

Coming Together of Bud Wenger, Calumet Budlong, and Laurel Hanover is Climax of Maritime Racing Season—Woodstock and Charlottetown Precedents Cited By "Dave" Griffith, Racing Secretary-Fine Array of Horseflesh.

(By Harry Garvie) Several features loom for the Fredericton Exhibition harness meet, which commences on Tuesday of next week and winds up on Thursday starring an outstand-Free-For-All.

Foremost is the question whether the Fredericton race track record of 2:04 3-4 will be shattered, in the face of similar performances on the Woodstock and Charlottetown tracks this season. Budwenger, the startling pacer out of the T. V. Holdaway stables at Houlton, Maine, broke both track records when he paced off heats of 2:05 1-4, to set up new marks for those ovals. The Fredericton track, the fastest half-mile racing turf in Canada, and undoubtedly two seconds faster than either of the two tracks named, will see not only Bud Wenger, but Calumet Budlong and Laurel Hanover competing in the big event. The experts who have been following the 1936 careers of these horses are convinced that with any sort of decent weather, the track record should be taken. Bud Wenger, Calumet Budlong 2:02 3-4, and Laurel Hanover, 1:59 1-4, are the three outstanding horses racing in the east this summer. Their coming together at the Fredericton exhibition races is a super attraction not to be missed.

CINCINNATI **HEADING FOR** A PENNANT

Buying Minor League Stars For Next Year-Pay \$80,000 For Five.

CINCINNATI, Sept. 11-The Cincinnati Reds, enjoying one of their nost prosperous seasons in a decade, set their sights toward the National League pennant today by paying \$80,-000 in cash and players for five minor league stars.

The purchases, which included four players from Nashville of the Southern Association and Third Baseman Eddie Joost of the San Francisco Missions, brought to more than \$115,-000 the total the Reds have spent for baseball "ivory" in the past few

Best of Quality

Another allurement of this year's exhibition meet is the fact that there is the largest number and the best quality of entries in a period of over fifteen years. We have "Dave" Griffith's word for that. The racing secretary claims that not since Sir Roche, Margaret Dillon and Single G. clashed here in 1923 and combined to break the track record, has there been such an array of competitive horseflesh. This applies not only in the Free-For-All but in all the other classes as well. Single G's mark of 2:04 3-4 in 1923 still stands as a win-race record for the Fredericton oval Guesswork bettered this mark in 1926 but negotiated the distance against time, which is something else.

The Fredericton exhibition races will have a Newfoundland horse competing for the first time in the track's history. Harvest Melody is the horse and the bay mare performed most creditably in Prince Edward Island. She is owned by Willis Reid of Saint Johns, Nfd. Entered in the 2:24 Trot, she will be driven by none other than Lt. Col. D. A. Mac-Kinnon, D.S.O., president of the Charlottetown Exhibition, and one of the Maritimes' outstanding sportsmen.

For First Time Another noteworthy feature this year is that next week's races will bring together for the first time this summer the headliners from the Maritime and Maine circuits. It will be the first serious competition of Maine and Maritime horseflesh. The indication, too, is that the grandstand will be representative of Maine harness racing fandom as well as the usual coterie of New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and P. E. I. supporters. This should furnish some harmless international rivalry and the odd side-bet. George Howes and his pari-mutual shouldn't suffer

any by this lineup either. Already there is a buzz around the stables with preparations astir for the approaching race week Certain stables have already arrived. Others are expected en masse over the week-end. Hedley Fulton, of Upper Stewiacke, N. S., former owner of Darkey Grattan and better known as the breeder of Peter Pokey, holder of the Fredericton trotting record, will have his stable here. A stable is on the way from Presque Isle, Maine, the land not only of potatoes, but of some of the finest racing flesh in the east. A Cape Breton contingent is expected to arrive on Monday.

Spice of Programme Interest centers on the Free-For-All, scheduled for Thursday. The spice of the programme is the injection of Laurel Hanover into action with Calumet Budlong and Bud Wenger. The competitive note between the latter two has been the highlight of the racing season. To date the North Sydney pacer, owner by Mrs. Margar-

ger twice, and is the only horse to beat the Maine entry this year. But it will be the first time that Laurel Hanover has met these two headliners this year. Check that to the programme sagacity of Mr. Griffiths and his associ-

A "Dark Horse?" The Hanover gelding is owned by Sullivan and Mawhinney of Machias, Maine, and is the first

Maine-owned horse to beat the two minute mark. On September 27, 1935, Laurel Hanover breezed the mile in 1:59 1-4 at Lexington. He was purchased at the Old Glory Sale in 1934, having been consigned to the sale by the Hanover Shoe Farm. Laurel Hanover has been under the expert tutelage of Will Crozier since that time and has been racing consistently well on the Grand Circuit. There will be possibly three other

starters in the Free-For-All but from here it looks like a Big Three attraction, with Laurel Hanover looking as the "dark

The entire three days' racing has attractive entries, all of which will be found elsewhere on this page. Altogether the Fredericton Exhibition races this year appear to be just about the climax of the harness racing season in the Maritimes.
