Lady Tweedsmuir Will Inaugurate Radio Addresses

Her Excellency Lady Tweedsmuir will inaugurate a series of radio addresses on behalf of the Canadian Red Cross next Tuesday evening when she will be heard in a Canadian radio broadcast from Ottawa at 10.30 p.m. Atlantic Standard Time.

There will be 11 addresses in the series and a representative from each province will be heard. New Brunswick's representative will be Hon. Dr. W. F. Roberts, minister of health and labor, who will speak from Saint John on May 30. All of the addresses will be on the Canadian Radio Broadcast system and at 10.30 p.m. Atlantic Standard Time.

The second address will be by the minister of pensions and national health speaking in Ottawa on Thursday, May 14, and the executive committee of the Canadian Red Cross who will be heard on Saturday, May 16.

The provincial representatives' addresses will be given as follows: From Winnipeg on May 18; from Charlottetown on May 19; from Vancouver on May 21; from Halifax on May 23; from Edmonton on May 25; from Montreal on May 28; from Saint John on May 30, and from Regina on June 1.
