sleeping Lake" by Venn, depicting the joyful peace of night on the beautiful lake carried the audience back to the native soil of the singers. The Laughing Polka as it was in the days prior to the advent of machinery in Russia dispelled the idea that all was mournful in the days of the Imperial Regime. The "Church Bells of Noogorod," a realistic representation of those bells which in the peasant's mind rivalled the bells of Moscow, were rung very truly last night by the master voices or the noted singers. We should be grateful to those who were instrumental in bringing to the city the Russian Imperial Singers, who have interpreted to us a phase of Russian life now gone forever. The real history of a people is contained in their folk songs and ballads.


