This was particularly encouraging in view of the fact that canneries in the United States may have to close down. This New Brunswick firm, of which J. J. Hayes Doone, M.P.P., is Secretary, now ships sardines to all parts of the world.

On September 25 Hon. Mr. Michaud will start his campaign for "Eat More Fish." This campaign which will be Dominion wide will, it is hoped, result in an increased consumption of sea foods across Canada.

Hon. Mr. Michaud has been at the head of the Department of Fisheries less than a year, but he has proved himself to be the most active Minister that has ever held the post of Minister of Fisheries. He has made a personal visit to the leading fishing points on both the Atlantic and Pacific oceans, and has obtained first hand information of the fisheries industry. Not only that, but he is making a study of the ways and means to assist this industry, and to provide wider markets for our fishermen. The creation of wider markets means employment to thousands of Canadian fishermen, and in the creation of these Hon. Mr. Michaud is sparing no pains to promote. Speaking to The Daily Mail last evening, Hon. Mr. Michaud said that he was working hard and had travelled many thousands of miles during recent months. This, however, he said, did not matter if the results were accomplished for the benefit of the fishermen.

"Intent to Alarm the King"

Calm British justice made a piker of a petty evil-doer who seemed to have laid plans to be a sensational big shot.

On July 16, as King Edward was returning a-horseback from a trooping of the colors, a man tossed a black object in the path of his majesty. The object, a pistol, landed on the ground at the horse's hind legs. George Andrew McMahon was arrested and held on three charges:

"Presenting near his majesty a revolver with intent to break the public peace."

"Being in possession of a revolver with intent to endanger public life." "Performing an act intended to alarm his majesty."

Upon arrest, McMahon said he had intended to kill himself in front of the King. On the stand he said he had been engaged by a foreign power.

The court in so many words termed this story so much poppycock. The presiding justice calmly instructed the jury to find the man not guilty on the first two counts. Finally a guilty verdict was given for "an act intended to alarm his majesty." And the judge gave the prisoner a year's sentence. "I do not intend to glorify this misguided person as a sort of fancy hero,"

said his honor. And that was that.

Who knows but what this punishment is more bitter to the wrongdoer than a long stretch in a tough jug? It's an idea, anyhow.

Babson Blasts "Education"

"School authorities must revise the present crazy and false educational system which is the primary cause of unemployment.

Who said that?

Roger Babson, business diagnostician, said it. And we are not sure we are going to quarrel very much with him about it.

When anybody takes a shot at the educational system he invites the withering fire of embattled educators. And when you start to argue education, you have difficulty in finding where to start.

Yet when all is said and done, the educators have produced a rather ocrummy lot of pupils. We include ourselves. And this they have done with the biggest bite of the tax dollar.

Yes, that's right, but Brother Babson probably is thinking of the endless stream of youngsters "educated" in arts and skills who come to him and other business men and are "willing to do anything" but just cannot be pinned down to displaying one purchasable art or skill.

Educators do not necessarily claim to produce the finished worker. Yet what are they producing? Babson says theirs is a "crazy and false system." Educators may now have the floor and present the defense.

Jurists Agree on Driving

Virtually identical views on the problem of careless and reckless motorists were expressed in Toronto by two eminent Judges and are worth careful Fredericton, N. B., consideration.

In Appeal Court, Chief Justice Latchford said: "I think that many more lives would be saved if the regulations were more rigidly enforced." And Chief Justice Rose of the Supreme Court declared: "I am not sure we are following the logical course in prosecuting only when there has been a serious accident." Both these jurists intimate that the time for action in regard to motor accidents is before they happen.

Unlike the criminal who plans to break the law, the motorist does not kill nor cause damage with intent. He does so because he is careless, ignorant, or has not learned to consider the rights of others. He acquires these habits because he is not checked up. It is better that the driving laws be oversevere and the punishment of offenders against them harsh than that the terrible toll of motor-car deaths should continue to mount.
