### ENTERTAIN FRIENDS AT DESSERT BRIDGE

Just the Thing for Warmer Weather with Guests  
Arriving After Lunch—Recipes for  
Appropriate Dishes

When warmer weather arrives "dessert bridge" is apt to replace the heavier "luncheon-bridge" of the winter months. And a dessert bridge is rather a pleasant way to entertain your friends and club members. We suggest that the players arrive after lunch—a meal from which they have omitted dessert—and then you treat them to something luscious in the way of a "finale." Or serve the temptation about three o'clock in the afternoon, between rounds. Some hostesses prefer to wait until the game is over, but this is sometimes so late that the eating of a rich dessert interferes with dinner appetites. Desserts which can be prepared well in advance—all ready to take from the refrigerator and serve—are indeed a boon to the modern hostess.

#### Orange Custard Cream

1 pint water  
2 cups granulated sugar  
1½ cups orange juice  
1-16 teaspoon salt  
4 egg yolks  
1 pint whipping cream  
Grated rind 3 oranges  
Boil water and sugar to thin syrup. Then add grated rind, orange juice and egg yolks that have been slightly beaten. Allow mixture to cook again for approximately five minutes, stirring constantly, being careful not to overcook. Remove from fire and cool. Fold in whipped cream, pour into freezing tray and allow to freeze without stirring. Serves 10 to 12.

#### Frozen Crumb Cake

2 cups sponge cake crumbs (any leftover cake crumbs)  
1 cup whipping cream  
½ cup chopped English walnuts  
Whip cream and combine with the cake crumbs. Add nuts and pour into freezing tray. Freeze without stirring. Slice for serving. Fruit can be added to the above recipe, either frozen with the cake or chilled and served with it. Maraschino cherries can be added, if desired.

#### Butterscotch Parfait

2-3 cup brown sugar  
2 tablespoons butter  
½ cup water  
4 egg yolks  
1 pint whipping cream

Pinch of salt  
2 teaspoons vanilla  
Combine sugar and butter. Heat until melted. Cook for one minute. Add water. Cook until butterscotch is melted. Add syrup mixture slowly to beaten egg yolks. Cook in double boiler until light and fluffy. Chill. Add whipped cream, salt and vanilla. Pour into freezing tray. Freeze without stirring. Chopped nuts may be added. Ten to 12 servings.

#### Mocha Mousse

2 egg yolks  
½ cup sugar  
2 cups milk  
1-3 cup ground coffee  
1 cup heavy cream, whipped  
Beat egg yolks slightly in top of double boiler, add sugar, milk and coffee, and mix well. Place over rapidly boiling water and cook until mixture coats spoon slightly, stirring frequently. Strain through cheese-cloth. When cool, add cream, and freeze in trays. Makes about one quart.

Serve mocha mousse with chocolate sauce and garnish with pecan meats or salted almonds.

#### Graham Cracker Refrigerator Cake

½ pound graham crackers  
½ pound marshmallows  
1 cup chopped dates  
1 cup chopped walnuts  
1 cup thin cream  
Pinch of salt

Roll crackers fine, cut marshmallows in quarters; mix with dates and nuts, add cream slowly until mixture is moist enough to form into roll. Wrap in wax paper, place in refrigerator for several hours. Slice, serve with whipped cream or custard sauce.

#### Lime Ice

2-3 cup sugar  
1 pint water  
½ cup lime juice  
Green food coloring  
2 egg whites  
Dash of salt

Cook sugar and water slowly for ten minutes. Add to strained lime juice. Cool. Add green food coloring. Pour into freezing tray and allow to freeze until firm. Remove to ice-cold mixing bowl and beat with rotary beater until mixture becomes

very light. Fold in stiffly-beaten egg whites to which salt has been added. Return to tray and allow to finish freezing.

Variations: Lemon juice can be used with part lime juice.

Lime extract can be used with lemon juice, adding the extract until the desired flavor is produced.

## LEARN TO CARE FOR YOUR CLOTHES

You'll Be Well Repaid  
For Time You Devote  
Each Day

Rules for good taste in dressing are the same for every woman whether she has an extremely limited budget or a very liberal clothes allowance. She should buy simple dresses and suits—well cut and made of the best materials she can afford.

It is far better to have one fine dress with two or three different colors than three mediocre outfits that stretch out of shape, fade at the cleaner's and look shoddy after the first week's wear.

Learning to care for your clothes is as important as knowing how to buy them. Why get a beautiful tailored skirt if you can have no intention of keeping it pressed or a superior felt hat if you never use a hat brush?

Pay special attention to your shoes. Several women we know include cleaning and heel-straightening allowances right in their beauty budgets. Don't spend so much on hair and face that you have no money left for grooming. It really is better in the long run to have home instead of professional facials and to do your own nails than to spend huge sums on these and do without lifts for your run-down heels and stockings that actually flatter your legs.

Speaking of stockings, you know of course, that you should wear a fresh pair every day. Rinse them out in soap suds and warm water the minute you take them off. Buy the kind and shade which make your legs look graceful and slender. Keep the seams absolutely straight. Unless you have legs worthy of a beauty contest, don't go in for exotic nets and laces or contrasting arrows at the ankles. Be conservative when it comes to stockings and shoes.

## QUINTS ON AIR THURSDAY P. M. BIRTHDAY PARTY

NORTH BAY, Ont., May 28—The Dionne quintuplets will be on the air as the feature attraction of the Canadian Radio Commission broadcast from the Dafoe hospital at Corbett on the afternoon of May 28, the quint's second birthday. Judge J. A. Valin, chairman of the guardians said as he discussed details of the party.

"The people would like to hear them, you know," said the venerable ex-jurist, who has taken the quint's to his home.

Premier Hepburn and Hon. David A. Croll are expected to attend the party and will also speak. Dr. A. R. Dafoe, the physician to the quint's, will give a brief outline of their development since their birth. Judge Valin will speak in French and English.

It is likely that Father McNally of Sacred Heart Church at Corbett, spiritual director of the quint's, will offer a special Mass of thanksgiving on the morning of the birthday.

For the quint's themselves it will just be another day, nothing, said Dr. Dafoe, will be allowed to disturb their routine or their diet.

Late in the day Archbishop McGriggin and Bishop Dignan will visit the hospital and extend congratulations to the Dionne babies, who celebrate their second birthday on May 28. All Ontario state officers will convene here on Sunday to discuss final details of the agenda.

### ATLANTIC 'PHONE RATES CUT
