Of Interest to Women

HOW CAN I ???

Q. How can I drive a nail into plaster, without marring the wall?
A. A nail can be driven into a plastered wall without crumbling the plaster if the nail is put in hot water for a few minutes, or dipped into melted paraffin.

Q. How can I prevent dandruff?
A. Dissolve one ounce of flour of sulphur in one quart of soft water. Do not use it until it is thoroughly mixed and settled. Apply at night.

Q. How can I successfully launder ties?
A. Before washing ties, baste them carefully, to prevent the lining or padding from becoming lumpy. Remove the basting before ironing and the ties will look like new.

Q. How can I make a good toilet perfume?
A. A good toilet perfume can be made by mixing two ounces of alcohol with one-half ounce of orris root. Keep in a bottle, tightly corked, and shake well before using.

Q. How can I bleach a scorched spot?
A. Rub the spot immediately with a cloth dipped in diluted peroxide. Then rub the iron over it and it will be as white as originally. Do not use this method on colored material.

Q. How can I test eggs for freshness?
A. Place the egg in a pan of water. If fresh, it will be on its side. If a few days old, it will tip upwards. If stale it will stand on end. If very old, it will float.

Q. How can I make a cement for pipe joints?
A. Mix ten pounds of yellow ochre, four pounds of ground litharge, four pounds of whiting, one-half pound of hemp, cut up fine. Mix together with linseed to about the consistency of putty.

Q. How can I remove a rusty screw?
A. Heat a poker or spike red-hot and apply it to the head of a screw that is rusty and obstinate. When the screw has become hot it can be removed very easily.

Q. How can I take away all dampness of rooms?
A. Place blocks of camphor in all corners and on the shelves, replacing them as they evaporate.

IS IT PROPAGANDA? WORST OF WINTER NOW OVER, SAYS AGED RED MAN

The Sentinel is receiving weekly, as doubtless all other Canadian newspapers are receiving, a paper called L'Italia, which appear to be issued by or on behalf of the Fronte Uniro Italiana Montreal, and is devoted to the publication of Italian propaganda in connection with the war in Africa. Part of the paper is printed in English, part in French and the remainder in Italian. Some of the statements made in the English section are pretty strong; some of those in the French section are even stronger; being unable to read Italian we can't say just what is contained in this part of the paper, but from the odd few words we can understand we would judge that it is strongest of all.

We Canadians pride ourselves on the freedom of speech allowed the press. We regard it as one of the principal foundation stones of our liberty. Probably that is why no steps have been taken to suppress this organ, which is frankly anti-British in its entire tone, enough so that we consider it is probably defeating its own purpose of stirring up sympathy of the Italian cause. We do not believe that a publication issuing anti-Italian propaganda would be allowed to live long in Italy, but that is beside the question.

In its present issue L'Italia has a very definite charge to make. It states without any qualification that the English are furnishing the Ethiopians with dum-dum bullets. The article goes on to explain that munitions captured from the Ethiopians included dum-dum bullets both for machine guns and rifles. "The machine guns," it states in French, "carry the inscription from the house of Vickers, and the dum-dum bullets are furnished by the House of Eley Brothers, of London".

Dum-dum bullets are a soft-nosed variety, forbidden by international law to be used in warfare. They may be made either by using soft material, such as lead, for the nose of the bullet, or by notching the nose of a hard bullet so that it will split, or flatten when it strikes a bone, instead of inflicting a clean wound as is made by a hard nosed bullet.

The charge is a serious one. If it is true someone should be severely taken to task. If it is not true the Canadian authorities may well consider whether this publication is not one that might be dispensed with. At any rate the charge should be strictly investigated.

In this case the firm accused of the wrong doing is named. If they are guilty as alleged by the article it should not be a difficult matter to prove it. It may be pointed out that troops in the field sometimes have been known to take legitimate bullets and convert them into dum-dums. However, the definite charge is that the English are supplying the Ethiopians with dum-dum bullets, and that charge has been made within the boundaries of Canada. The matter should not be allowed to rest without investigation.

