## Hypnotic Sleep Not Real, Brain Study Indicates

TUOXDO PARK, May 27—Hypnotic "sleep" is not at all like real sleep, at least so far as the physiological state of the brain is concerned.

Evidence to this effect has been produced at the private research laboratory of Dr. Alfred L. Loomis here in "brain wave" studies conducted jointly by Dr. Loomis, Prof. E. Newton Harvey and Princeton university, and Garret Hobart of the Loomis laboratory. Brain waves were registered from the same person in walking, normal sleeping and hypnotic states. The wave patterns produced under hypnosis were like those of a waking rather than a sleeping person.

The researchers therefore conclude: "It would seem that the term hypnotic 'sleep' is not a correct one for the hypnotic state, at least as measured by this criterion".

**GEOLOGICAL SURVEY**  
While the complete plans have not yet been made for the start of the geological survey in this province it was learned today that a start will probably be made by June 1. It is expected that the usual number of University of New Brunswick graduates and undergraduates will be absorbed for the work but their number has not yet been determined.

FAIRY LAUGHTER

The fairies have disappeared from most of the world. It has become too noisy and machine-ridden and sophisticated for the green folk. Because the fairies can live only by the belief of man and when that dies, they die.

But it is still possible to believe in fairies in Prince Edward Island... that colorful little land of ruby and emerald and sapphire which is not like any other part of the planet. There are still places there where fairies can live... winding lanes back in the woods... ferny dells with brooks slipping through them... eternal green twilight under low-growing spruces and ferns where June-bells and ladies'-lips abound. Do you know what June-bells and ladies'-lips are? If you don't I pity you. Go to Prince Edward Island and find out before it is too late.

But you won't find out in a scurry by motor car over dusty roads which the Government is making ugly and serviceable as fast as it can. No, you must leave your car and steal on foot to the places where the fairies hide... the little green valley like a dimple among the fields... the clump of silver birches at the turn of some irresponsible path... the plantation of tiny spruces just beginning to take sly possession of some neglected pasture corner... the narrow blue river looping around a purple hill... the field snow-white with daisies lying under a young moon. And there you will find them... almost. Just around that curve... just around that little rise... if you can move quickly and silently enough. Only... you never can. You always just miss them... but their laughter floats back to you in the sudden whisper of the wind and the puckish rustle of the aspen.

And that is your reward. For it is good to hear fairy laughter and forget the world for awhile.

## "I BELIEVE IN PEOPLE"

(Archer Wallace)

So will you, dear reader, when you have leisurely pursued this volume, replete with miniature narratives of persons who have enriched a world which seemed not kind to them. A sermon in the truest sense, in that it is not "preachy," and such a revitalizing heart-to-heart chat with a very human and manifestly sincere writer that the reader clings to every word and "listens" until long past the usual hour for retiring. When Archer Wallace says "I believe in people," he says as well "I believe in God," and earnestly asks for wider recognition of the unalterable truth that all souls are precious to The Creator and Giver of all. For this book of good cheer, one might very well suggest a subtitle, "THE FATHERHOOD OF GOD, THE BROTHERHOOD OF MAN." "Truth is stranger than fiction" to a marked degree in this readable book of two hundred and ten pages; in fact, STRONGER than fiction, in its recording of actual instances of "blessings in disguise." A passage in the Old Testament tells us that "Man seeth not as God seeth, for Man looketh on the outward appearance, but the Lord looketh on the heart." What cruel injustices have been wrought by this universal human weakness. How prone we are to take things for granted, to jump at conclusions, and to judge without ascertaining all the facts. How unwilling we are to be tolerant, to show compassion, to learn conditions and circumstances. If we could but revive, rather than stifle, the remaining sparks of good in some whom we encounter on Life's path, what real happiness would be theirs and ours, and others. Yes, "Men are pearls," regardless of their progress. You will enjoy this refreshing, enlightening book long after you have read it. And the new outlook on life which it will give you will prove a joy and a blessing to you and to those with whom you come in contact.