CLUB TO GIVE PLAY BY LADY TWEEDSMUIR

OTTAWA, Ont., Jan. 16.—The Ottawa Drama League will present one of Lady Tweedsmuir's works at the Eastern Ontario Regional Drama Festival in Kingston, February 26 to 29. It is "The Vision at the Inn", a one-act historical play, which under the pen-name of Susan Buchan, she dramatized from "The Maid", a novel of Joan of Arc, written by her husband, the Governor-General of Canada.

AGAINST "BOOZE," SAYS ABERHART

CALGARY, Jan. 16.—Premier Aberhart told the congregation at his Prophetic Bible Institute here Sunday he would be glad if "booze" could be eliminated from the Province, but the sale of alcoholic beverages could not be prevented "with the mind of the people as it is".

The Premier made the statement in reply to one of "three letters of criticism". A letter from a Saskatchewan citizen who was "looking over the boundary line fence at Alberta" asked Mr. Aberhart how he could conscientiously conduct the Bible institute while his Government was "selling booze for revenue".

"Because I can't stop other men from drinking is no reason I can't conduct a Bible Class", he stated. "The criticism is fair, but it's not logical. We cannot help it".

The Province had local option legislation and any section of Alberta that so desired could forbid liquor sales, Mr. Aberhart remarked.

NO AAA PARALLEL IS POSSIBLE HERE

TORONTO, Ont., Jan. 16.—A situation parallel to that in the United States yesterday, due to the failure of the AAA to pass the scrutiny of nine Supreme Court Justices, cannot exist in Canada under the British North America Act, stated R. A. Reid, K. C., in an interview with The Globe last night.

New Deal—"Raw Deal"

Speaking of the ruling of invaded States' rights made by the Supreme Court, Mr. Reid pointed out that the converse of the United States Constitution was expressed in the B. N. A. Act under which it was possible for the Dominion to keep pace with industrial and social change by the use of enlarged powers of legislation, with which it may enter Provincial legislative fields.

"The New Deal", which the Roosevelt Administration endeavored to give the people of the United States, has been turned into what might be called a "Raw Deal", by the United States Supreme Court", said Mr. Reid. "The Supreme Court says, in effect, that the legislation now declared in valid, is an invasion of the reserved powers of the States, and that no authority exists under the United States Constitution by which such jurisdiction can be invaded by Congress."

"The decision has no constitutional or legal effect, nor any parallel, in Canada", said Mr. Reid, "because under the British North America Act the Dominion Government has full jurisdiction to invade the legislative area and powers of the Provinces under various conditions, which the Privy Council has laid down in a long line of decisions over a period of seventy years, or since the B. N. A. Act was passed in 1867."

Supersede Provincial Rights

"The Dominion legislation now in reference to the Supreme Court of Canada is a good illustration of what I mean", said Mr. Reid. "There, nine or ten statutes of the Dominion Parliament are being investigated with a view to their constitutionality, and in each instance, no doubt, the Provinces may say that they think their constitutional rights are being invaded by the Dominion", said Mr. Reid.

"In regard to some of that legislation the Provinces may, under certain circumstances, have had a prior right to legislate about it, or perhaps a concurrent right, but once the Provincial matters dealt with this legislation come within the purview of the treaty-making and enforcing powers of the Dominion, as some of it does, all Provincial authority ceases and goes by the board", said Mr. Reid. "Again we have special 'emergency powers of legislation' residing in the Dominion, although not expressly granted under the B. N. A. Act, and also ancillary powers of legislation, and special Dominion implied powers to legislate in case of pestilence, famine, war, and all matters of national importance and urgency which have assumed such proportions as to affect the body politic."

"Under the decisions of the United States Supreme Court, no matter how important or urgent a matter of national importance may become, yet, if it is a State right, as they call it, Congress cannot legislate", he said.

"Changing social, economic, financial or industrial conditions do not enlarge or increase legislative power under the United States Constitution. In Canada it is exactly the reverse, and such changes do give the Dominion authorities added increased and enlarged powers of legislation."

"What the British North America Act needs", said Mr. Reid is "interpretation", not amendment".
